<b><u>abstract</u></b>	An abstract work of art. An <b>abstract</b> of her speech.
<b>compendium</b>	A collection of concise but detailed information about a particular subject, especially in a book or other publication. A <b>compendium</b> of tools.
<b><u>digest</u></b>	A substance or mixture obtained by digestion. A <b>digest</b> of cloned DNA.
<b>embodiment</b>	A tangible or visible form of an idea, quality, or feeling. The <b>embodiment</b> of hope.
<b><u>image</u></b>	A personal facade that one presents to the world. I had a sudden <b>image</b> of Sal bringing me breakfast in bed.
<b><u>incarnation</u></b>	With reference to reincarnation each of a series of earthly lifetimes. In a previous journalistic <b>incarnation</b> I worked at Westminster.
<b>outline</b>	A line or set of lines enclosing or indicating the shape of an object in a sketch or diagram. An <b>outline</b> of parliamentary procedure.

<b><u>paradigm</u></b>	The class of all items that can be substituted into the same position or slot in a grammatical sentence are in paradigmatic relation with one another. <i>Society's <b>paradigm</b> of the ideal woman.</i>
<b><u>paragon</u></b>	An ideal instance; a perfect embodiment of a concept. <i>It would have taken a <b>paragon</b> of virtue not to feel viciously jealous.</i>
<b>personification</b>	The attribution of a personal nature or human characteristics to something non-human, or the representation of an abstract quality in human form. <i>She is the <b>personification</b> of optimism.</i>
<b>potted version</b>	Metal or earthenware cooking vessel that is usually round and deep; often has a handle and lid.
<b>precis</b>	A sketchy summary of the main points of an argument or theory.
<b>prototype</b>	The first, original, or typical form of something; an archetype. <i>The construction of bandpass networks from low pass <b>prototypes</b>.</i>
<b>recapitulation</b>	The repetition of an evolutionary or other process during development or growth. <i>His <b>recapitulation</b> of the argument.</i>
<b>résumé</b>	Short descriptive summary (of events).
<b>summary</b>	A brief statement that presents the main points in a concise form. <i>He gave a <b>summary</b> of the conclusions.</i>
<b><u>summation</u></b>	The arithmetic operation of summing; calculating the sum of two or more numbers. <i>The <b>summation</b> of four and three gives seven.</i>
<b><u>synopsis</u></b>	An outline of the plot of a play, film, or book. <i>A <b>synopsis</b> of the insurance cover provided is set out below.</i>

<b><u>absolute</u></b>	Not limited by law. <i><b>Absolute</b> freedom.</i>
<b>advisory</b>	An official announcement or warning. <i>The EC has put forward an <b>advisory</b> maximum figure.</i>
<b><u>archetype</u></b>	A very typical example of a certain person or thing. <i>He was the <b>archetype</b> of the old style football club chairman.</i>

<b><u>chart</u></b>	Plot a course on a chart. <i>The poems <b>chart</b> his descent into madness.</i>
<b>emulation</b>	Reproduction of the function or action of a different computer, software system, etc. <i>A model worthy of <b>emulation</b>.</i>
<b>example</b>	An occurrence of something. <i>They decided to make an <b>example</b> of him.</i>
<b><u>exemplar</u></b>	Something to be imitated. <i>An <b>exemplar</b> of success.</i>
<b><u>exemplary</u></b>	(of a punishment) serving as a warning or deterrent. <i><b>Exemplary</b> sentencing may discourage the violent minority.</i>
<b>herbarium</b>	A room or building housing a herbarium.
<b>ideal</b>	Conforming to an ultimate standard of perfection or excellence embodying an ideal. <i>Tolerance and freedom the liberal <b>ideals</b>.</i>
<b><u>instance</u></b>	An example or single occurrence of something. <i>A serious <b>instance</b> of corruption.</i>
<b>lattice</b>	An interlaced structure or pattern resembling a lattice. <i>The <b>lattice</b> of branches above her.</i>
<b>mannequin</b>	A life-size dummy used to display clothes. <i>She was too fat to be a <b>mannequin</b>.</i>
<b>model</b>	Plan or create according to a model or models. <i>The body of the woman to the right is <b>modelled</b> in softer riper forms.</i>
<b>mythological</b>	Relating to, based on, or appearing in myths or mythology. <i>The tree of life is one of the oldest of all <b>mythological</b> symbols.</i>
<b><u>paradigm</u></b>	The class of all items that can be substituted into the same position or slot in a grammatical sentence are in paradigmatic relation with one another. <i>Society's <b>paradigm</b> of the ideal woman.</i>
<b>paradigmatic</b>	Related as members of a substitution class. <i>His biography is <b>paradigmatic</b> of the experiences of this generation.</i>
<b><u>paragon</u></b>	A person or thing regarded as a perfect example of a particular quality. <i>It would have taken a <b>paragon</b> of virtue not to feel viciously jealous.</i>
<b>perfect</b>	The perfect tense. <i>A <b>perfect</b> summer's day.</i>
<b>personification</b>	A person or thing regarded as embodying a quality, concept, etc. <i>The knight is accompanied by two feminine <b>personifications</b> of vice.</i>

<b>photogenic</b>	(of an organism or tissue) producing or emitting light. <i>A <b>photogenic</b> child.</i>
<b>prototype</b>	Make a prototype of a product. <i>These objects are the <b>prototypes</b> of a category of rapidly spinning neutron stars.</i>
<b>quintessence</b>	The purest and most concentrated essence of something. <i>We were all brought up to believe that advertising is the <b>quintessence</b> of marketing.</i>
<b>replica</b>	Copy that is not the original; something that has been copied. <i>It is a <b>replica</b> of an antique plaque.</i>
<b>sample</b>	Take a sample of. <i>The input signal must be <b>sampled</b> at twice its highest frequency.</i>
<b>specimen</b>	An example of something regarded as typical of its class or group. <i>Carla could not help feeling a degree of reluctant admiration for this odd female <b>specimen</b>.</i>
<b>spheroid</b>	A solid generated by a half revolution of an ellipse about its major axis prolate spheroid or minor axis oblate spheroid. <i>It looked like a sphere but on closer examination I saw it was really a <b>spheroid</b>.</i>
<b>typify</b>	Represent; symbolize. <i>The sun typified the Greeks, and the moon the Persians.</i>
<b>universality</b>	The quality of being universal; existing everywhere. <i>We affirm the <b>universality</b> of human rights.</i>
<b>verified</b>	Proved to be true. <i>A <b>verified</b> claim.</i>
