able	Having considerable skill proficiency or intelligence. <i>She was able to program her computer.</i>
acceptable	Moderately good; satisfactory. <i>An acceptable substitute for champagne.</i>
allow	Allow or plan for a certain possibility concede the truth or validity of something. <i>Income rose by 11 per cent allowing for inflation.</i>
allowable	Allowed, especially within a set of regulations; permissible. <i>The loan deal has been extended to the maximum allowable three months.</i>
applicant	A person who makes a formal application for something, especially a job. <i>Applicants for the degree course.</i>
authorize	Grant authorization or clearance for. <i>The rock star never authorized this slanderous biography.</i>
certification	The act of certifying or bestowing a franchise on. <i>A fundamental requirement for organic certification.</i>
characterize	Be characteristic of. <i>She characterized the period as the decade of revolution.</i>
decriminalize	Make legal. <i>A battle to decriminalize cannabis.</i>
delegate	Send or authorize (someone) to do something as a representative. <i>Edward was delegated to meet new arrivals.</i>
empower	Give (someone) the authority or power to do something. <i>Movements to empower the poor.</i>
enable	Make (a device or system) operational; activate. <i>The Department is leading the effort to enable a smooth and timely transition.</i>

endue	Give qualities or abilities to. <i>Our sight would be endued with a far greater sharpness.</i>
<u>ennoble</u>	Give a title to someone; make someone a member of the nobility. <i>The theatre is a moral instrument to ennoble the mind.</i>
<u>exam</u>	A set of questions or exercises evaluating skill or knowledge. <i>Exam results.</i>
<u>exclusion</u>	An item or eventuality specifically not covered by an insurance policy or other contract. <i>Exclusions can be added to your policy.</i>
exemption	Immunity from an obligation or duty. <i>Vehicles that may qualify for exemption from tax.</i>
fit	The manner in which something fits. <i>They fitted smoke alarms to their home.</i>
<u>invest</u>	Make an investment. <i>He stands before you invested in the full canonicals of his calling.</i>
legalize	Make legal. <i>The Swiss parliament legalized cannabis.</i>
<u>let</u>	Used to express an assumption upon which a theory or calculation is to be based. <i>About 50 people were let into the hearing.</i>
permissible	Permitted; allowed. <i>A kind of speculation that was permissible in cosmology but inadmissible in medicine.</i>
<u>permit</u>	An official document giving someone authorization to do something. <i>The country is not ready to permit any rice imports.</i>
privilege	Grant a privilege or privileges to. <i>English inheritance law privileged the eldest son.</i>
<u>qualify</u>	Specify as a condition or requirement in a contract or agreement; make an express demand or provision in an agreement. <i>The training necessary to qualify as a solicitor.</i>
ratify	Sign or give formal consent to (a treaty, contract, or agreement), making it officially valid. <i>Both countries were due to ratify the treaty by the end of the year.</i>
thereby	By that means or because of that. <i>Students perform in hospitals thereby gaining a deeper awareness of the therapeutic power of music.</i>
unobjectionable	Not objectionable; acceptable. <i>The bail conditions were unobjectionable as far as he was concerned.</i>

viscount

A son or younger brother or a count.

warrant

A document issued by a legal or government official authorizing the police or another body to make an arrest, search premises, or carry out some other action relating to the administration of justice.
