## Entreat as a Verb

### Definitions of "Entreat" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “entreat” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Ask someone earnestly or anxiously to do something.*
- *Ask for or request earnestly.*
- *Treat (someone) in a specified manner.*
- *Ask earnestly or anxiously for (something).*

### Synonyms of "Entreat" as a verb (12 Words)

<b>adjure</b>	Urge or request (someone) solemnly or earnestly to do something. <i>I <b>adjure</b> you to tell me the truth.</i>
<b>ask</b>	Require or ask for as a price or condition. <i>How much further I <b>asked</b>.</i>
<b>beg</b>	Acquire food or money from someone by begging. <i><b>Beg</b> the point in the discussion.</i>
<b>beseech</b>	Ask (someone) urgently and fervently to do something; implore; entreat. <i>They earnestly <b>beseeched</b> his forgiveness.</i>

<b>bid</b>	Make a statement during the auction undertaking to make a certain number of tricks with a stated suit as trumps if the bid is successful and one becomes the declarer. <i>She s now <b>bidding</b> to become a top female model.</i>
<b>conjure</b>	Implore (someone) to do something. <i>Anne <b>conjured</b> up a delicious home made hotpot.</i>
<b>implore</b>	Call upon in supplication; entreat. <i>I <b>implore</b> mercy.</i>
<b>plead with</b>	Appeal or request earnestly.
<b>pray</b>	Address a prayer to God or another deity. <i>The whole family are <b>praying</b> for Michael.</i>
<b>press</b>	Manufacture something especially a record by moulding under pressure. <i>Her body <b>pressed</b> against his.</i>
<b>request</b>	Politely or formally ask for. <i>He received the information he had <b>requested</b>.</i>
<b>supplicate</b>	Ask humbly (for something). <i>The plutocracy <b>supplicated</b> to be made peers.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Entreat" as a verb

- *His friends entreated him not to go.*
- *The King, I fear, hath ill entreated her.*
- *A message had been sent, entreating aid for the Navahos.*

## Associations of "Entreat" (30 Words)

<b>adjure</b>	Command solemnly. <i>I <b>adjure</b> you to tell me the truth.</i>
<b>appeal</b>	Request earnestly (something from somebody); ask for aid or protection. <i>An <b>appeal</b> to the public to keep calm.</i>
<b>ask</b>	Require or ask for as a price or condition. <i>He <b>asked</b> to see the officer involved.</i>
<b>asking</b>	The verbal act of requesting.
<b>beg</b>	Acquire food or money from someone by begging. <i>I must <b>beg</b> of you not to act impulsively.</i>
<b>beseech</b>	Ask for or request earnestly. <i>They earnestly <b>beseech</b>ed his forgiveness.</i>

<b>cadge</b>	A padded wooden frame on which hooded hawks are carried to the field. <i>He <b>cadged</b> fivers off old school friends.</i>
<b>conjure</b>	Summon into action or bring into existence, often as if by magic. <i>He <b>conjured</b> wild birds in the air.</i>
<b>demand</b>	The act of demanding. <i>A complex activity <b>demanding</b> detailed knowledge.</i>
<b>entreaty</b>	An earnest or humble request. <i>An <b>entreaty</b> to stop the fighting.</i>
<b>exhortation</b>	A communication intended to urge or persuade the recipients to take some action. <i><b>Exhortations</b> to consumers to switch off electrical appliances.</i>
<b>implore</b>	Beg earnestly for. <i>He <b>implored</b> her to change her mind.</i>
<b>invitation</b>	A tempting allurement. <i>An <b>invitation</b> to lunch.</i>
<b>invite</b>	Invite someone to one's house. <i>Can I <b>invite</b> you for dinner on Sunday night.</i>
<b>necessary</b>	(of an agent) having no independent volition. <i>A <b>necessary</b> consequence.</i>
<b>perforce</b>	Used to express necessity or inevitability. <i>Amateurs <b>perforce</b> have to settle for less expensive solutions.</i>
<b>petition</b>	Reverent petition to a deity. <i>The Act allowed couples to <b>petition</b> for divorce after one year of marriage.</i>
<b>plea</b>	A formal statement by or on behalf of a defendant or prisoner, stating guilt or innocence in response to a charge, offering an allegation of fact, or claiming that a point of law should apply. <i>He changed his <b>plea</b> to not guilty.</i>
<b>plead</b>	Make an allegation in an action or other legal proceeding especially answer the previous pleading of the other party by denying facts therein stated or by alleging new facts. <i>He <b>pleaded</b> family commitments as a reason for not attending.</i>
<b>please</b>	Used to express incredulity or irritation. <i>This is the first time in ages that I can just <b>please</b> myself.</i>
<b>pray</b>	Address a deity a prophet a saint or an object of worship say a prayer. <i>After several days of rain we were <b>praying</b> for sun.</i>
<b>prayer</b>	A religious service, especially a regular one, at which people gather in order to pray together. <i>I ll say a <b>prayer</b> for him.</i>

<b>request</b>	A formal message requesting something that is submitted to an authority. <i>Human intelligence which is in constant <b>request</b> in a family.</i>
<b>require</b>	Require as useful just or proper. <i>The care and diligence <b>required</b> of him as a trustee.</i>
<b>solicit</b>	Make a solicitation or entreaty for something request urgently or persistently. <i>Historians and critics are <b>solicited</b> for opinions by the auction houses.</i>
<b>solicitation</b>	Request for a sum of money. <i>People objected to receiving telephone <b>solicitations</b>.</i>
<b>suppliant</b>	One praying humbly for something. <i>A <b>suppliant</b> for her favors.</i>
<b>supplicant</b>	One praying humbly for something. <i>We are equals and not <b>supplicants</b> begging for work.</i>
<b>supplicate</b>	Ask humbly (for something). <i>The plutocracy <b>supplicated</b> to be made peers.</i>
<b>woo</b>	Try to gain the love of (someone), especially with a view to marriage. <i>He <b>wooed</b> her with quotes from Shakespeare.</i>
