### Synonyms of "Envision" as a verb (13 Words)

<b>conjure up an image of</b>	Summon into action or bring into existence, often as if by magic.
<b>envisage</b>	Form a mental picture of (something not yet existing or known. <i>The Rome Treaty <b>envisaged</b> free movement across frontiers.</i>
<b>fancy</b>	Have a fancy or particular liking or desire for. <i>I <b>fancy</b> him to win the tournament.</i>
<b>figure</b>	Imagine; conceive of; see in one's mind. <i>For years teachers had <b>figured</b> him for a dullard.</i>
<b><a href="#">foresee</a></b>	Act in advance of; deal with ahead of time. <i>It is impossible to <b>foresee</b> how life will work out.</i>

<b>image</b>	Render visible, as by means of MRI. <i>Artworks which <b>imaged</b> women s bodies.</i>
<b>imagine</b>	Expect, believe, or suppose. <i>I couldn t <b>imagine</b> what she expected to tell them.</i>
<b>picture</b>	Represent in a photograph or picture. <i>Biographers have <b>pictured</b> him as a St Francis.</i>
<b>project</b>	Make a projection of the earth sky etc on a plane surface. <i>In the later 1930s many new road schemes were <b>projected</b>.</i>
<b>see</b>	Go to see a place as for entertainment. <i>I ll probably <b>see</b> you at the meeting.</i>
<b>see in one's mind's eye</b>	Get to know or become aware of, usually accidentally.
<b>visualise</b>	View the outline of by means of an X-ray.
<b>visualize</b>	Make (something) visible to the eye. <i>The DNA was <b>visualized</b> by staining with ethidium bromide.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Envision" as a verb

- *I cannot envision him as President.*
- *She envisioned the admiring glances of guests seeing her home.*

## Associations of "Envision" (30 Words)

<b>abstractly</b>	In abstract terms.
<b>assuming</b>	Arrogant or presumptuous. <i>On a subject like this it would be too <b>assuming</b> for me to decide.</i>
<b>characterization</b>	Acting the part of a character on stage; dramatically representing the character by speech and action and gesture. <i>He preferred to emphasize <b>characterization</b> and human conflict.</i>
<b>conceivable</b>	Capable of being imagined. <i>The body was photographed from every <b>conceivable</b> angle.</i>
<b>conceive</b>	Judge or regard; look upon; judge. <i>We could not <b>conceive</b> of such things happening to us.</i>
<b>daguerreotype</b>	A photograph made by an early photographic process; the image was produced on a silver plate sensitized to iodine and developed in mercury vapor.
<b>delineation</b>	Representation by drawing or painting etc. <i>The artist s exquisite <b>delineation</b> of costume and jewellery.</i>

<b>dream</b>	Have a daydream indulge in a fantasy. <i>He had been walking around in a <b>dream</b> all day.</i>
<b>dreamy</b>	Dreamy in mood or nature. <i>The atmosphere is tranquil and <b>dreamy</b>.</i>
<b>envisage</b>	Form a mental picture of (something not yet existing or known). <i>The Rome Treaty <b>envisaged</b> free movement across frontiers.</i>
<b>fancy</b>	Have a fancy or particular liking or desire for. <i><b>Fancy</b> goldfish.</i>
<b>fantasy</b>	The faculty or activity of imagining impossible or improbable things. <i>The notion of being independent is a child's ultimate <b>fantasy</b>.</i>
<b>faun</b>	One of a class of lustful rural gods, represented as a man with a goat's horns, ears, legs, and tail.
<b>ideational</b>	Being of the nature of a notion or concept. <i>Policy has been shaped by both material and <b>ideational</b> factors.</i>
<b>illustrator</b>	An artist who makes illustrations (for books or magazines or advertisements etc.)
<b>image</b>	The general impression that a person, organization, or product presents to the public. <i>A movie is a series of <b>images</b> projected so rapidly that the eye integrates them.</i>
<b>imagery</b>	Visually descriptive or figurative language, especially in a literary work. <i>Tennyson uses <b>imagery</b> to create a lyrical emotion.</i>
<b>imagine</b>	Suppose or assume. <i>After Ned died everyone <b>imagined</b> that Mabel would move away.</i>
<b>improbably</b>	In an unexpected or unlikely manner. <i>Monasteries perch <b>improbably</b> on crags and cliff tops.</i>
<b>jigsaw</b>	Fine-toothed power saw with a narrow blade; used to cut curved outlines. <i>Time is passed by doing <b>jigsaws</b>.</i>
<b>picture</b>	Represent in a photograph or picture. <i>I'm going to the <b>pictures</b> with my mates.</i>
<b>pixel</b>	The smallest discrete component of an image or picture on a CRT screen (usually a colored dot). <i>The greater the number of <b>pixels</b> per inch the greater the resolution.</i>
<b>portraitist</b>	A painter, photographer, etc., who specializes in or is particularly skilled at portraits. <i>Gerda is working as a <b>portraitist</b> of prominent citizens.</i>

<b>portraiture</b>	A word picture of a person's appearance and character. <i>His strength as a novelist lay in his <b>portraiture</b> of upper class families.</i>
<b>portray</b>	Portray in words. <i>The ineffectual Oxbridge dons <b>portrayed</b> by Evelyn Waugh.</i>
<b>presuppose</b>	Take for granted or as a given; suppose beforehand. <i>Your argument <b>presupposes</b> that it does not matter who is in power.</i>
<b><u>supposedly</u></b>	Believed or reputed to be the case. <i>There were rumours of a rift between him and his colleagues <b>supposedly</b> because they were jealous of his relationship with the Duchess.</i>
<b><u>surreal</u></b>	Having the qualities of surrealism bizarre. <i>As irrational and <b>surreal</b> as a dream.</i>
<b><u>visionary</u></b>	A person given to fanciful speculations and enthusiasms with little regard for what is actually possible. <i>He is a <b>visionary</b> keen on policy making.</i>
<b><u>visualize</u></b>	Form a mental image of; imagine. <i>Mathematicians often <b>visualize</b>.</i>
