<b><u>general</u></b>	Prevailing among and common to the general public. <i>A <b>general</b> anesthetic.</i>

<b><u>indigenous</u></b>	Originating or occurring naturally in a particular place; native. <i>The Ainu are <b>indigenous</b> to the northernmost islands of Japan.</i>
<b><u>local</u></b>	Of or belonging to or characteristic of a particular locality or neighborhood. <i>The village has an excellent <b>local</b> bus service.</i>
<b>ordinary</b>	(especially of a judge or bishop) exercising authority by virtue of office and not by deputation. <i>It was just an <b>ordinary</b> evening.</i>
<b><u>pervasive</u></b>	Spreading or spread throughout. <i>An error is <b>pervasive</b> if it is material to more than one conclusion.</i>
<b>prevailing</b>	Existing at a particular time; current. <i>The <b>prevailing</b> mood within Whitehall circles.</i>
<b>ubiquitous</b>	Present, appearing, or found everywhere. <i>His <b>ubiquitous</b> influence was felt by all the family.</i>
<b><u>universal</u></b>	Applicable to or common to all members of a group or set. <i>The incidents caused <b>universal</b> concern.</i>
<b><u>usual</u></b>	Occurring or encountered or experienced or observed frequently or in accordance with regular practice or procedure. <i>Came at the <b>usual</b> time.</i>
<b><u>widespread</u></b>	Widely circulated or diffused. <i>A <b>widespread</b> doctrine.</i>

<b><u>only</u></b>	Being the only one single and isolated from others. <i>A final report reached him <b>only</b> on January 15.</i>
<b>pandemic</b>	An outbreak of a pandemic disease. <i><b>Pandemic</b> fear of nuclear war.</i>
<b><u>singular</u></b>	The singular number. <i>She always thought of herself as <b>singular</b> as his only daughter.</i>
<b><u>sole</u></b>	Put a new sole on to a shoe. <i><b>Sole</b> rights of publication.</i>
<b>special</b>	A person assigned to a special duty a special constable or special correspondent. <i>A <b>special</b> kind of paint.</i>
