### **appearance**

An impression given by someone or something.

*She checked her **appearance** in the mirror.*

### **approach**

An initial proposal or request made to someone.

*I used to trim the plane back to about 50 mph for the final **approach**.*

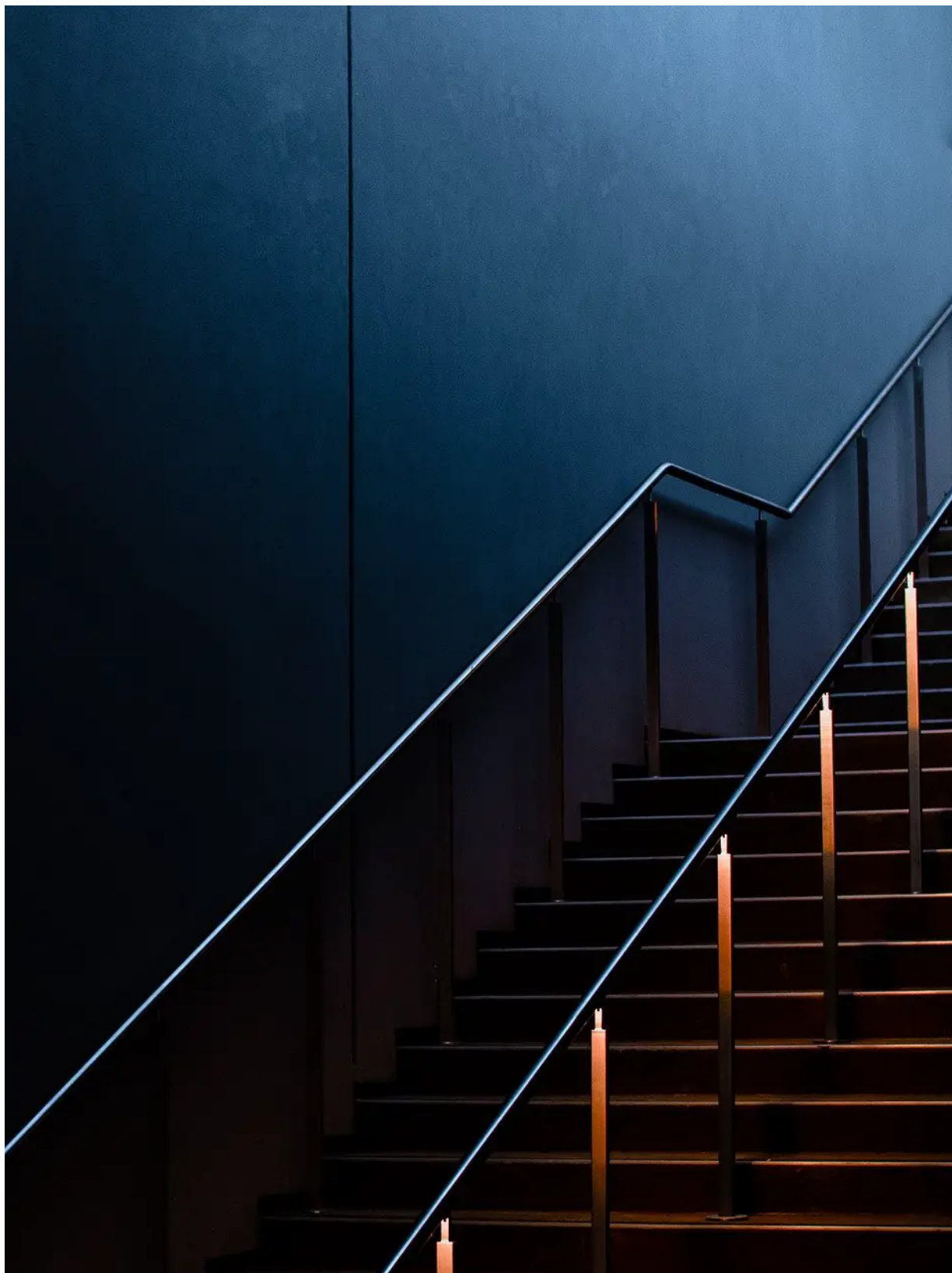
### arrival

The act of arriving at a certain place.

*He was dead on **arrival** at hospital.*

<b>coming</b>	The temporal property of becoming nearer in time. <i>The <b>coming</b> of a new age.</i>
<b>coming in</b>	The temporal property of becoming nearer in time.
<b>entering</b>	The act of entering.
<b>entranceway</b>	A door or corridor at the entrance to a building.
<b>entree</b>	The act of entering. <i>She made a graceful <b>entree</b> into the ballroom.</i>
<b>entry</b>	The forward part of a ship's hull below the waterline, considered in terms of breadth or narrowness. <i>Beggars waited just outside the <b>entryway</b> to the cathedral.</i>
<a href="#"><u>entryway</u></a>	A way in to somewhere or something; an entrance. <i>Beggars waited just outside the <b>entryway</b> to the cathedral.</i>
<b>entrée</b>	The right to enter.
<b>going in</b>	Euphemistic expressions for death.
<b>incoming</b>	Revenue; income. <i>Keep an account of your <b>incomings</b> and outgoings.</i>
<b>ingress</b>	The action or fact of going in or entering; the capacity or right of entrance.
<b>introduction</b>	The act of putting one thing into another. <i>The <b>introduction</b> of muskrats into central Europe.</i>
<b>materialization</b>	An appearance in bodily form (as of a disembodied spirit). <i>The <b>materialization</b> of her dream.</i>
<b>means of access</b>	An instrumentality for accomplishing some end.
<b>means of entry</b>	Considerable capital (wealth or income).
<b>permission to enter</b>	The act of giving a formal (usually written) authorization.
<b>right of entry</b>	The hand that is on the right side of the body.
<b>the opportunity to enter</b>	A possibility due to a favorable combination of circumstances.
<b>way in</b>	Doing as one pleases or chooses.

**becharm** Control by magic spells, as by practicing witchcraft.

**beguile** Attract; cause to be enamored.

*They were **beguiled** into signing a peace treaty.*



<b><u>bewitch</u></b>	Cast a spell over someone or something; put a hex on someone or something. <i>A handsome prince who had been <b>bewitched</b> by a sorceress.</i>
<b><u>captivate</u></b>	Attract and hold the interest and attention of; charm. <i>He was <b>captivated</b> by her beauty.</i>
<b>capture</b>	Capture as if by hunting snaring or trapping. <i>She did a series of sketches trying to <b>capture</b> all his moods.</i>
<b>catch</b>	Discover or come upon accidentally suddenly or unexpectedly catch somebody doing something or in a certain state. <i>Who is <b>catching</b>.</i>
<b><u>charm</u></b>	Protect through supernatural powers or charms. <i>She <b>charmed</b> him into giving her all his money.</i>
<b>enamor</b>	Attract cause to be enamored.
<b>enamour</b>	Have a liking or admiration for. <i>She was truly <b>enamoured</b> of New York.</i>
<b><u>enchant</u></b>	Put (someone or something) under a spell; bewitch. <i>Isabel was <b>enchanted</b> with the idea.</i>
<b><u>fascinate</u></b>	Attract the strong attention and interest of (someone). <i>I ve always been <b>fascinated</b> by computers.</i>
<b>spellbind</b>	Hold the complete attention of (someone) as though by magic; fascinate. <i>The singer held the audience spellbound.</i>
<b><u>trance</u></b>	Put into a trance. <i>She s been <b>tranced</b> and may need waking.</i>

<b>allure</b>	Dispose or incline or entice to. <i>Will sponsors really be <b>allured</b> by such opportunities.</i>

<b>captivate</b>	Attract; cause to be enamored. <i>He was <b>captivated</b> by her beauty.</i>
<b>charisma</b>	A personal attractiveness or interestingness that enables you to influence others. <i>He has tremendous <b>charisma</b> and stage presence.</i>
<b>charm</b>	Protect through supernatural powers or charms. <i>The <b>charm</b> begins with ritual instructions.</i>
<b>enchant</b>	Hold spellbound. <i>Marcia had <b>enchanted</b> the rope so that it simply regenerated when any length was cut off.</i>
<b>enthrall</b>	Hold spellbound.
<b>entree</b>	The act of entering. <i>She made a graceful <b>entree</b> into the ballroom.</i>
<b>fascinate</b>	(especially of a snake) deprive (prey) of the ability to resist or escape by the power of a gaze. <i>I've always been <b>fascinated</b> by computers.</i>
<b>gate</b>	A gateway. <i>A departure <b>gate</b>.</i>
<b>gateway</b>	An entrance that can be closed by a gate. <i>Mombasa the <b>gateway</b> to East Africa.</i>
<b>hypnotize</b>	Capture the whole attention of (someone); fascinate. <i>A witness had been <b>hypnotized</b> to enhance his memory.</i>
<b>inviting</b>	Attractive and tempting. <i>An <b>inviting</b> offer.</i>
<b>magician</b>	One who practices magic or sorcery. <i>He was the <b>magician</b> of the fan belt.</i>
<b>mesmerize</b>	Induce hypnosis in. <i>They were <b>mesmerized</b> by his story.</i>
<b>portal</b>	A website or web page providing access or links to other sites. <i>A <b>portal</b> typically has search engines and free email and chat rooms etc.</i>
<b>seduction</b>	An act of winning the love or sexual favor of someone. <i>She was planning a <b>seduction</b>.</i>

- wile** Lure; entice.  
*The devious **wiles** of the politicians.*
- window** A framework of wood or metal that contains a glass windowpane and is built into a wall or roof to admit light or air.
