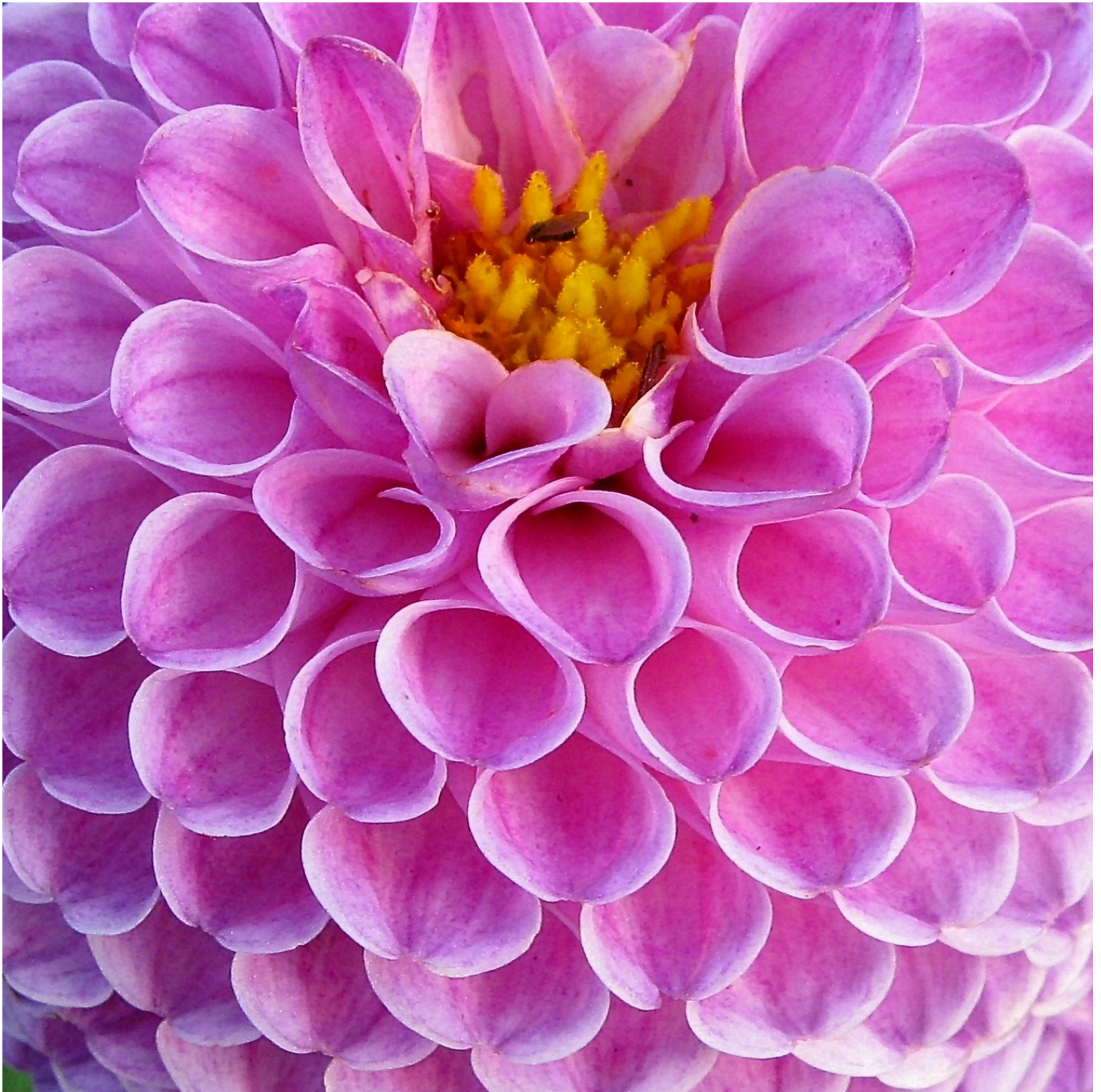
- become bigger** Come into existence.

*He would not **elaborate** on his news.*
- expand** Expand the influence of.  
*The dough **expands**.*
- expatiate** Add details, as to an account or idea; clarify the meaning of and discourse in a learned way, usually in writing.  
*She **expatiated** on working class novelists.*

<b>exposit</b>	Add details, as to an account or idea; clarify the meaning of and discourse in a learned way, usually in writing.
<b>expound</b>	State. <i>He was <b>expounding</b> a powerful argument.</i>
<b>flesh out</b>	Remove adhering flesh from (hides) when preparing leather manufacture.
<b>grow</b>	Allow or cause a part of the body to grow or develop. <i>More land was needed to <b>grow</b> crops for export.</i>
<b>increase in size</b>	Make bigger or more.
<b>lucubrate</b>	Write or study, especially by night. <i>I have often <b>lucubrated</b> for your Magazine.</i>
<b><u>magnify</u></b>	To enlarge beyond bounds or the truth. <i>Praise the Lord and <b>magnify</b> Him.</i>
<b>make bigger</b>	Create by artistic means.
<b>make greater</b>	Cause to be enjoyable or pleasurable.
<b>make larger</b>	Charge with a function; charge to be.



## Usage Examples of "Enlarge" as a verb

- *Very often a favourite photograph is enlarged and framed.*
- *They have renovated and enlarged the four-storey building.*
- *She enlarged the flower beds.*

<b>add</b>	Constitute an addition. <i>Chlorine is <b>added</b> to the water to kill bacteria.</i>
<b><u>aggrandize</u></b>	Increase the power, status, or wealth of. <i>He hoped to <b>aggrandize</b> himself by dying a hero's death.</i>
<b>amplification</b>	The action of making multiple copies of a gene or DNA sequence. <i>A few remarks added in <b>amplification</b> and defense.</i>
<b><u>amplify</u></b>	To enlarge beyond bounds or the truth. <i>The manufacturers have developed a system of <b>amplifying</b> the radio signal.</i>
<b>augment</b>	A vowel prefixed to past tenses of verbs in Greek and certain other Indo-European languages. <i>The recent speech of the president <b>augmented</b> tensions in the Near East.</i>
<b>augmentation</b>	The lengthening of the time values of notes in a melodic part. <i>The <b>augmentation</b> of the curriculum with new subjects.</i>
<b><u>bloat</u></b>	Become bloated or swollen or puff up. <i>Hunger <b>bloated</b> the child's belly.</i>
<b><u>broaden</u></b>	Expand to encompass more people or things. <i>Her interests <b>broadened</b> as she grew up.</i>
<b>dilate</b>	Add details, as to an account or idea; clarify the meaning of and discourse in a learned way, usually in writing. <i>Her eyes <b>dilated</b> with horror.</i>
<b>distend</b>	Become wider. <i>The gas <b>distended</b> the animal's body.</i>
<b>diversify</b>	Make (more) diverse. <i><b>Diversify</b> a course of study.</i>
<b>elongate</b>	Long in relation to width elongated. <i>The old man's gaunt and <b>elongated</b> frame.</i>
<b>escalation</b>	An increase in the intensity or seriousness of something; an intensification. <i>An <b>escalation</b> of violence.</i>
<b>expand</b>	Expand the influence of. <i>The work began as a short story and was later <b>expanded</b> into a novel.</i>
<b>expanded</b>	Denoting sheet metal slit and stretched into a mesh, used to reinforce concrete and other brittle materials. <i><b>Expanded</b> polystyrene.</i>

<b>expansion</b>	A function expressed as a sum or product of terms. <i>A small <b>expansion</b> of industry.</i>
<b>exponentially</b>	In an exponential manner. <i>The coefficients show an <b>exponentially</b> decaying trend.</i>
<b>extend</b>	Thrust or extend out. <i>They asked the government to <b>extend</b> its period of deliberation.</i>
<b>extension</b>	The most direct or specific meaning of a word or expression; the class of objects that an expression refers to. <i>A postgraduate <b>extension</b> course.</i>
<b>growing</b>	Biology the process of an individual organism growing organically a purely biological unfolding of events involved in an organism changing gradually from a simple to a more complex level. <i>The needs of the <b>growing</b> child.</i>
<b>increase</b>	The amount by which something increases. <i>The boss finally <b>increased</b> her salary.</i>
<b>magnification</b>	The degree to which something is or can be magnified. <i>At this <b>magnification</b> the pixels making up the image become visible.</i>
<b>magnify</b>	Make large. <i>Praise the Lord and <b>magnify</b> Him.</i>
<b>maximize</b>	Make as large or great as possible. <i>He <b>maximized</b> his role.</i>
<b>pavilion</b>	A building at a cricket ground or other sports ground, used for changing and taking refreshments. <i>They designed the British <b>pavilion</b> at Shanghai World Expo 2010.</i>
<b>prolongation</b>	Extension of the duration of something. <i>An agreement on further <b>prolongation</b> of the boundary proved difficult.</i>
<b>stretch</b>	The fact or condition of a muscle being stretched. <i>The park <b>stretched</b> beneath the train line.</i>
<b>stretching</b>	Exercise designed to extend the limbs and muscles to their full extent.
<b>swell</b>	A crescendo followed by a decrescendo. <i>She felt herself <b>swell</b> with pride.</i>
<b>widen</b>	Extend in scope or range or area. <i>The road <b>widened</b>.</i>
