| <b><u>permit</u></b>    | An official document giving someone authorization to do something.<br><i>The country is not ready to <b>permit</b> any rice imports.</i>  |
| <b>privilege</b>        | Grant a privilege or privileges to.<br><i>English inheritance law <b>privileged</b> the eldest son.</i>   |
| <b><u>qualify</u></b>   | Specify as a condition or requirement in a contract or agreement; make an express demand or provision in an agreement.<br><i>The training necessary to <b>qualify</b> as a solicitor.</i> |
| <b>ratify</b>           | Sign or give formal consent to (a treaty, contract, or agreement), making it officially valid.<br><i>Both countries were due to <b>ratify</b> the treaty by the end of the year.</i>      |
| <b>thereby</b>          | By that means or because of that.<br><i>Students perform in hospitals <b>thereby</b> gaining a deeper awareness of the therapeutic power of music.</i>                                    |
