- *(thermodynamics) a thermodynamic quantity representing the amount of energy in a system that is no longer available for doing mechanical work.*

- *(in information theory) a logarithmic measure of the rate of transfer of information in a particular message or language.*

(Greek mythology) the most ancient of gods; the personification of the infinity of space preceding creation of the universe.

*Snow caused **chaos** in the region.*

The act of making a noisy disturbance.

*Damage caused by civil **commotion**.*

<u>disarray</u>	A mental state characterized by a lack of clear and orderly thought and behavior. <i>His plans have been thrown into disarray.</i>
disorder	An illness or condition that disrupts normal physical or mental functions. <i>Skin disorders.</i>
disorderliness	Rowdy behavior.
<u>disorganization</u>	A condition in which an orderly system has been disrupted. <i>The evacuation was dogged by chaos and disorganization.</i>
disruption	Disturbance or problems which interrupt an event, activity, or process. <i>He gave hints on what industry today he believes may be ripe for disruption.</i>
<u>frenzy</u>	A state or period of uncontrolled excitement or wild behaviour. <i>Doreen worked herself into a frenzy of rage.</i>
furore	An outbreak of public anger or excitement. <i>It was little thought that they would excite such a furore among stamp collectors.</i>
<u>havoc</u>	Great confusion or disorder. <i>The hurricane ripped through Florida causing havoc.</i>
information	In information theory a mathematical quantity expressing the probability of occurrence of a particular sequence of symbols impulses etc as against that of alternative sequences. <i>Genetically transmitted information.</i>
<u>madness</u>	A feeling of intense anger. <i>In his madness he destroyed the work of years.</i>
maelstrom	A situation or state of confused movement or violent turmoil. <i>The train station was a maelstrom of crowds.</i>
<u>mayhem</u>	The willful and unlawful crippling or mutilation of another person. <i>Complete mayhem broke out.</i>
mess	A meal eaten in a mess hall by service personnel. <i>A mess of mashed black beans and rice.</i>
muddle	A mistake arising from or resulting in confusion. <i>She was able to cut through confusion and muddle.</i>
pandemonium	A state of extreme confusion and disorder. <i>There was complete pandemonium everyone just panicked.</i>
randomness	(thermodynamics) a thermodynamic quantity representing the amount of energy in a system that is no longer available for doing mechanical work. <i>We accept randomness in our own lives but we crave logic in art.</i>

s	A thermodynamic quantity representing the amount of energy in a system that is no longer available for doing mechanical work. <i>Entropy increases as matter and energy in the universe degrade to an ultimate state of inert uniformity.</i>
shambles	A state of total disorder. <i>The shambles where the animals were slaughtered.</i>
tumult	Violent agitation. <i>His personal tumult ended when he began writing songs.</i>
<u>turmoil</u>	A state of great disturbance, confusion, or uncertainty. <i>He endured years of inner turmoil.</i>
untidiness	The trait of being untidy and messy.
<u>upheaval</u>	Disturbance usually in protest. <i>The first upheaval produced a hill which was called Roof Mountain.</i>
<u>uproar</u>	A state of commotion and noise and confusion. <i>It caused an uproar in the press.</i>
