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## Associations of "Ends up" (30 Words)

<b>apex</b>	The point in turning a corner when the vehicle is closest to the edge of the track. <i>The <b>apex</b> of his career was in 1966 when he hoisted aloft the World Cup for England.</i>
<b>ascending</b>	Increasing in size or importance. <i>Blood pressure in the <b>ascending</b> aorta.</i>
<b>climactic</b>	Consisting of or causing a climax. <i>The film s <b>climactic</b> scenes.</i>
<b>climb</b>	An ascent especially of a mountain or hill by climbing. <i>Sales were <b>climbing</b> after prices were lowered.</i>
<b>closing</b>	The act of closing something. <i>The <b>closing</b> stages of the election campaign.</i>
<b>completion</b>	A successful forward pass in football. <i>Work on the new golf course is nearing <b>completion</b>.</i>
<b>culminate</b>	Reach the highest or most decisive point. <i>The star <b>culminates</b> at midnight on about the 30th April.</i>
<b>culmination</b>	A heavenly body's highest celestial point above an observer's horizon. <i>Their achievements stand as a <b>culmination</b> of centuries of development.</i>
<b>elevator</b>	A platform or compartment housed in a shaft for raising and lowering people or things to different levels; a lift. <i>In the harbour a giant <b>elevator</b> stores prairie grain.</i>
<b>ending</b>	The end of a word a suffix or inflectional ending or final morpheme. <i>The <b>ending</b> of the Cold War.</i>
<b>epilogue</b>	A short passage added at the end of a literary work. <i>The meaning of the book s title is revealed in the <b>epilogue</b>.</i>
<b>eventually</b>	In the end, especially after a long delay, dispute, or series of problems. <i><b>Eventually</b> after midnight I arrived at the hotel.</i>

<b>final</b>	The final approach of an aircraft to the runway it will be landing on. <i>The World Cup <b>finals</b>.</i>
<b>finale</b>	The concluding part of any performance. <i>A fireworks <b>finale</b>.</i>
<b>finish</b>	Finish eating all the food on one's plate or on the table. <i>Excitement grew as the <b>finish</b> neared.</i>
<b>last</b>	The last person or thing the one occurring mentioned or acting after all others. <i>A struggle to the <b>last</b>.</i>
<b>lift</b>	An act of lifting. <i>The Puma tactical transport helicopter has a total <b>lift</b> of up to 5 500 lb.</i>
<b>lofty</b>	Of a noble or elevated nature. <i>An extraordinary mixture of harsh reality and <b>lofty</b> ideals.</i>
<b>peak</b>	A stiff brim at the front of a cap. <i>He climbed his last Swiss <b>peak</b> at the age of 80.</i>
<b>peroration</b>	A flowery and highly rhetorical oration. <i>He again invoked the theme in an emotional <b>peroration</b>.</i>
<b>proliferation</b>	A rapid increase in number (especially a rapid increase in the number of deadly weapons). <i>A continuing threat of nuclear <b>proliferation</b>.</i>
<b>rise</b>	Rise to one's feet. <i>He felt the hairs <b>rise</b> on the back of his neck.</i>
<b>risen</b>	Above the horizon. <i>The <b>risen</b> sun.</i>
<b>rising</b>	An armed protest against authority; a revolt. <i>The <b>rising</b> fives on the verge of school.</i>
<b>superlative</b>	The superlative form of an adjective or adverb. <i>So many highest <b>superlatives</b> achieved by man.</i>
<b>top</b>	Provide with a top or finish the top of a structure. <i>They <b>topped</b> off their dinner with a cognac.</i>
<b>upward</b>	Towards a higher place, point, or level. <i>An <b>upward</b> stroke of the pen.</i>
<b>windup</b>	Operated by a mechanism. <i><b>Windup</b> toys.</i>
<b>zenith</b>	The point above the observer that is directly opposite the nadir on the imaginary sphere against which celestial bodies appear to be projected. <i>In 1977 punk was at its <b>zenith</b>.</i>
