<b>ecstasy</b>	Street names for methylenedioxymethamphetamine. <i>There was a look of <b>ecstasy</b> on his face.</i>
<b>enjoy</b>	Derive or receive pleasure from get enjoyment from take pleasure in. <i>The industry <b>enjoyed</b> a boom.</i>
<b>enjoyable</b>	(of an activity or occasion) giving delight or pleasure. <i>The company was <b>enjoyable</b>.</i>
<b>euphoria</b>	A feeling of great (usually exaggerated) elation. <i>In his <b>euphoria</b> he had become convinced he could defeat them.</i>
<b>exult</b>	Feel or show triumphant elation or jubilation. <i><b>Exulting</b> in her escape Lisa closed the door behind her.</i>
<b>exultant</b>	Triumphantly happy. <i>He waved to the <b>exultant</b> crowds.</i>
<b>gaiety</b>	A festive merry feeling. <i>The sudden <b>gaiety</b> of children s laughter.</i>
<b>glad</b>	Cheerful and bright. <i>Albion s lessening shore could grieve or <b>glad</b> mine eye.</i>
<b>gladden</b>	Make glad or happy. <i>The high childish laugh was a sound that <b>gladdened</b> her heart.</i>
<b>gratify</b>	Yield (to); give satisfaction to. <i>Not all the sexual impulses can be gratified.</i>
<b>happiness</b>	The state of being happy. <i>Tom s heart swelled with <b>happiness</b>.</i>
<b>joviality</b>	A jovial nature.
<b>joy</b>	A thing that causes joy. <i>The <b>joys</b> of country living.</i>
<b>merriment</b>	Gaiety and fun. <i>Her eyes sparkled with <b>merriment</b>.</i>
<b>mirth</b>	Amusement, especially as expressed in laughter. <i>His six foot frame shook with <b>mirth</b>.</i>
<b>please</b>	Take only one's own wishes into consideration in deciding how to act or proceed. <i>Feel free to wander around as you <b>please</b>.</i>
<b>pleasure</b>	Derive enjoyment from. <i>He took his <b>pleasure</b> of her.</i>



- rapture** A state of elated bliss.  
*The tabloids went into **raptures** about her.*
- regale** Lavishly supply (someone) with food or drink.  
*He **regaled** her with a colourful account of that afternoon s meeting.*
- rejoice** Cause joy to.  
*I love to **rejoice** their poor Hearts at this season.*
- serve** Serve a purpose role or function.  
*The minister **served** the King for many years.*
- treat** Provide treatment for.  
*The two were **treated** for cuts and bruises.*
