## Entail as a Verb

### Definitions of "Entail" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “entail” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Limit the inheritance of property to a specific class of heirs.*
- *Limit the inheritance of (property) over a number of generations so that ownership remains within a particular family or group.*
- *Cause to experience or possess (something) permanently or inescapably.*
- *Involve (something) as a necessary or inevitable part or consequence.*
- *Have as a logical consequence.*
- *Impose, involve, or imply as a necessary accompaniment or result.*
- *Have as a logically necessary consequence.*

### Synonyms of "Entail" as a verb (10 Words)

<b>call for</b>	Challenge (somebody) to make good on a statement; charge with or censure for an offense.
<b>demand</b>	Require as useful, just, or proper. <i>Too much was being <b>demand</b>ed of the top players.</i>
<b>fee-tail</b>	Limit the inheritance of property to a specific class of heirs.

<b><u>implicate</u></b>	Bring into intimate and incriminating connection. <i>By saying that coffee would keep her awake Mary <b>implicated</b> that she didn't want any.</i>
<b><u>imply</u></b>	Express or state indirectly. <i>Salesmen who use jargon to <b>imply</b> superior knowledge.</i>
<b>make necessary</b>	Constitute the essence of.
<b>mean</b>	Mean or intend to express or convey. <i>Coal stoves <b>mean</b> a lot of smoke.</i>
<b><u>necessitate</u></b>	Make it necessary for (someone) to do something. <i>A cut which <b>necessitated</b> eighteen stitches.</i>
<b>need</b>	Have or feel a need for. <i>All you <b>need</b> bring are sheets.</i>
<b>require</b>	Require as useful just or proper. <i>Three patients <b>required</b> operations.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Entail" as a verb

- I cannot get rid of the disgrace which you have entailed upon us.

<b><u>carry</u></b>	An act of carrying something from one place to another. <i>550 shops <b>carry</b> the basic range.</i>
<b><u>compact</u></b>	Make more compact by or as if by pressing. <i>The foundation of the walls <b>compact</b> of Granite and Lime.</i>
<b>comprehensive</b>	A comprehensive school. <i>A <b>comprehensive</b> list of sources.</i>
<b><u>comprise</u></b>	Include or contain; have as a component. <i>These few men <b>comprise</b> his entire army.</i>
<b><u>connotation</u></b>	An idea or feeling which a word invokes for a person in addition to its literal or primary meaning. <i>The word discipline has unhappy <b>connotations</b> of punishment and repression.</i>

<b>connote</b>	Involve as a necessary condition of consequence; as in logic. <i>The term modern science usually <b>connotes</b> a complete openness to empirical testing.</i>
<b><u>consist</u></b>	Be consistent in form tenor or character be congruous. <i>Desires are to be satisfied only so far as <b>consists</b> with an approved end.</i>
<b>contain</b>	Be capable of holding or containing. <i>The cigarettes were thought to <b>contain</b> cannabis.</i>
<b><u>correlate</u></b>	Either of two or more related or complementary variables. <i>The study found that success in the educational system <b>correlates</b> highly with class.</i>
<b>cover</b>	An area of the field consisting of cover point and extra cover. <i>A seat <b>cover</b>.</i>
<b>denotation</b>	The action of indicating or referring to something by means of a word, symbol, etc. <i>Beyond their immediate <b>denotation</b> the words have a connotative power.</i>
<b>encompass</b>	Include comprehensively. <i>This group <b>encompasses</b> a wide range of people from different backgrounds.</i>
<b>entangle</b>	Twist together or entwine into a confusing mass. <i>The child <b>entangled</b> the cord.</i>
<b><u>implicate</u></b>	Bring into intimate and incriminating connection. <i>Viruses are known to be <b>implicated</b> in the development of certain cancers.</i>
<b><u>implicit</u></b>	(of a function) not expressed directly in terms of independent variables. <i>The oak is <b>implicit</b> in the acorn.</i>
<b><u>imply</u></b>	(of a fact or occurrence) suggest (something) as a logical consequence. <i>Salesmen who use jargon to <b>imply</b> superior knowledge.</i>
<b>impose</b>	Impose and collect. <i>A fine may be <b>imposed</b>.</i>
<b>include</b>	Make part of a whole or set. <i>The list <b>includes</b> the names of many famous writers.</i>
<b>included</b>	Contained as part of a whole being considered. <i>All of Europe Britain <b>included</b>.</i>
<b>inclusion</b>	A person or thing that is included within a whole. <i>An <b>inclusion</b> in the cytoplasm of the cell.</i>
<b>incorporate</b>	Formed or united into a whole. <i>She <b>incorporated</b> his suggestions into her proposal.</i>

<b>indication</b>	Something that serves to indicate or suggest. <i>Heavy bleeding is a common <b>indication</b> for hysterectomy.</i>
<u><b>involve</b></u>	Engage as a participant. <i>This decision <b>involves</b> many changes.</i>
<u><b>involved</b></u>	Emotionally involved. <i>The <b>involved</b> muscles.</i>
<b>participate</b>	Have or possess (a particular quality). <i>Both members <b>participate</b> of harmony.</i>
<u><b>pertain</b></u>	Belong to something as a part, appendage, or accessory. <i>My remark <b>pertained</b> to your earlier comments.</i>
<b>require</b>	Require as useful just or proper. <i>You will be <b>required</b> to attend for cross examination.</i>
<b>subsume</b>	Consider (an instance of something) as part of a general rule or principle. <i>Most of these phenomena can be <b>subsumed</b> under two broad categories.</i>
<u><b>superiority</b></u>	The state of being superior. <i>He hated the white man's <b>superiority</b> and condescension.</i>
<u><b>symbol</b></u>	Symbolize. <i>The limousine was another <b>symbol</b> of his wealth and authority.</i>
