Entice as a Verb

Definitions of "Entice" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “entice” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Attract or tempt by offering pleasure or advantage.*
- *Provoke someone to do something through (often false or exaggerated) promises or persuasion.*



Synonyms of "Entice" as a verb (6 Words)

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| allure | Powerfully attract or charm; tempt. <i>Will sponsors really be allured by such opportunities.</i> |
| attract | Be attractive to. <i>His criticism of the government attracted widespread support.</i> |
| captivating | Attract; cause to be enamored. |
| dangle a carrot in front of | Hang freely. |
| <u>lure</u> | Provoke someone to do something through (often false or exaggerated) promises or persuasion. <i>The child was lured into a car but managed to escape.</i> |
| <u>tempt</u> | Entice or try to entice (someone) to do something that they find attractive but know to be wrong or unwise. <i>How is it that ye have agreed together to tempt the Spirit of the Lord.</i> |



Usage Examples of "Entice" as a verb

- *The treat is offered to entice the dog to eat.*
- *A show which should entice a new audience into the theatre.*



Associations of "Entice" (30 Words)

- allure** Dispose or incline or entice to.
*People for whom gold holds no **allure**.*
- attract** Be attractive to.
*I am not **attracted** to him at all.*
- attraction** The force by which one object attracts another.
*She has very romantic ideas about sexual **attraction**.*
- bait** Lure entice or entrap with bait.
*I used a hook **baited** with fat.*
- captivate** Attract; cause to be enamored.
*He was **captivated** by her beauty.*
- charisma** A divinely conferred power or talent.
*He has tremendous **charisma** and stage presence.*

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| <u>charm</u> | Protect through supernatural powers or charms. <i>You re not going to charm me into changing my mind.</i> |
| <u>coax</u> | Influence or urge by gentle urging, caressing, or flattering. <i>We coaxed our fare money out of my father.</i> |
| coquet | Talk or behave amorously, without serious intentions. <i>For a while he coquetted with engineering.</i> |
| <u>decoy</u> | Lure or entrap with or as if with a decoy. <i>A decoy duck.</i> |
| delusive | Inappropriate to reality or facts. <i>Delusive expectations.</i> |
| enticing | Attractive or tempting; alluring. <i>An enticing prospect.</i> |
| <u>fascinate</u> | Attract the strong attention and interest of (someone). <i>I ve always been fascinated by computers.</i> |
| glamorize | Make (something) seem glamorous or desirable, especially spuriously so. <i>The lyrics glamorize drugs.</i> |
| inducement | A bribe. <i>It is claimed that she was offered an inducement to plead guilty.</i> |
| ingratiating | Calculated to please or gain favor. <i>An ingratiating manner.</i> |
| intrigue | Form intrigues for in an underhand manner. <i>Within the region s borders is a wealth of interest and intrigue.</i> |
| invite | Invite someone to one s house. <i>Invite criticism.</i> |
| <u>inviting</u> | Offering the promise of an attractive or enjoyable experience. <i>An inviting offer.</i> |
| <u>lure</u> | Something used to lure fish or other animals into danger so they can be trapped or killed. <i>The lure of the exotic East.</i> |
| persuadable | Easily persuaded; amenable. <i>They need to identify the most persuadable voters.</i> |
| persuade | Cause somebody to adopt a certain position, belief, or course of action; twist somebody's arm. <i>It wasn t easy but I persuaded him to do the right thing.</i> |
| <u>seduction</u> | The action of seducing someone. <i>She was planning a seduction.</i> |

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| <u>seductive</u> | Tending to entice into a desired action or state. <i>A seductive voice.</i> |
| <u>tempt</u> | Give rise to a desire by being attractive or inviting. <i>There ll always be someone tempted by the rich pickings of poaching.</i> |
| <u>temptation</u> | A thing that attracts or tempts someone. <i>The temptations of life in London.</i> |
| tempter | A person or thing that tempts. <i>Satan is the great tempter of mankind.</i> |
| wheedle | Influence or urge by gentle urging, caressing, or flattering. <i>Please for my sake he wheedled.</i> |
| woo | Try to gain the love of (someone), especially with a view to marriage. <i>Pop stars are being wooed by film companies eager to sign them up.</i> |
