epicentre The point on the earth's surface vertically above the focus of an earthquake.
*The **epicentre** of labour militancy was the capital itself.*

aftershock	A tremor (or one of a series of tremors) occurring after the main shock of an earthquake.
avalanche	Engulf or carry off by an avalanche. <i>We have had an avalanche of applications for the post.</i>
cataclysmic	Severely destructive. <i>A novel about a cataclysmic world war.</i>
disaster	A sudden accident or a natural catastrophe that causes great damage or loss of life. <i>The earthquake was a disaster.</i>
earthquake	Shaking and vibration at the surface of the earth resulting from underground movement along a fault plane or from volcanic activity. <i>Selling the company caused an earthquake among the employees.</i>
geologic	Of or relating to or based on geology. <i>Geological formations.</i>
landslide	An overwhelming electoral victory. <i>Roosevelt defeated Hoover in a landslide.</i>
location	A determination of the place where something is. <i>The property is set in a convenient location.</i>
meteorology	The climate and weather of a region. <i>An induction course to learn basic meteorology.</i>
oscillation	A regular periodic variation in value about a mean. <i>The natural oscillation of a spring.</i>
quake	An earthquake. <i>A little quake of delayed shock nudged her.</i>
quiver	A shaky motion. <i>She couldn't help the quiver in her voice.</i>
ripple	A thing resembling a ripple or ripples in appearance or movement. <i>A ripple of laughter ran around the room.</i>
seismic	Of enormous proportions or effect. <i>Seismic data show the deep structure of rift systems.</i>
seismograph	A measuring instrument for detecting and measuring the intensity and direction and duration of movements of the ground (as an earthquake).
seismology	The branch of geology that studies earthquakes.
shake	A milkshake. <i>Camera shake causes the image to become blurred.</i>

<u>shaking</u>	The act of causing something to move up and down (or back and forth) with quick movements. <i>The shaking of his fingers as he lit his pipe.</i>
shiver	An almost pleasurable sensation of fright. <i>They shivered in the damp foggy cold.</i>
<u>shudder</u>	An act of shuddering. <i>The train shuddered and edged forward.</i>
<u>tremble</u>	A reflex motion caused by cold or fear or excitement. <i>I tremble to think that we could ever return to conditions like these.</i>
tremor	Undergo a tremor or tremors. <i>A muscle in my jaw tremored uncontrollably.</i>
tremulous	(of the voice) quivering as from weakness or fear. <i>Barbara's voice was tremulous.</i>
<u>tsunami</u>	A cataclysm resulting from a destructive sea wave caused by an earthquake or volcanic eruption. <i>A tsunami of data pours into the CNBC newsroom every minute of every trading day.</i>
unrepaired	Unserviceable because necessary repairs have not been made.
<u>vibration</u>	A shaky motion. <i>Powerful vibrations from an earthquake.</i>
volcanic	Relating to or produced by or consisting of volcanoes. <i>Types of volcanic activity.</i>
wavelet	A small wave of water; a ripple.
wobble	An unsteady rocking motion. <i>They wobble around on their bikes.</i>
