Definitions of "Entail" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "entail" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Limit the inheritance of property to a specific class of heirs.
- Limit the inheritance of (property) over a number of generations so that ownership remains within a particular family or group.
- Cause to experience or possess (something) permanently or inescapably.
- Involve (something) as a necessary or inevitable part or consequence.
- Have as a logical consequence.
- Impose, involve, or imply as a necessary accompaniment or result.
- Have as a logically necessary consequence.

demand	Require as useful, just, or proper. Too much was being demand ed of the top players.
fee-tail	Limit the inheritance of property to a specific class of heirs.

<u>imply</u>	Express or state indirectly. Salesmen who use jargon to imply superior knowledge.
make necessary	v Constitute the essence of.
mean	Mean or intend to express or convey. <i>Coal stoves mean a lot of smoke.</i>
<u>necessitate</u>	Make it necessary for (someone) to do something. A cut which necessitate d eighteen stitches.
need	Have or feel a need for. All you need bring are sheets.
require	Require as useful just or proper. Three patients require d operations.

Usage Examples of "Entail" as a verb

- A situation which entails considerable risks.
- I cannot get rid of the disgrace which you have entailed upon us.

<u>correlate</u>	Either of two or more related or complementary variables. The study found that success in the educational system correlate s highly with class.
cover	An area of the field consisting of cover point and extra cover. A seat cover .
denotation	The action of indicating or referring to something by means of a word, symbol, etc. Beyond their immediate denotation the words have a connotative power.
encompass	Include comprehensively. This group encompass es a wide range of people from different backgrounds.
entangle	Twist together or entwine into a confusing mass. The child entangle d the cord.
<u>implicate</u>	Bring into intimate and incriminating connection. Viruses are known to be implicate d in the development of certain cancers.
<u>implicit</u>	(of a function) not expressed directly in terms of independent variables. <i>The oak is implicit in the acorn.</i>
<u>imply</u>	(of a fact or occurrence) suggest (something) as a logical consequence. Salesmen who use jargon to imply superior knowledge.
impose	Impose and collect. A fine may be impose d.
include	Make part of a whole or set. The list include s the names of many famous writers.
included	Contained as part of a whole being considered. All of Europe Britain included .
inclusion	A person or thing that is included within a whole. An inclusion in the cytoplasm of the cell.
incorporate	Formed or united into a whole. She incorporate d his suggestions into her proposal.



indication	Something that serves to indicate or suggest. <i>Heavy bleeding is a common indication for hysterectomy.</i>
<u>involve</u>	Engage as a participant. This decision involve s many changes.
<u>involved</u>	Emotionally involved. The involved muscles.
participate	Have or possess (a particular quality. Both members participate of harmony.
<u>pertain</u>	Belong to something as a part, appendage, or accessory. My remark pertain ed to your earlier comments.
require	Require as useful just or proper. You will be require d to attend for cross examination.
subsume	Consider (an instance of something) as part of a general rule or principle. <i>Most of these phenomena can be</i> subsume <i>d under two broad categories.</i>
<u>superiority</u>	The state of being superior. He hated the white man s superiority and condescension.
<u>symbol</u>	Symbolize. The limousine was another symbol of his wealth and authority.
