disport	Play boisterously. <i>They disport as they please.</i>
ecstasy	Street names for methylenedioxymethamphetamine. <i>There was a look of ecstasy on his face.</i>
enjoy	Derive or receive pleasure from get enjoyment from take pleasure in. <i>The industry enjoyed a boom.</i>
enjoyable	(of an activity or occasion) giving delight or pleasure. <i>The company was enjoyable.</i>
euphoria	A feeling of great (usually exaggerated) elation. <i>In his euphoria he had become convinced he could defeat them.</i>
exult	Feel or show triumphant elation or jubilation. <i>Exulting in her escape Lisa closed the door behind her.</i>
exultant	Triumphantly happy. <i>He waved to the exultant crowds.</i>
gaiety	A festive merry feeling. <i>The sudden gaiety of children s laughter.</i>
glad	Cheerful and bright. <i>Albion s lessening shore could grieve or glad mine eye.</i>
gladden	Make glad or happy. <i>The high childish laugh was a sound that gladdened her heart.</i>
gratify	Yield (to); give satisfaction to. <i>Not all the sexual impulses can be gratified.</i>
happiness	The state of being happy. <i>Tom s heart swelled with happiness.</i>
joviality	A jovial nature.
joy	A thing that causes joy. <i>The joys of country living.</i>
merriment	Gaiety and fun. <i>Her eyes sparkled with merriment.</i>
mirth	Amusement, especially as expressed in laughter. <i>His six foot frame shook with mirth.</i>
please	Take only one's own wishes into consideration in deciding how to act or proceed. <i>Feel free to wander around as you please.</i>
pleasure	Derive enjoyment from. <i>He took his pleasure of her.</i>

- rapture** A state of elated bliss.
*The tabloids went into **raptures** about her.*
- regale** Lavishly supply (someone) with food or drink.
*He **regaled** her with a colourful account of that afternoon s meeting.*
- rejoice** Cause joy to.
*I love to **rejoice** their poor Hearts at this season.*
- serve** Serve a purpose role or function.
*The minister **served** the King for many years.*
- treat** Provide treatment for.
*The two were **treated** for cuts and bruises.*
