
exposit	Add details, as to an account or idea; clarify the meaning of and discourse in a learned way, usually in writing.
expound	State. He was expound ing a powerful argument.
flesh out	Remove adhering flesh from (hides) when preparing leather manufacture.
grow	Allow or cause a part of the body to grow or develop. More land was needed to grow crops for export.
increase in size	Make bigger or more.
lucubrate	Write or study, especially by night. I have often lucubrate d for your Magazine.
magnify	To enlarge beyond bounds or the truth. Praise the Lord and magnify Him.
make bigger	Create by artistic means.
make greater	Cause to be enjoyable or pleasurable.
make larger	Charge with a function; charge to be.

amplification	The action of making multiple copies of a gene or DNA sequence. A few remarks added in amplification and defense.
<u>amplify</u>	To enlarge beyond bounds or the truth. The manufacturers have developed a system of amplify ing the radio signal.
augment	A vowel prefixed to past tenses of verbs in Greek and certain other Indo- European languages. The recent speech of the president augment ed tensions in the Near East.
augmentation	The lengthening of the time values of notes in a melodic part. The augmentation of the curriculum with new subjects.
<u>bloat</u>	Become bloated or swollen or puff up. Hunger bloat ed the child s belly.
<u>broaden</u>	Expand to encompass more people or things. Her interests broaden ed as she grew up.
dilate	Add details, as to an account or idea; clarify the meaning of and discourse in a learned way, usually in writing. <i>Her eyes dilated with horror.</i>
distend	Become wider. The gas distend ed the animal s body.
diversify	Make (more) diverse. Diversify a course of study.
elongate	Long in relation to width elongated. The old man s gaunt and elongate d frame.
escalation	An increase in the intensity or seriousness of something; an intensification. <i>An</i> escalation of violence.
expand	Expand the influence of. The work began as a short story and was later expand ed into a novel.
expanded	Denoting sheet metal slit and stretched into a mesh, used to reinforce concrete and other brittle materials. <i>Expanded polystyrene</i> .



expansion	A function expressed as a sum or product of terms. A small expansion of industry.
exponentially	In an exponential manner. The coefficients show an exponentially decaying trend.
<u>extend</u>	Thrust or extend out. They asked the government to extend its period of deliberation.
<u>extension</u>	The most direct or specific meaning of a word or expression; the class of objects that an expression refers to. <i>A postgraduate extension course.</i>
growing	Biology the process of an individual organism growing organically a purely biological unfolding of events involved in an organism changing gradually from a simple to a more complex level. <i>The needs of the growing child.</i>
increase	The amount by which something increases. <i>The boss finally increased her salary.</i>
magnification	The degree to which something is or can be magnified. At this magnification the pixels making up the image become visible.
<u>magnify</u>	Make large. Praise the Lord and magnify Him.
<u>maximize</u>	Make as large or great as possible. <i>He maximized his role.</i>
pavilion	A building at a cricket ground or other sports ground, used for changing and taking refreshments. <i>They designed the British pavilion at Shanghai World Expo 2010.</i>
prolongation	Extension of the duration of something. An agreement on further prolongation of the boundary proved difficult.
stretch	The fact or condition of a muscle being stretched. The park stretch ed beneath the train line.
stretching	Exercise designed to extend the limbs and muscles to their full extent.
swell	A crescendo followed by a decrescendo. She felt herself swell with pride.
widen	Extend in scope or range or area. <i>The road widened</i> .
