desirable	Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse. <i>A desirable outcome.</i>

worth having	Having a specified value.

blazon	Describe or depict (armorial bearings) in a correct heraldic manner. <i>Accounts of their ordeal were blazoned to the entire nation.</i>
blowhard	A boastful or pompous person. <i>Blowhard politicians.</i>
bluster	A swaggering show of courage. <i>The flames blustered.</i>
boast	Show off. <i>The hotel boasts high standards of comfort.</i>
boastful	Exhibiting self-importance. <i>A boastful letter.</i>
bombast	High-sounding language with little meaning, used to impress people. <i>The bombast of gung ho militarism.</i>
brag	An instance of boastful talk. <i>His brag is worse than his fight.</i>
braggadocio	Boastful or arrogant behaviour.
braggart	A person who boasts about their achievements or possessions. <i>Braggart men.</i>

bragging	Exhibiting or characterized by excessive pride or boastfulness. <i>A little honest bragging doesn't hurt anyone.</i>
bravado	A bold manner or a show of boldness intended to impress or intimidate. <i>He possesses none of the classic wheeler dealer's casual bravado.</i>
condescending	Having or showing an attitude of patronizing superiority. <i>She thought the teachers were arrogant and condescending.</i>
crow	Express pleasure verbally. <i>She crowed with joy.</i>
desirable	A desirable person or thing. <i>It is desirable to check that nothing has been forgotten.</i>
display	Attract attention by displaying some body part or posing of animals. <i>Made a display of strength.</i>
esteem	The condition of being honored, esteemed or respected or well regarded. <i>He was held in high esteem by colleagues.</i>
exaggeration	The action of making exaggerations. <i>It would be an exaggeration to say I had morning sickness but I did feel queasy.</i>
flippancy	Inappropriate levity. <i>She was infuriated by his careless flippancy.</i>
gasconade	Show off. <i>Whenever he won we were exposed to his gasconade.</i>
pontificate	Talk in a dogmatic and pompous manner. <i>The new professor always pontificates.</i>
pride	Be proud of. <i>In the pride of youth.</i>
proud	Of an event, achievement, etc., causing someone to feel proud. <i>Balls standing proud of the fabric.</i>
proudly	In an imposing manner; splendidly. <i>Ray watched proudly from the sidelines as his son won the singles title.</i>
raffish	Marked by up-to-dateness in dress and manners. <i>A cocktail party given by some raffish bachelors.</i>
reputation	The state of being held in high esteem and honor. <i>His knowledge of his subject earned him a reputation as an expert.</i>
strut	Brace something with a strut or struts. <i>That old confident strut and swagger has returned.</i>
swagger	A very confident and arrogant or self-important gait or manner. <i>They strolled around the camp with an exaggerated swagger.</i>
