| <u>paradigm</u> | The class of all items that can be substituted into the same position or slot in a grammatical sentence are in paradigmatic relation with one another. <i>Society's paradigm of the ideal woman.</i> |
| <u>paragon</u> | An ideal instance; a perfect embodiment of a concept. <i>It would have taken a paragon of virtue not to feel viciously jealous.</i> |
| personification | The attribution of a personal nature or human characteristics to something non-human, or the representation of an abstract quality in human form. <i>She is the personification of optimism.</i> |
| potted version | Metal or earthenware cooking vessel that is usually round and deep; often has a handle and lid. |
| precis | A sketchy summary of the main points of an argument or theory. |
| prototype | The first, original, or typical form of something; an archetype. <i>The construction of bandpass networks from low pass prototypes.</i> |
| recapitulation | The repetition of an evolutionary or other process during development or growth. <i>His recapitulation of the argument.</i> |
| résumé | Short descriptive summary (of events). |
| summary | A brief statement that presents the main points in a concise form. <i>He gave a summary of the conclusions.</i> |
| <u>summation</u> | The arithmetic operation of summing; calculating the sum of two or more numbers. <i>The summation of four and three gives seven.</i> |
| <u>synopsis</u> | An outline of the plot of a play, film, or book. <i>A synopsis of the insurance cover provided is set out below.</i> |

| mannequin | A life-size dummy used to display clothes. <i>She was too fat to be a mannequin.</i> |
| model | Plan or create according to a model or models. <i>The body of the woman to the right is modelled in softer riper forms.</i> |
| mythological | Relating to, based on, or appearing in myths or mythology. <i>The tree of life is one of the oldest of all mythological symbols.</i> |
| paradigm | The class of all items that can be substituted into the same position or slot in a grammatical sentence are in paradigmatic relation with one another. <i>Society's paradigm of the ideal woman.</i> |
| paradigmatic | Related as members of a substitution class. <i>His biography is paradigmatic of the experiences of this generation.</i> |
| paragon | A person or thing regarded as a perfect example of a particular quality. <i>It would have taken a paragon of virtue not to feel viciously jealous.</i> |
| perfect | The perfect tense. <i>A perfect summer's day.</i> |
| personification | A person or thing regarded as embodying a quality, concept, etc. <i>The knight is accompanied by two feminine personifications of vice.</i> |

| <u>photogenic</u> | (of an organism or tissue) producing or emitting light. <i>A photogenic child.</i> |
| prototype | Make a prototype of a product. <i>These objects are the prototypes of a category of rapidly spinning neutron stars.</i> |
| quintessence | The purest and most concentrated essence of something. <i>We were all brought up to believe that advertising is the quintessence of marketing.</i> |
| <u>replica</u> | Copy that is not the original; something that has been copied. <i>It is a replica of an antique plaque.</i> |
| <u>sample</u> | Take a sample of. <i>The input signal must be sampled at twice its highest frequency.</i> |
| <u>specimen</u> | An example of something regarded as typical of its class or group. <i>Carla could not help feeling a degree of reluctant admiration for this odd female specimen.</i> |
| spheroid | A solid generated by a half revolution of an ellipse about its major axis prolate spheroid or minor axis oblate spheroid. <i>It looked like a sphere but on closer examination I saw it was really a spheroid.</i> |
| typify | Represent; symbolize. <i>The sun typified the Greeks, and the moon the Persians.</i> |
| universality | The quality of being universal; existing everywhere. <i>We affirm the universality of human rights.</i> |
| verified | Proved to be true. <i>A verified claim.</i> |
