A person or thing competing with another for the same objective or for

superiority in the same field of activity.

Gun battles between **rival** gangs.




Usage Examples of "Enemy" as a noun

retribution The act of correcting for your wrongdoing.

revenge Inflict revenge on behalf of someone else.

It s a pity he chose that way to **revenge** his sister.

rival Be the rival of be in competition with.

He had respect for his **rival**s.

spurn An act of spurning.

He spoke gruffly as if afraid that his invitation would be **spurn**ed.

The act of taking revenge (harming someone in retaliation for something

harmful that they have done) especially in the next life.

vengeanceFor **vengeance** I would do nothing This nation is too great to look for mere

revenge.

vengeful Seeking to harm someone in return for a perceived injury.
