- A numerical measure of the uncertainty of an outcome.
- (communication theory) a numerical measure of the uncertainty of an outcome.
- (thermodynamics) a thermodynamic quantity representing the amount of energy in a system that is no longer available for doing mechanical work.
- A thermodynamic quantity representing the amount of energy in a system that is no longer available for doing mechanical work.
- (in information theory) a logarithmic measure of the rate of transfer of information in a particular message or language.
- Lack of order or predictability; gradual decline into disorder.
