- *Supply energy, typically kinetic or electrical energy, to (something).*

### Synonyms of "Energize" as a verb (36 Words)

<b>activate</b>	Put in motion or move to act. <b>Activate</b> a metal.
<b>actuate</b>	Give an incentive for action. <b>Actuate</b> the circuits.

<b><u>animate</u></b>	Give (a film or character) the appearance of movement using animation techniques. <i>Prometheus stole fire from heaven to <b>animate</b> his clay men.</i>
<b>arouse</b>	Excite or provoke (someone) to anger or strong emotions. <b>Arouse</b> pity.
<b><u>brace</u></b>	Support or hold steady and make steadfast with or as if with a brace. <i>Police are <b>braced</b> for a traffic nightmare today.</i>
<b><u>drive</u></b>	Strike a ball from the tee typically with a driver. <b>Drive</b> a golf ball.
<b>dynamize</b>	Give power or energy to; make dynamic. <i>She was <b>dynamized</b> by her desire to go to grad school.</i>
<b>electrify</b>	Charge (a conductor) with electricity. <b>Electrify</b> an appliance.
<b><u>embolden</u></b>	Give encouragement to. <b>Emboldened</b> by the claret he pressed his knee against hers.
<b>encourage</b>	Stimulate the development of (an activity, state, or belief). <i>Pupils are <b>encouraged</b> to be creative.</i>
<b>energise</b>	Cause to be alert and energetic.
<b><u>enliven</u></b>	Make (something) more entertaining, interesting, or appealing. <i>The wartime routine was <b>enlivened</b> by a series of concerts.</i>
<b><u>excite</u></b>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <b>Excite</b> the atoms.
<b>fire up</b>	Cause to go off.
<b><u>galvanize</u></b>	Stimulate (muscles) by administering a shock. <i>They promised they would <b>galvanize</b> the iron railings to prevent rusting.</i>
<b>get going</b>	Achieve a point or goal.
<b><u>invigorate</u></b>	Heighten or intensify. <i>The cold water <b>invigorated</b> him.</i>
<b>liven up</b>	Raise.
<b><u>motivate</u></b>	Provide (someone) with a reason for doing something. <i>It is the teacher s job to <b>motivate</b> the child at school.</i>
<b>move</b>	Cause to move or shift into a new position or place both in a concrete and in an abstract sense. <i>Her fate <b>moved</b> us all.</i>
<b>move to action</b>	Move so as to change position, perform a nontranslational motion.
<b>operate</b>	Happen. <i>There is a powerful law which <b>operates</b> in politics.</i>

<b>perk up</b>	Raise.
<b>rouse</b>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>Once the enemy camp was <b>roused</b> they would move on the castle.</i>
<b>set going</b>	Give a fine, sharp edge to a knife or razor.
<b>spur on</b>	Equip with spurs.
<b>start</b>	Set in motion cause to start. <i>The season <b>starts</b> in September.</i>
<b>start up</b>	Play in the starting lineup.
<b>stimulate</b>	Raise levels of physiological or nervous activity in (the body or any biological system). <i>Coffee and tea <b>stimulate</b> me.</i>
<b>stir up</b>	Move an implement through.
<b>switch on</b>	Cause to go on or to be engaged or set in operation.
<b>trigger</b>	Release or pull the trigger on. <i><b>Trigger</b> a reaction.</i>
<b>trigger off</b>	Release or pull the trigger on.
<b>trip</b>	Make a trip for pleasure. <i>You re <b>tripping</b> if you think I m hanging around.</i>
<b>turn on</b>	Become officially one year older.
<b>vitalize</b>	Give strength and energy to. <i>The eggs are <b>vitalized</b>.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Energize" as a verb

- *Floor sensors are energized by standing passengers.*
- *Ceramic cooktops cook food by energizing molecules both in the food and pan.*
- *People were energized by his ideas.*

<b>agitate</b>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i><b>Agitate</b> the water to disperse the oil.</i>
<b>agitative</b>	Tending to agitate or move (something); involving agitation.
<b>arousal</b>	The act of arousing. <i>The purpose of art is the <b>arousal</b> of emotions.</i>

<b>arouse</b>	Excite or provoke (someone) to anger or strong emotions. <i>She had been <b>aroused</b> from deep slumber.</i>
<b><u>backlash</u></b>	Degree of play between parts of a mechanism. <i>Typical gearbox <b>backlash</b> in these systems is 2.</i>
<b><u>brace</u></b>	Support or hold steady and make steadfast with or as if with a brace. <i>She <b>braced</b> her feet against a projecting shelf.</i>
<b><u>catalyze</u></b>	Change by catalysis or cause to catalyze.
<b>effervescence</b>	The property of giving off bubbles. <i>The <b>effervescence</b> of sparkling wine.</i>
<b>encourage</b>	Persuade (someone) to do or continue to do something by giving support and advice. <i>Pupils are <b>encouraged</b> to be creative.</i>
<b>enkindle</b>	Call forth (emotions, feelings, and responses). <i>The glare from its <b>enkindled</b> roof illumined its innermost recesses.</i>
<b><u>excite</u></b>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>The ability to <b>excite</b> interest in others.</i>
<b>foment</b>	Try to stir up public opinion. <i>His legs should be <b>fomented</b>.</i>
<b><u>incite</u></b>	Urge on; cause to act. <i><b>Incite</b> a riot.</i>
<b>incitement</b>	Needed encouragement. <i>This amounted to an <b>incitement</b> to commit murder.</i>
<b><u>induce</u></b>	Derive by inductive reasoning. <i>The ads <b>induced</b> me to buy a VCR.</i>
<b>inflame</b>	Become inflamed get sore. <i>The finger joints were <b>inflamed</b> with rheumatoid arthritis.</i>
<b>inspire</b>	Spur on or encourage especially by cheers and shouts. <i>The film was successful enough to <b>inspire</b> a sequel.</i>
<b><u>instigate</u></b>	Serve as the inciting cause of. <i>They <b>instigated</b> a reign of terror.</i>
<b><u>invigorate</u></b>	Impart vigor, strength, or vitality to. <i>The cold water <b>invigorated</b> him.</i>
<b><u>invoke</u></b>	Cause (a procedure) to be carried out. <i>The antiquated defence of insanity is rarely <b>invoked</b> in England.</i>
<b><u>motivate</u></b>	Request (something) and present facts and arguments in support of one's request. <i>He was primarily <b>motivated</b> by the desire for profit.</i>

<b>provoke</b>	Evoked or provoked to appear or occur. <i>A teacher can <b>provoke</b> you into working harder.</i>
<b>rouse</b>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>He was <b>roused</b> by the drunken men in the street.</i>
<b>spur</b>	Strike with a spur. <i>Cowboys know not to squat with their <b>spurs</b> on.</i>
<b>stimulate</b>	Cause to do; cause to act in a specified manner. <i>The book <b>stimulated</b> her imagination.</i>
<b>stir</b>	An act of stirring food or drink. <i>Caroline felt a <b>stir</b> of anger deep within her breast.</i>
<b>unrest</b>	A feeling of restless agitation. <i>Years of industrial <b>unrest</b>.</i>
<b>urge</b>	Force or impel in an indicated direction. <i>I <b>urged</b> him to finish his studies.</i>
<b>vex</b>	Change the arrangement or position of. <i><b>Vex</b> the subject of the death penalty.</i>
<b>wake</b>	Cause to become awake or conscious. <i>We <b>waked</b> Jim last night.</i>
