Enlist as a Verb

Definitions of "Enlist" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “enlist” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Engage somebody to enter the army.*
- *Hire for work or assistance.*
- *Enrol or be enrolled in the armed services.*
- *Join the military.*
- *Engage (a person or their help or support.*

Synonyms of "Enlist" as a verb (13 Words)

call up	Send a message or attempt to reach someone by radio, phone, etc.; make a signal to in order to transmit a message.
draft	Select a player for a sports team through the draft. Draft a speech.
engage	Keep engaged. He was engaged as a trainee copywriter.
enrol	Register formally as a participant or member. A campaign to enrol more foster carers.

get	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>I just don't get him.</i>
join up	Become part of; become a member of a group or organization.
muster in	Gather or bring together.
obtain	Get, acquire, or secure (something). <i>Adequate insurance cover is difficult to obtain.</i>
procure	Obtain (something), especially with care or effort. <i>He procured his wife to sign the mandate for the joint account.</i>
recruit	Form (an army or other force) by enlisting new people. <i>She recruited her children to help run the racket.</i>
<u>secure</u>	Cause to be firmly attached. <i>Doors are likely to be well secured at night.</i>
sign up	Communicate silently and non-verbally by signals or signs.
win	Win something through one's efforts. <i>You will find it difficult to win back their attention.</i>

Usage Examples of "Enlist" as a verb

- *Hundreds of thousands of recruits had been enlisted.*
- *The company enlisted the help of independent consultants.*
- *He enlisted in the Royal Naval Air Service.*

Associations of "Enlist" (30 Words)

<u>armed</u>	Furnished with bristles and thorns. <i>A lion rampant argent armed and langued azure.</i>
<u>armored</u>	Used of animals; provided with protective covering.
<u>army</u>	The army of the United States of America the agency that organizes and trains soldiers for land warfare. <i>He joined the army at 16.</i>
artillery	Large but transportable armament. <i>Each corps included two regiments of field artillery.</i>
battalion	A large body of troops ready for battle, especially an infantry unit forming part of a brigade. <i>A battalion of ants.</i>

brigade	Form or unite into a brigade. <i>The militia which was brigaded with regular formations to improve its training.</i>
brigadier	A general officer ranking below a major general.
byzantine	Of or relating to the Eastern Orthodox Church or the rites performed in it.
cantonment	Temporary living quarters specially built by the army for soldiers.
colonel	A commissioned military officer in the United States Army or Air Force or Marines who ranks above a lieutenant colonel and below a brigadier general.
combatant	A person engaged in conflict or competition with another. <i>All the combatant armies went to war with machine guns.</i>
conscription	Compulsory military service. <i>Conscription was extended to married men.</i>
corps	A main subdivision of an army in the field, consisting of two or more divisions. <i>At 9 30 a m the press corps was handed what looked to be a routine list of orders.</i>
demobilize	Release from military service or remove from the active list of military service. <i>Germany demanded that they demobilize within twelve hours.</i>
disarm	Make less hostile; win over. <i>His tact and political skills will disarm critics.</i>
disarmament	The reduction or withdrawal of military forces and weapons. <i>Disarmament treaties between America and the former Soviet Union.</i>
enrol	Recruit (someone) to perform a service. <i>The endowment of religious houses cannot be measured simply by the licences enrolled in chancery.</i>
enroll	Register formally as a participant or member.
inroad	An instance of something being encroached on or reduced by something else. <i>They made inroads in the United States market.</i>
legionary	Of an ancient Roman legion. <i>The legionary fortress of Isca.</i>
martial	Suggesting war or military life. <i>Martial law.</i>
mercenary	Serving for wages in a foreign army. <i>She s nothing but a mercenary little gold digger.</i>

militia	A military force that engages in rebel or terrorist activities in opposition to a regular army. <i>Creating a militia was no answer to the army's manpower problem.</i>
muster	(of troops) gather for inspection or in preparation for battle. <i>He attended the musters which were called to train all able bodied men.</i>
navy	The ships of a navy. <i>We built their navy.</i>
recruit	A new member of an organization or supporter of a cause. <i>There are plans to recruit more staff later this year.</i>
regiment	Assign to a regiment. <i>Regiment soldiers.</i>
sergeant	A lawman with the rank of sergeant.
<u>soldier</u>	Serve as a soldier in the military. <i>I soldiered with your father on his last four campaigns.</i>
<u>vanguard</u>	The leading units moving at the head of an army. <i>The prototype was in the vanguard of technical development.</i>
