- (of an area) in which a particular disease is regularly found.

prevailing	Existing at a particular time; current. <i>The prevailing mood within Whitehall circles.</i>
ubiquitous	Present, appearing, or found everywhere. <i>His ubiquitous influence was felt by all the family.</i>
<u>universal</u>	Applicable to or common to all members of a group or set. <i>The incidents caused universal concern.</i>
<u>usual</u>	Occurring or encountered or experienced or observed frequently or in accordance with regular practice or procedure. <i>Came at the usual time.</i>
<u>widespread</u>	Widely circulated or diffused. <i>A widespread doctrine.</i>
