<b>indefatigability</b>	Tireless determination.
<b>longevity</b>	The property of being long-lived. <i>The greater <b>longevity</b> of women compared with men.</i>
<b>patience</b>	The capacity to accept or tolerate delay, problems, or suffering without becoming annoyed or anxious. <i>I have run out of <b>patience</b> with her.</i>
<b>permanence</b>	The state or quality of lasting or remaining unchanged indefinitely. <i>The clarity and <b>permanence</b> of the dyes.</i>
<b>perseverance</b>	The act of persisting or persevering; continuing or repeating behavior. <i>Medicine is a field which requires dedication and <b>perseverance</b>.</i>
<b>persistence</b>	The fact of continuing in an opinion or course of action in spite of difficulty or opposition. <i>Cardiff's <b>persistence</b> was rewarded with a try.</i>
<b>pertinacity</b>	Persistent determination.
<b>resignation</b>	An act of resigning from a job or office. <i>He submitted his <b>resignation</b> as of next month.</i>
<b>resoluteness</b>	The trait of being resolute. <i>His <b>resoluteness</b> carried him through the battle.</i>
<b>resolution</b>	Computer science the number of pixels per square inch on a computer generated display the greater the resolution the better the picture. <i>A high <b>resolution</b> monitor.</i>
<b>stamina</b>	The ability to sustain prolonged physical or mental effort. <i>Their secret is <b>stamina</b> rather than speed.</i>
<b>staying power</b>	Brace consisting of a heavy rope or wire cable used as a support for a mast or spar.
<b>stoicism</b>	An indifference to pleasure or pain.

<b>sufferance</b>	Patient endurance especially of pain or distress. <i>An estate at <b>sufferance</b>.</i>
<b>survival</b>	The state or fact of continuing to live or exist, typically in spite of an accident, ordeal, or difficult circumstances. <i>The animal's chances of <b>survival</b> were pretty low.</i>
<b>tenacity</b>	The quality or fact of being very determined; determination. <i>The sheer <b>tenacity</b> of the limpet.</i>

Stubbornly unyielding.  
*His **unyielding** faith.*

**vigilance**

The process of paying close and continuous attention.  
*Security duties that demand long hours of **vigilance**.*

**viscosity**

The state of being thick, sticky, and semi-fluid in consistency, due to internal friction.
