support	Give moral or psychological support aid or courage to. <i>The proposal was supported by many delegates.</i>
survive	Continue to live and avoid dying. <i>Against all odds the child survived.</i>
take	Occupy or take on. <i>Take the A43 towards Bicester.</i>
tolerate	Allow the presence of or allow (an activity) without opposing or prohibiting. <i>He learned to tolerate the heat.</i>
undergo	Experience or be subjected to (something, typically something unpleasant or arduous). <i>The fluid undergoes shear.</i>
wear	Have in one's aspect wear an expression of one's attitude or personality. <i>Spinning long stories wearing half the day.</i>
weather	Change under the action or influence of the weather. <i>The ice sheet preserves specimens that would weather away more quickly in other regions.</i>

fortitude	Courage in pain or adversity. <i>She endured her illness with great fortitude.</i>
indomitable	Impossible to subdue. <i>A woman of indomitable spirit.</i>
obstinacy	The trait of being difficult to handle or overcome. <i>His reputation for obstinacy.</i>
obstinate	Persist stubbornly. <i>Her obstinate determination to pursue a career in radio.</i>
patience	Any of various forms of card game for one player, the object of which is to use up all one's cards by forming particular arrangements and sequences. <i>I have run out of patience with her.</i>
patiently	With patience; in a patient manner. <i>He patiently explained the pros and cons.</i>
perseverance	Persistent determination. <i>Medicine is a field which requires dedication and perseverance.</i>
persevere	Continue in a course of action even in the face of difficulty or with little or no indication of success. <i>His family persevered with his treatment.</i>
<u>persist</u>	Be persistent refuse to stop. <i>We are persisting with policies that will create jobs for the future.</i>
persistence	The act of persisting or persevering; continuing or repeating behavior. <i>The persistence of huge environmental problems.</i>
pertinacity	Persistent determination.
<u>reliance</u>	A person or thing on which someone depends. <i>He wrote the paper with considerable reliance on the work of other scientists.</i>
<u>remain</u>	Stay the same remain in a certain state. <i>The dress remained wet after repeated attempts to dry it.</i>

resourcefulness	The ability to deal resourcefully with unusual problems. <i>A man of great resourcefulness.</i>
<u>temperance</u>	The act of tempering. <i>The temperance movement.</i>
<u>tenacity</u>	The quality or fact of continuing to exist; persistence. <i>You have to admire the tenacity of these two guys.</i>
tolerance	A permissible difference; allowing some freedom to move within limits. <i>The desert camel shows the greatest tolerance to dehydration.</i>
toleration	Official recognition of the right of individuals to hold dissenting opinions (especially in religion). <i>All people should practice toleration and live together in peace.</i>
undaunted	Unshaken in purpose. <i>Undaunted in the face of death.</i>
<u>vigilance</u>	Vigilant attentiveness. <i>Security duties that demand long hours of vigilance.</i>
<u>viscosity</u>	Resistance of a liquid to shear forces (and hence to flow). <i>Cooling the fluid raises its viscosity.</i>
wait	The act of waiting remaining inactive in one place while expecting something. <i>I can't wait to tell Nick what happened.</i>
