### Synonyms of "Erroneous" as an adjective (15 Words)

<b>fallacious</b>	Based on an incorrect or misleading notion or information. <b>Fallacious</b> hope.
<b>false</b>	Used in names of plants animals and gems that superficially resemble the thing properly so called e g false oat. A suitcase with a <b>false</b> bottom.
<b>imprecise</b>	Lacking exactness and accuracy of expression or detail. <b>Imprecise</b> astronomical observations.
<b>in error</b>	Directed or bound inward.
<b>inaccurate</b>	Not accurate. The thermometer is <b>inaccurate</b> .

<b><u>incorrect</u></b>	Not in accord with established usage or procedure. <i>An <b>incorrect</b> transcription.</i>
<b>inexact</b>	Not exact. <i>An <b>inexact</b> description.</i>
<b><u>invalid</u></b>	No longer valid. <i>The license is <b>invalid</b>.</i>
<b><u>mistaken</u></b>	Wrong in one's opinion or judgement. <i>A <b>mistaken</b> belief.</i>
<b>not accurate</b>	Characterized by perfect conformity to fact or truth ; strictly correct.
<b>not exact</b>	Characterized by perfect conformity to fact or truth ; strictly correct.
<b>off target</b>	Not performing or scheduled for duties.
<b><u>untrue</u></b>	(used especially of persons) not dependable in devotion or affection; unfaithful. <i>Is <b>untrue</b> to his highest opportunity and duty.</i>
<b>wide of the mark</b>	Not on target.
<b>wrong</b>	Badly timed. <i>It is <b>wrong</b> for the rich to take advantage of the poor.</i>

## Associations of "Erroneous" (30 Words)

<b>blunder</b>	A stupid or careless mistake. <i>She stopped finally aware of the terrible <b>blunder</b> she had made.</i>
<b>clanger</b>	An absurd or embarrassing blunder. <i>The minister had dropped a massive political <b>clanger</b>.</i>
<b>defect</b>	A mark or flaw that spoils the appearance of something (especially on a person's body). <i>If there are any <b>defects</b> you should send it back to the manufacturer.</i>
<b><u>defective</u></b>	(of a word) not having all the inflections normal for the part of speech. <i>I returned the appliance because it was <b>defective</b>.</i>
<b>disinformation</b>	Misinformation that is deliberately disseminated in order to influence or confuse rivals (foreign enemies or business competitors etc). <i>A government inspired <b>disinformation</b> campaign.</i>

<b>err</b>	Wander from a direct course or at random. <i>The judge had <b>erred</b> in ruling that the evidence was inadmissible.</i>
<b><u>error</u></b>	A mistake in matter of law appearing in the proceedings of a court of record. <i>She was quick to point out my <b>errors</b>.</i>
<b>fallible</b>	Capable of making mistakes or being wrong. <i>Everyone is <b>fallible</b> to some degree.</i>
<b><u>faulty</u></b>	Not working or made correctly; having defects. <i><b>Faulty</b> logic.</i>
<b>flaw</b>	Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective. <i>A <b>flaw</b> in the glass.</i>
<b><u>flawed</u></b>	(of a person) having a weakness in character. <i>A <b>flawed</b> diamond.</i>
<b><u>imperfect</u></b>	The imperfect tense. <i>Drainage here is <b>imperfect</b>.</i>
<b>inaccurate</b>	Not exact. <i>A forecast that proved wildly <b>inaccurate</b>.</i>
<b>inadvertence</b>	The trait of forgetting or ignoring your responsibilities.
<b><u>incorrect</u></b>	Not in accord with established usage or procedure. <i>An <b>incorrect</b> transcription.</i>
<b>misconceive</b>	Fail to understand (something) correctly. <i>Criticism of the trade surplus in Washington is <b>misconceived</b>.</i>
<b><u>misconception</u></b>	An incorrect conception. <i>Public <b>misconceptions</b> about antibiotic use.</i>
<b><u>misinformation</u></b>	False or inaccurate information, especially that which is deliberately intended to deceive. <i>Nuclear matters are often entangled in a web of secrecy and <b>misinformation</b>.</i>
<b><u>misleading</u></b>	Giving the wrong idea or impression. <i>A <b>misleading</b> similarity.</i>
<b><u>mistaken</u></b>	Wrong in one's opinion or judgement. <i>A <b>mistaken</b> belief.</i>
<b>misunderstand</b>	Fail to interpret or understand the words or actions of (someone) correctly. <i>Don't <b>misunderstand</b> me I'm not implying she should be working.</i>
<b><u>omission</u></b>	The action of excluding or leaving out someone or something. <i>She searched the table for <b>omissions</b>.</i>

<b>oversight</b>	Management by overseeing the performance or operation of a person or group. <i>Effective <b>oversight</b> of the financial reporting process.</i>
<b><u>propaganda</u></b>	The dissemination of propaganda as a political strategy. <i>He was charged with distributing enemy <b>propaganda</b>.</i>
<b>slip</b>	A fielder at slip. <i>The effects of slight <b>slip</b> on turns.</i>
<b>solecism</b>	A grammatical mistake in speech or writing.
<b>spreading</b>	The opening of a subject to widespread discussion and debate.
<b>typo</b>	A typographical error.
<b>wrong</b>	Treat unjustly do wrong to. <i>He feels that you are in the <b>wrong</b>.</i>
<b><u>wrongly</u></b>	In an inaccurate manner. <i>Henry <b>wrongly</b> claimed 39 000 of taxpayers money.</i>
