conjure up an image of	Summon into action or bring into existence, often as if by magic.
envisage	Form a mental picture of (something not yet existing or known. <i>The Rome Treaty envisaged free movement across frontiers.</i>
fancy	Have a fancy or particular liking or desire for. <i>I fancy him to win the tournament.</i>
figure	Imagine; conceive of; see in one's mind. <i>For years teachers had figured him for a dullard.</i>
foresee	Act in advance of; deal with ahead of time. <i>It is impossible to foresee how life will work out.</i>

image	Render visible, as by means of MRI. <i>Artworks which imaged women s bodies.</i>
imagine	Expect, believe, or suppose. <i>I couldn t imagine what she expected to tell them.</i>
picture	Represent in a photograph or picture. <i>Biographers have pictured him as a St Francis.</i>
project	Make a projection of the earth sky etc on a plane surface. <i>In the later 1930s many new road schemes were projected.</i>
see	Go to see a place as for entertainment. <i>I ll probably see you at the meeting.</i>
see in one's mind's eye	Get to know or become aware of, usually accidentally.
visualise	View the outline of by means of an X-ray.
visualize	Make (something) visible to the eye. <i>The DNA was visualized by staining with ethidium bromide.</i>

abstractly	In abstract terms.
assuming	Arrogant or presumptuous. <i>On a subject like this it would be too assuming for me to decide.</i>
characterization	Acting the part of a character on stage; dramatically representing the character by speech and action and gesture. <i>He preferred to emphasize characterization and human conflict.</i>
conceivable	Capable of being imagined. <i>The body was photographed from every conceivable angle.</i>
conceive	Judge or regard; look upon; judge. <i>We could not conceive of such things happening to us.</i>
daguerreotype	A photograph made by an early photographic process; the image was produced on a silver plate sensitized to iodine and developed in mercury vapor.
delineation	Representation by drawing or painting etc. <i>The artist s exquisite delineation of costume and jewellery.</i>

dream	Have a daydream indulge in a fantasy. <i>He had been walking around in a dream all day.</i>
dreamy	Dreamy in mood or nature. <i>The atmosphere is tranquil and dreamy.</i>

fancy	Have a fancy or particular liking or desire for. <i>Fancy goldfish.</i>
fantasy	The faculty or activity of imagining impossible or improbable things. <i>The notion of being independent is a child's ultimate fantasy.</i>
faun	One of a class of lustful rural gods, represented as a man with a goat's horns, ears, legs, and tail.
ideational	Being of the nature of a notion or concept. <i>Policy has been shaped by both material and ideational factors.</i>
illustrator	An artist who makes illustrations (for books or magazines or advertisements etc.
image	The general impression that a person, organization, or product presents to the public. <i>A movie is a series of images projected so rapidly that the eye integrates them.</i>
imagery	Visually descriptive or figurative language, especially in a literary work. <i>Tennyson uses imagery to create a lyrical emotion.</i>
imagine	Suppose or assume. <i>After Ned died everyone imagined that Mabel would move away.</i>
improbably	In an unexpected or unlikely manner. <i>Monasteries perch improbably on crags and cliff tops.</i>
jigsaw	Fine-toothed power saw with a narrow blade; used to cut curved outlines. <i>Time is passed by doing jigsaws.</i>
picture	Represent in a photograph or picture. <i>I'm going to the pictures with my mates.</i>
pixel	The smallest discrete component of an image or picture on a CRT screen (usually a colored dot). <i>The greater the number of pixels per inch the greater the resolution.</i>
portraitist	A painter, photographer, etc., who specializes in or is particularly skilled at portraits. <i>Gerda is working as a portraitist of prominent citizens.</i>

portraiture	A word picture of a person's appearance and character. <i>His strength as a novelist lay in his portraiture of upper class families.</i>
portray	Portray in words. <i>The ineffectual Oxbridge dons portrayed by Evelyn Waugh.</i>
presuppose	Take for granted or as a given; suppose beforehand. <i>Your argument presupposes that it does not matter who is in power.</i>
<u>supposedly</u>	Believed or reputed to be the case. <i>There were rumours of a rift between him and his colleagues supposedly because they were jealous of his relationship with the Duchess.</i>
<u>surreal</u>	Having the qualities of surrealism bizarre. <i>As irrational and surreal as a dream.</i>
<u>visionary</u>	A person given to fanciful speculations and enthusiasms with little regard for what is actually possible. <i>He is a visionary keen on policy making.</i>
<u>visualize</u>	Form a mental image of; imagine. <i>Mathematicians often visualize.</i>
