activate	Put in motion or move to act. Activate a metal.
actuate	Give an incentive for action. Actuate the circuits.

<u>animate</u>	Give (a film or character) the appearance of movement using animation techniques. <i>Prometheus stole fire from heaven to animate his clay men.</i>
arouse	Excite or provoke (someone) to anger or strong emotions. Arouse pity.
<u>brace</u>	Support or hold steady and make steadfast with or as if with a brace. <i>Police are braced for a traffic nightmare today.</i>
<u>drive</u>	Strike a ball from the tee typically with a driver. Drive a golf ball.
dynamize	Give power or energy to; make dynamic. <i>She was dynamized by her desire to go to grad school.</i>
electrify	Charge (a conductor) with electricity. Electrify an appliance.
<u>embolden</u>	Give encouragement to. Emboldened by the claret he pressed his knee against hers.
encourage	Stimulate the development of (an activity, state, or belief). <i>Pupils are encouraged to be creative.</i>
energise	Cause to be alert and energetic.
<u>enliven</u>	Make (something) more entertaining, interesting, or appealing. <i>The wartime routine was enlivened by a series of concerts.</i>
<u>excite</u>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. Excite the atoms.
fire up	Cause to go off.
<u>galvanize</u>	Stimulate (muscles) by administering a shock. <i>They promised they would galvanize the iron railings to prevent rusting.</i>
get going	Achieve a point or goal.
<u>invigorate</u>	Heighten or intensify. <i>The cold water invigorated him.</i>
liven up	Raise.
<u>motivate</u>	Provide (someone) with a reason for doing something. <i>It is the teacher s job to motivate the child at school.</i>
move	Cause to move or shift into a new position or place both in a concrete and in an abstract sense. <i>Her fate moved us all.</i>
move to action	Move so as to change position, perform a nontranslational motion.
operate	Happen. <i>There is a powerful law which operates in politics.</i>

perk up	Raise.
rouse	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>Once the enemy camp was roused they would move on the castle.</i>
set going	Give a fine, sharp edge to a knife or razor.
spur on	Equip with spurs.
start	Set in motion cause to start. <i>The season starts in September.</i>
start up	Play in the starting lineup.
stimulate	Raise levels of physiological or nervous activity in (the body or any biological system). <i>Coffee and tea stimulate me.</i>
stir up	Move an implement through.
switch on	Cause to go on or to be engaged or set in operation.
trigger	Release or pull the trigger on. <i>Trigger a reaction.</i>
trigger off	Release or pull the trigger on.
trip	Make a trip for pleasure. <i>You re tripping if you think I m hanging around.</i>
turn on	Become officially one year older.
vitalize	Give strength and energy to. <i>The eggs are vitalized.</i>

Usage Examples of "Energize" as a verb

- *Floor sensors are energized by standing passengers.*
- *Ceramic cooktops cook food by energizing molecules both in the food and pan.*
- *People were energized by his ideas.*

agitate	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>Agitate the water to disperse the oil.</i>
agitative	Tending to agitate or move (something); involving agitation.
arousal	The act of arousing. <i>The purpose of art is the arousal of emotions.</i>

arouse	Excite or provoke (someone) to anger or strong emotions. <i>She had been aroused from deep slumber.</i>
<u>backlash</u>	Degree of play between parts of a mechanism. <i>Typical gearbox backlash in these systems is 2.</i>
<u>brace</u>	Support or hold steady and make steadfast with or as if with a brace. <i>She braced her feet against a projecting shelf.</i>
<u>catalyze</u>	Change by catalysis or cause to catalyze.
effervescence	The property of giving off bubbles. <i>The effervescence of sparkling wine.</i>
encourage	Persuade (someone) to do or continue to do something by giving support and advice. <i>Pupils are encouraged to be creative.</i>
enkindle	Call forth (emotions, feelings, and responses). <i>The glare from its enkindled roof illumined its innermost recesses.</i>
<u>excite</u>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>The ability to excite interest in others.</i>
foment	Try to stir up public opinion. <i>His legs should be fomented.</i>
<u>incite</u>	Urge on; cause to act. <i>Incite a riot.</i>
incitement	Needed encouragement. <i>This amounted to an incitement to commit murder.</i>
<u>induce</u>	Derive by inductive reasoning. <i>The ads induced me to buy a VCR.</i>
inflame	Become inflamed get sore. <i>The finger joints were inflamed with rheumatoid arthritis.</i>
inspire	Spur on or encourage especially by cheers and shouts. <i>The film was successful enough to inspire a sequel.</i>
<u>instigate</u>	Serve as the inciting cause of. <i>They instigated a reign of terror.</i>
<u>invigorate</u>	Impart vigor, strength, or vitality to. <i>The cold water invigorated him.</i>
<u>invoke</u>	Cause (a procedure) to be carried out. <i>The antiquated defence of insanity is rarely invoked in England.</i>
<u>motivate</u>	Request (something) and present facts and arguments in support of one's request. <i>He was primarily motivated by the desire for profit.</i>

<u>provoke</u>	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. <i>A teacher can provoke you into working harder.</i>
rouse	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>He was roused by the drunken men in the street.</i>
spur	Strike with a spur. <i>Cowboys know not to squat with their spurs on.</i>
stimulate	Cause to do; cause to act in a specified manner. <i>The book stimulated her imagination.</i>
stir	An act of stirring food or drink. <i>Caroline felt a stir of anger deep within her breast.</i>
<u>unrest</u>	A feeling of restless agitation. <i>Years of industrial unrest.</i>
urge	Force or impel in an indicated direction. <i>I urged him to finish his studies.</i>
vex	Change the arrangement or position of. <i>Vex the subject of the death penalty.</i>
wake	Cause to become awake or conscious. <i>We waked Jim last night.</i>
