An initial proposal or request made to someone.

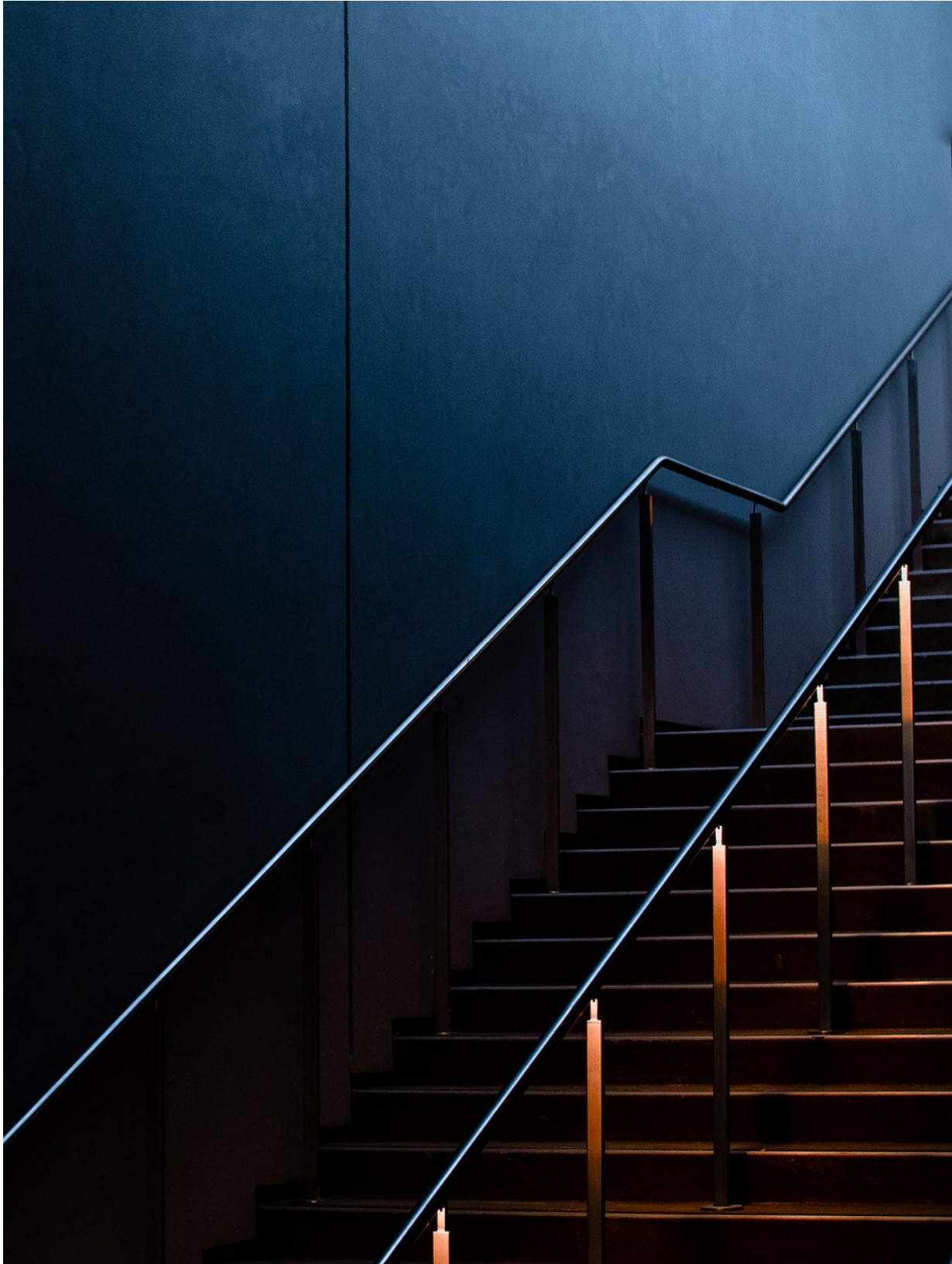

entrée	The right to enter.

means of access	An instrumentality for accomplishing some end.
means of entry	Considerable capital (wealth or income).
permission to enter	The act of giving a formal (usually written) authorization.
right of entry	The hand that is on the right side of the body.
the opportunity to enter	A possibility due to a favorable combination of circumstances.
way in	Doing as one pleases or chooses.

- captivate** Attract and hold the interest and attention of; charm.

hypnotize	Capture the whole attention of (someone); fascinate. <i>A witness had been hypnotized to enhance his memory.</i>
inviting	Attractive and tempting. <i>An inviting offer.</i>
magician	One who practices magic or sorcery. <i>He was the magician of the fan belt.</i>
mesmerize	Induce hypnosis in. <i>They were mesmerized by his story.</i>
portal	A website or web page providing access or links to other sites. <i>A portal typically has search engines and free email and chat rooms etc.</i>
