delight	Take delight in. <i>An experience guaranteed to delight both young and old.</i>
enchant	Cast a spell over someone or something; put a hex on someone or something. <i>Isabel was enchanted with the idea.</i>
enrapture	Hold spellbound. <i>Ruth was enraptured by the sleeping child.</i>
enthral	Capture the fascinated attention of. <i>She had been so enthralled by the adventure that she had hardly noticed the cold.</i>
ravish	Fill (someone) with intense delight; enrapture. <i>An angry father who suspects that his daughter has been ravished.</i>
transport	Transport commercially. <i>He was convicted of theft and transported.</i>

Associations of "Enthrall" (30 Words)

admittance	A measure of electrical conduction, numerically equal to the reciprocal of the impedance. <i>People were unable to gain admittance to the hall.</i>
allure	Dispose or incline or entice to. <i>People for whom gold holds no allure.</i>
appeal	Challenge (a decision). <i>Appeal to somebody for help.</i>
attract	Be attractive to. <i>His criticism of the government attracted widespread support.</i>
attraction	An entertainment that is offered to the public. <i>This reform has many attractions for those on the left.</i>
attractive	Having qualities or features which arouse interest. <i>A remarkably attractive young man.</i>
beguile	Trick (someone) into doing something. <i>To beguile some of the time they went to the cinema.</i>
<u>cachet</u>	The state of being respected or admired; prestige. <i>Special cachets are applied to cards sold at the stands.</i>
<u>captivate</u>	Attract and hold the interest and attention of; charm. <i>He was captivated by her beauty.</i>
<u>charisma</u>	Compelling attractiveness or charm that can inspire devotion in others. <i>He has tremendous charisma and stage presence.</i>
<u>charm</u>	Induce into action by using one's charm. <i>His charm has captivated the media.</i>
<u>enchant</u>	Cast a spell over someone or something; put a hex on someone or something. <i>Isabel was enchanted with the idea.</i>
<u>entrance</u>	Attract; cause to be enamored. <i>At their abrupt entrance he rose to his feet.</i>
<u>fascinate</u>	To render motionless, as with a fixed stare or by arousing terror or awe. <i>I've always been fascinated by computers.</i>
<u>gate</u>	Control with a valve or other device that functions like a gate. <i>They were opening the gates of their country wide to the enemy.</i>
gateway	An opening that can be closed by a gate. <i>To me a home in the country was a gateway to happiness.</i>
hypnotic	A person under or open to hypnosis. <i>Hypnotics may be prescribed.</i>

hypnotist	A person who induces hypnosis. <i>An expert clinician and skilled hypnotist.</i>
hypnotize	Produce a state of hypnosis in (someone). <i>She gazed down hypnotized by the swirling tide.</i>
<u>inviting</u>	Attractive and tempting. <i>The sea down there looks so inviting.</i>
<u>magician</u>	A conjuror. <i>He was the magician of the fan belt.</i>
mesmerize	Attract strongly, as if with a magnet. <i>They were mesmerized by his story.</i>
narcissist	A person who has an excessive interest in or admiration of themselves. <i>Narcissists preening themselves in front of the mirror.</i>
<u>paralyzed</u>	Affected with paralysis.
portal	A website or web page providing access or links to other sites. <i>The portals of heaven.</i>
<u>seduction</u>	Enticing someone astray from right behavior. <i>If seduction doesn't work she can play on his sympathy.</i>
spellbind	To render motionless, as with a fixed stare or by arousing terror or awe. <i>The singer held the audience spellbound.</i>
<u>tempting</u>	Very pleasantly inviting. <i>A tempting financial offer.</i>
<u>trance</u>	Put into a trance. <i>She's been tranced and may need waking.</i>
wile	The use of tricks to deceive someone (usually to extract money from them). <i>The gang had played monopoly as they wiled away the hours.</i>
