- *Increase the nutritive value of (food) by adding vitamins or nutrients.*
- *Make (someone) wealthy or wealthier.*
- *Make better or improve in quality.*
- *Increase the proportion of a particular isotope in (an element), especially that of the isotope U-235 in uranium so as to make it suitable for use in a nuclear reactor or weapon.*
- *Make wealthy or richer.*
- *Improve or enhance the quality or value of.*

<b>make more fertile</b>	Undergo fabrication or creation.
<b>make more nutritious</b>	Give certain properties to something.
<b>make richer</b>	Create or design, often in a certain way.
<b>reinforce</b>	Strengthen (a military force) with additional personnel or equipment. <i>He <b>reinforced</b> the concrete.</i>
<b>supplement</b>	Add as a supplement to what seems insufficient. <i>I looked for a part time job to <b>supplement</b> my income.</i>
<b>upgrade</b>	Give a promotion to or assign to a higher position. <i>The company <b>upgraded</b> their personnel.</i>
<b>vitaminize</b>	Add vitamins to (food). <i><b>Vitaminized</b> processed foods.</i>

<b>enhancement</b>	An increase or improvement in quality, value, or extent. <i>The <b>enhancement</b> of civic amenities.</i>
<b><u>enlarge</u></b>	Become larger or bigger. <i>Very often a favourite photograph is <b>enlarged</b> and framed.</i>
<b><u>escalate</u></b>	Increase rapidly. <i>The price of tickets <b>escalated</b>.</i>
<b>expansion</b>	A discussion that provides additional information. <i>A small <b>expansion</b> of industry.</i>
<b>fertilization</b>	Making fertile as by applying fertilizer or manure.
<b>grow</b>	Become attached by or as if by the process of growth. <i>Entrepreneurs who are struggling to <b>grow</b> their businesses.</i>
<b>improve</b>	Make or become better. <i>I subscribed to two magazines to <b>improve</b> my mind.</i>
<b>increase</b>	A change resulting in an increase. <i>The <b>increase</b> in unemployment.</i>
<b>increment</b>	A regular increase in salary on an incremental scale. <i>All sizes from 4 30 mm in 1 mm <b>increments</b>.</i>
<b><u>intensify</u></b>	Become or make more intense. <i>The dispute began to <b>intensify</b>.</i>
<b><u>modernize</u></b>	Become technologically advanced. <i>He <b>modernized</b> the health service.</i>
<b>mounting</b>	The action of mounting something. <i>He pulled the curtain rail from its <b>mounting</b>.</i>
<b>promote</b>	Of an additive act as a promoter of a catalyst. <i>She was <b>promoted</b> to General Manager.</i>

<b>promotion</b>	The activity of organizing publicity campaigns. <i>The paper is reaping the rewards of a series of <b>promotions</b>.</i>
<b>raise</b>	Raise from a lower to a higher position. <i><b>Raise</b> a siege.</i>
<u><b>refurbish</b></u>	Renovate and redecorate (something, especially a building). <i>We <b>refurbished</b> the guest wing.</i>
<b>rise</b>	Rise up. <i>Non supervisory staff were given a 5 per cent <b>rise</b>.</i>
<u><b>surge</b></u>	(of a rope, chain, or windlass) slip back with a jerk. <i>Flooding caused by tidal <b>surges</b>.</i>
<u><b>tenfold</b></u>	Having ten parts or elements. <i>A <b>tenfold</b> increase in the use of insecticides.</i>
<u><b>upgrade</b></u>	The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. <i>I got an <b>upgrade</b> to first class when coach class was full.</i>
<u><b>uplift</b></u>	Cause (someone) to feel more cheerful, positive, or optimistic. <i>Music can <b>uplift</b> your spirits.</i>
<u><b>upsurge</b></u>	An upward surge in the strength or quantity of something; an increase. <i>An <b>upsurge</b> in vandalism and violent crime.</i>
