- intent** Determined to do (something).
*So **intent** on this fantastic narrative that she hardly stirred.*
- wrapped** Overjoyed; delighted.
***Enwrapped** in dreams.*

Associations of "Engrossed" (30 Words)

- absorbed** Having one's attention fully engaged; greatly interested.
*He was gazing into the water with **absorbed** attention.*
- captive** (of a facility or service) controlled by, and typically for the sole use of, an organization.
*The policeman put a pair of handcuffs on the **captive**.*
- committal** The act of committing a crime.
***Committal** proceedings.*

concentration	Strengthening the concentration as of a solute in a mixture by removing diluting material. <i>Concentration on the needs of the young can mean that the elderly are forgotten.</i>
concerned	Feeling or showing worry or solicitude. <i>We feel concerned about accomplishing the task at hand.</i>
confined	(of a space) restricted in area or volume; cramped. <i>Her fear of confined spaces.</i>
confinement	Concluding state of pregnancy; from the onset of contractions to the birth of a child. <i>He was immediately released from his confinement.</i>
considerate	Showing careful thought. <i>She was unfailingly kind and considerate.</i>
contemplative	A person devoted to the contemplative life. <i>Contemplative knowledge of God.</i>
culprit	Someone who perpetrates wrongdoing. <i>The car's front nearside door had been smashed in but the culprits had fled.</i>
daydream	Indulge in a daydream. <i>Stop daydreaming and pay attention.</i>
ecstatic	Involving an experience of mystic self-transcendence. <i>An ecstatic vision of God.</i>
enraptured	Feeling great rapture or delight.
focus	Place the focus on an element of a sentence. <i>They were focusing a telescope on a star.</i>
imprisonment	Putting someone in prison or in jail as lawful punishment. <i>The imprisonment of captured soldiers.</i>
intent	Intention or purpose. <i>His intent was to provide a new translation.</i>
joyous	Full of happiness and joy. <i>Felt a joyous abandon.</i>
pensive	Showing pensive sadness. <i>A pensive mood.</i>
perpetrator	A person who carries out a harmful, illegal, or immoral act. <i>The perpetrators of this horrific crime must be brought to justice.</i>
preoccupied	Having or showing excessive or compulsive concern with something. <i>She seemed a bit preoccupied.</i>

<u>prison</u>	Imprison. <i>He died in prison.</i>
<u>prisoner</u>	A person who is confined especially a prisoner of war. <i>200 rebels were taken prisoner.</i>
rapt	Filled with an intense and pleasurable emotion enraptured. <i>The newly chosen minister declared he was rapt with his new portfolio.</i>
rapture	(according to some millenarian teaching) transport (a believer) from earth to heaven at the Second Coming of Christ. <i>The tabloids went into raptures about her.</i>
repatriate	A person who has been repatriated. <i>Foreign firms would be permitted to repatriate all profits.</i>
<u>reverie</u>	A state of being pleasantly lost in one's thoughts; a daydream. <i>A knock on the door broke her reverie.</i>
solicitous	Characterized by or showing interest or concern. <i>She was always solicitous about the welfare of her students.</i>
thoughtful	Taking heed giving close and thoughtful attention. <i>Brows drawn together in thoughtful consideration.</i>
<u>trapped</u>	Forced to turn and face attackers. <i>Like a trapped animal.</i>
<u>troubled</u>	Beset by problems or difficulties. <i>Troubled areas.</i>
