Associations of "Enthused" (30 Words)

| argue | Have an argument about something. <i>The evidence argues for your claim.</i> |
| <u>argument</u> | An independent variable associated with a function or proposition and determining its value For example in the expression $y = F(x)$ the arguments of the function F are x and x and the value is y . <i>It was a strong argument that his hypothesis was true.</i> |
| bicker | A quarrel about petty points. <i>Couples who bicker over who gets what from the divorce.</i> |
| <u>contention</u> | A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement. <i>Freud's contention that all dreams were wish fulfilment.</i> |
| <u>contentious</u> | Relating to or involving differences between contending parties. <i>A contentious issue.</i> |
| contentiousness | An inclination to be quarrelsome and contentious. |
| contributor | A writer whose work is published in a newspaper or magazine or as part of a book. <i>Hunt was the largest contributor of hymns to these collections.</i> |
| <u>controversial</u> | Marked by or capable of arousing controversy. <i>A controversial decision on affirmative action.</i> |
| <u>controversy</u> | Prolonged public disagreement or heated discussion. <i>The announcement ended a protracted controversy.</i> |
| <u>debatable</u> | Open to discussion or argument. <i>It is debatable whether the country is coming out of recession.</i> |
| debate | The formal presentation of a stated proposition and the opposition to it (usually followed by a vote). <i>MPs debated the issue in the Commons.</i> |
| declamatory | Ostentatiously lofty in style. <i>A long declamatory speech.</i> |

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| <u>discourse</u> | Written or spoken communication or debate. <i>A discourse on critical theory.</i> |
| discussion | The action or process of talking about something in order to reach a decision or to exchange ideas. <i>See Appendix One for a more detailed discussion.</i> |
| disproof | A set of facts that prove that something is untrue. <i>Rex was living disproof of the youth preserving powers imputed to life in the college.</i> |
| disputable | Not established as a fact, and so open to question or debate. <i>Whether it can be described as art criticism may be disputable.</i> |
| disputation | Debate or argument. <i>Promoting consensus rather than disputation.</i> |
| dispute | A disagreement between management and employees that leads to industrial action. <i>The estate disputes that it is responsible for the embankment.</i> |
| forum | A public meeting or assembly for open discussion. <i>We hope these pages act as a forum for debate.</i> |
| gainsay | Deny or contradict (a fact or statement). <i>None could gainsay her.</i> |
| hassel | Norwegian chemist noted for his research on organic molecules (1897-1981). |
| <u>heated</u> | Made warm or hot het is a dialectal variant of heated. <i>A heated argument.</i> |
| impugn | Attack as false or wrong. <i>The father does not impugn her capacity as a good mother.</i> |
| polemical | Of or involving dispute or controversy. <i>A polemical essay.</i> |
| <u>quarrel</u> | An arrow that is shot from a crossbow; has a head with four edges. <i>She made the mistake of picking a quarrel with John.</i> |
| rebut | Overthrow by argument, evidence, or proof. <i>He had to rebut charges of acting for the convenience of his political friends.</i> |
| <u>rebuttal</u> | (law) a pleading by the defendant in reply to a plaintiff's surrejoinder. |
| refutable | Able to be refuted. |
| <u>refute</u> | Overthrow by argument, evidence, or proof. <i>These claims have not been convincingly refuted.</i> |

wrangle

An instance of intense argument (as in bargaining).
*The horses were **wrangled** early.*
