*He travelled in a variety of **employments**.*

fight	The inclination or ability to fight or struggle. <i>A long fight against cancer.</i>
interlocking	The act of interlocking or meshing. <i>An interlocking of arms by the police held the crowd in check.</i>
involution	The act of sharing in the activities of a group. <i>Periods of artistic involution.</i>
<u>involvement</u>	The fact or condition of being involved with or participating in something. <i>She knew that involvement with Adam would only complicate her life.</i>
<u>mesh</u>	The act of interlocking or meshing. <i>If the mesh is too big small rabbits can squeeze through.</i>
meshing	The act of interlocking or meshing. <i>The meshing of gears.</i>
participation	The condition of sharing in common with others (as fellows or partners etc). <i>The scheme is based on employer participation.</i>
troth	Faith or loyalty when pledged in a solemn agreement or undertaking. <i>A token of troth.</i>



Usage Examples of "Engagements" as a noun

- *The teacher tried to increase his students' engagement in class activities.*
- *The engagement of the clutch.*
- *He lost his romantic ideas about war when he got into a real engagement.*

bridal	Of or relating to a wedding. <i>The bridal party came out into the church porch.</i>
<u>calendar</u>	Enter into a calendar. <i>I have you on my calendar for next Monday.</i>
celebrate	Have a celebration. <i>Wildlife campaigners celebrated after their victory.</i>
ceremony	Any activity that is performed in an especially solemn elaborate or formal way. <i>We found a rabbi to perform the ceremony for us.</i>
<u>commitment</u>	An engagement by contract involving financial obligation. <i>A man of energy and commitment.</i>
<u>date</u>	Establish or ascertain the date of an object or event. <i>1066 is the most famous date in English history.</i>
<u>diamond</u>	A tool with a small diamond for cutting glass. <i>A diamond ring.</i>
expiry	A coming to an end of a contract period. <i>The expiry of his driver s license.</i>
fealty	A feudal tenant's or vassal's sworn loyalty to a lord. <i>They owed fealty to the Earl rather than the King.</i>
fiance	A man who is engaged to be married.
fidelity	Accuracy with which an electronic system reproduces the sound or image of its input signal. <i>His fidelity to liberal ideals.</i>
honeymoon	Spend a honeymoon. <i>They are honeymooning in the south of France.</i>
<u>manifesto</u>	A public declaration of policy and aims, especially one issued before an election by a political party or candidate. <i>Manifesto commitments.</i>
marriage	The act of marrying; the nuptial ceremony. <i>They were celebrating 50 years of marriage.</i>
month	A period of time between the same dates in successive calendar months. <i>The first six months of 1992.</i>
nuptial	A wedding. <i>The forthcoming nuptials between Richard and Jocelyn.</i>
oath	A commitment to tell the truth especially in a court of law to lie under oath is to become subject to prosecution for perjury. <i>He exploded with a mouthful of oaths.</i>

<u>pact</u>	A written agreement between two states or sovereigns. <i>The country negotiated a trade pact with the US.</i>
<u>pledge</u>	Bind or secure by a pledge. <i>The creditor to whom the land is pledged.</i>
promise	Make a promise or commitment. <i>There is little or no promise that he will recover.</i>
renege	Fail to fulfill a promise or obligation. <i>The government had reneged on its election promises.</i>
salutation	A standard formula of words used in a letter to address the person being written to. <i>He raised his glass in salutation.</i>
salute	Make a formal salute to. <i>He saluted her with a smile.</i>
troth	Truth. <i>A token of troth.</i>
<u>vow</u>	Make a vow promise. <i>I vowed that my family would never go hungry.</i>
wedding	A party of people at a wedding.
