- *A brief section of a literary or dramatic work that forms part of a connected series.*
- *Film consisting of a succession of related shots that develop a given subject in a movie.*
- *A section between two choric songs in Greek tragedy.*
- *Each of the separate instalments into which a serialized story or radio or television programme is divided.*
- *A finite period in which someone is affected by a specified illness.*
- *A happening that is distinctive in a series of related events.*
- *An event or a group of events occurring as part of a sequence; an incident or period considered in isolation.*
- *A part of a broadcast serial.*
- *A passage containing distinct material or introducing a new subject.*

| incident | An instance of something happening; an event or occurrence. <i>There was not one incident of teasing from the 90 pupils.</i> |
| installment | The act of installing something (as equipment). |
| instalment | Any of several parts of something which are published, broadcast, or made public in sequence at intervals. <i>Filming the final instalment in his Vietnam trilogy.</i> |
| interlude | An intervening period or episode. <i>Short instrumental interludes between songs.</i> |
| interval | A component of activity in interval training. <i>The day should be dry with sunny intervals.</i> |
| occasion | A special or noteworthy event, ceremony, or celebration. <i>It s the first time that I ve had occasion to complain.</i> |
| occurrence | An event that happens. <i>The occurrence of natural gas fields.</i> |
| passage | A narrow way allowing access between buildings or to different rooms within a building a passageway. <i>I booked a passage on the next ship.</i> |
| period | The interval between successive equal values of a periodic function. <i>She s got her period.</i> |
| phase | A structure containing two verbs in a phase. <i>The final phases of the war.</i> |
| scene | The pieces of scenery used in a play or opera. <i>He painted scenes from everyday life.</i> |
| section | A small team of policemen working as part of a police platoon. <i>He ate a section of the orange.</i> |
| sequence | (in the Eucharist) a hymn said or sung after the Gradual or Alleluia that precedes the Gospel. <i>The famous underwater sequence.</i> |

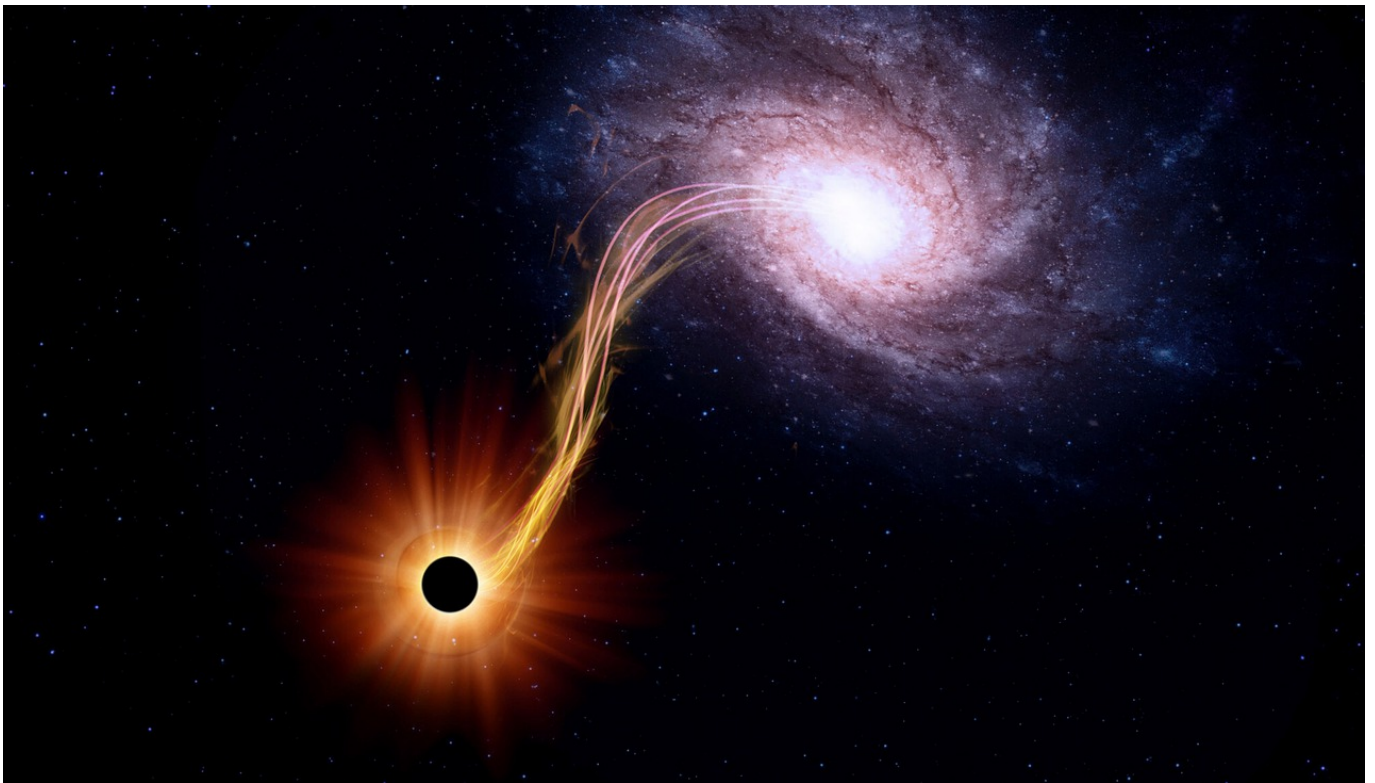
A period of indeterminate length (usually short) marked by some action or condition.

| continual | Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption. <i>Continual is often used interchangeably with continuous.</i> |
| continuation | A part that is attached to and is an extension of something else. <i>The government s continuation in office.</i> |
| continuity | The maintenance of continuous action and self-consistent detail in the various scenes of a film or broadcast. <i>A consensus favouring continuity of policy.</i> |
| continuous | Of a function or curve; extending without break or irregularity. <i>A continuous rearrangement of electrons in the solar atoms results in the emission of light.</i> |
| event | A thing that happens or takes place, especially one of importance. <i>The momentous political events of the late 1980s.</i> |
| genome | The haploid set of chromosomes in a gamete or microorganism, or in each cell of a multicellular organism. <i>The human genome contains approximately three billion chemical base pairs.</i> |
| happen | Happen occur or be the case in the course of events or by chance Santayana. <i>The accident happened at 7 40 a m.</i> |
| happening | An event that happens. <i>A multimedia happening.</i> |
| homologous | Having the same evolutionary origin but not necessarily the same function. <i>A seal s flipper is homologous with the human arm.</i> |
| incidence | The striking of a light beam on a surface. <i>An increased incidence of cancer.</i> |
| incident | A violent event, such as a fracas or assault. <i>The costs properly incident to a suit for foreclosure or redemption.</i> |
| incidental | An incidental expense event etc. <i>Incidental expenses.</i> |
| list | Give a building company etc listed status. <i>The ship listed to starboard.</i> |
