| absorb | Take up and reduce the effect or intensity of (sound or an impact). <i>Steroids are absorbed into the bloodstream.</i> |
| awash | Covered or flooded with water, especially seawater or rain. <i>A rock awash outside the reef entrance.</i> |
| blade | A cut of beef from the shoulder blade. <i>The Paralympics brought prosthetics such as running blades into the limelight.</i> |
| cascade | Rush down in big quantities like a cascade. <i>The waterfall raced down in a series of cascades.</i> |
| deeply | To a great depth; far down or in. <i>She was deeply hurt.</i> |
| deluge | The biblical Flood (recorded in Genesis 6-8). <i>A deluge of rain hit the plains.</i> |
| dive | (of prices or profits) drop suddenly. <i>He got into a fight in some dive.</i> |
| drop | An instance of falling or dropping. <i>He looked ready to drop.</i> |
| drown | Deliberately kill a person or animal by drowning. <i>The divers saved the drowning child.</i> |
| enclose | Enclose or enfold completely with or as if with a covering. <i>The open fields in the parish were enclosed in 1808.</i> |
| engross | Consume all of one’s attention or time. <i>The country had made the best of its position to engross trade.</i> |
| envelop | Enclose or enfold completely with or as if with a covering. <i>Fog enveloped the house.</i> |
| focus | Become focussed or come into focus. <i>An opportunity to focus research on the health needs of the population.</i> |

| immerse | Cause to be immersed. <i>She was still immersed in her thoughts.</i> |
| <u>immersion</u> | A method of teaching a foreign language by the exclusive use of that language. <i>A week s immersion in the culinary heritage of Puglia.</i> |
| <u>knife</u> | Use a knife on. <i>The victim was knifed to death.</i> |
| <u>occupy</u> | Fill or preoccupy the mind. <i>The young prince will soon occupy the throne.</i> |
| <u>overwhelm</u> | Give too much of something to; inundate. <i>The Stilton doesn t overwhelm the flavour of the trout.</i> |
| <u>plunge</u> | Fall suddenly and uncontrollably. <i>A car swerved to avoid a bus and plunged into a ravine.</i> |
| sheathe | Enclose with a sheath. <i>Her legs were sheathed in black stockings.</i> |
| sink | Cause to sink. <i>This pledge could sink the government.</i> |
| <u>submerge</u> | Fill or cover completely, usually with water. <i>Houses had been flooded and cars submerged.</i> |
| submergence | The process or state of being submerged in or covered with water. <i>Total submergence of plants results in heavy crop losses.</i> |
| submerge | Sink below the surface; go under or as if under water. <i>Pellets were then submersed in agar.</i> |
| <u>surround</u> | Surround with a wall in order to fortify. <i>An oak fireplace surround.</i> |
| swallow | An amount of something swallowed in one action. <i>She swallowed hard sniffing back her tears.</i> |
| <u>sword</u> | A weapon with a long metal blade and a hilt with a hand guard, used for thrusting or striking and now typically worn as part of ceremonial dress. <i>Not many perished by the sword.</i> |
| underwater | (of a loan) having a balance that exceeds the current market value of the loan. <i>They learn to navigate underwater at night.</i> |
| <u>waterfall</u> | A cascade of water falling from a height, formed when a river or stream flows over a precipice or steep incline. <i>Each phase of a waterfall project must be complete prior to moving to the next phase.</i> |
