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## Associations of "End all be all" (30 Words)

<b>absolutely</b>	With no qualification, restriction, or limitation; totally. <i>An <b>absolutely</b> magnificent painting.</i>
<b><u>altogether</u></b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’). <i>It was not <b>altogether</b> her fault.</i>
<b>always</b>	At all times; on all occasions. <i><b>Always</b> arrives on time.</i>
<b><u>collectively</u></b>	As a group; as a whole. <i>The vast range of resources that the American people <b>collectively</b> own.</i>
<b>complete</b>	Perfect and complete in every respect having all necessary qualities. <i>A <b>complete</b> coward.</i>
<b>completely</b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’). <i>You must be <b>completely</b> mad.</i>
<b>conclusively</b>	In a decisive way that has the effect of proving a case. <i>We settled the problem <b>conclusively</b>.</i>
<b><u>culminate</u></b>	Be the climax or point of highest development of. <i>The meeting <b>culminated</b> in a tearful embrace.</i>
<b>entire</b>	Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged. <i>Was able to keep the collection <b>entire</b> during his lifetime.</i>
<b>entirely</b>	Solely. <i>The traffic seemed to consist <b>entirely</b> of black cabs.</i>
<b>entirety</b>	The whole of something. <i>She would have to stay in her room for the <b>entirety</b> of the weekend.</i>
<b><u>ever</u></b>	At all times all the time and on every occasion. <i>They felt better than <b>ever</b> before.</i>

<u>every</u>	Each and all of the members of a group considered singly and without exception. <i><b>Every</b> third seat.</i>
everywhere	All places or directions. <i><b>Everywhere</b> she went she was feted.</i>
<u>forever</u>	Without interruption. <i>They are <b>forever</b> on the move.</i>
fully	Referring to a quantity. <i>They were <b>fully</b> or amply fed.</i>
gamut	The lowest note in the gamut scale. <i>The whole <b>gamut</b> of human emotion.</i>
generic	Relating to a genus. <i>Is there a <b>generic</b> Asian mind.</i>
<u>lifelong</u>	Continuing through life. <i>A <b>lifelong</b> Conservative.</i>
<u>outright</u>	Clear and undisputed. <i>She couldn't ask him <b>outright</b>.</i>
perfectly	In a manner or way that could not be better. <i>You're <b>perfectly</b> right.</i>
<u>solely</u>	Not involving anyone or anything else; only. <i>He is <b>solely</b> responsible for any debts the company may incur.</i>
<u>stark</u>	Complete or extreme. <i>A <b>stark</b> interior.</i>
<u>thoroughly</u>	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>He searched the house <b>thoroughly</b>.</i>
<u>totally</u>	Used to express agreement. <i>They came from <b>totally</b> different backgrounds.</i>
ultimately	At the most basic level. <i><b>Ultimately</b> he has only himself to blame.</i>
unsuited	Not right or appropriate. <i>He was totally <b>unsuited</b> for the job.</i>
<u>utterly</u>	Completely and without qualification; used informally as intensifiers. <i><b>Utterly</b> miserable.</i>
<u>whole</u>	Acting together as a single undiversified whole. <i>The man who's given a <b>whole</b> new meaning to the term cowboy.</i>

**wholly**

To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly.

*She found herself given over **wholly** to sensation.*
