civilized	Marked by refinement in taste and manners. <i>Terrorist acts that shocked the civilized world.</i>
cultivated	Prepared for raising crops by plowing or fertilizing. Cultivated roses.
cultured	(of a pearl) formed round a foreign body inserted into an oyster. Cultured Bostonians.
intellectual	Involving intelligence rather than emotions or instinct. <i>The film wasn't very intellectual but it caught the mood of the times.</i>
knowledgeable	Alert and fully informed. Knowledgeable about the technique of painting.

learned	Used as a courteous description of a lawyer in certain formal contexts. <i>A learned jurist.</i>
lettered	Highly educated; having extensive information or understanding. <i>Though not lettered he read widely.</i>
<u>scholarly</u>	Involving or relating to serious academic study. <i>A scholarly treatise.</i>
well educated	In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury.
well informed	Resulting favorably.
well read	In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury.
well versed	Wise or advantageous and hence advisable.

genteel	Characterized by exaggerated or affected politeness, refinement, or respectability. <i>Her genteel upbringing.</i>
highbrow	A highbrow person. <i>Innovatory art had a small mostly highbrow following.</i>
informed	(of a decision or judgement) based on an understanding of the facts of the situation. <i>The informed customer.</i>
intellectual	Relating to the intellect. <i>Intellectual workers engaged in creative literary or artistic or scientific labor.</i>
intelligent	Having the capacity for thought and reason especially to a high degree. <i>An intelligent solution.</i>
knowing	Alert and fully informed. <i>Today s society is too knowing too corrupt.</i>
knowledge	The psychological result of perception and learning and reasoning. <i>The programme had been developed without his knowledge.</i>
knowledgeable	Thoroughly acquainted through study or experience-W.H.Hudson- Herbert Read. <i>She is very knowledgeable about livestock and pedigrees.</i>
learned	Used as a courteous description of a lawyer in certain formal contexts. <i>My learned friend.</i>
lettered	Highly educated; having extensive information or understanding. <i>Though not lettered he read widely.</i>
monograph	Write a monograph on treat in a monograph. <i>Meissner first monographed the plant in 1826.</i>
rote	Memorization by repetition. <i>Rote learning.</i>
scholarly	Involving or relating to serious academic study. <i>A scholarly attitude.</i>
smart	(of an object) bright and fresh in appearance. <i>A smart blue skirt.</i>

sophistication	Falsification by the use of sophistry; misleading by means of specious fallacies. <i>The technological sophistication of their products.</i>
<u>studious</u>	Done deliberately or with a purpose in mind. <i>He was quiet and studious.</i>
trained	Having been taught a particular skill or type of behaviour through practice and instruction over a period of time. <i>The riding school was founded in the 16th century to provide trained horses for the Imperial Army.</i>
understanding	Characterized by understanding based on comprehension and discernment and empathy. <i>He wrote with understanding and affection of the people of Dent.</i>
versed	Thoroughly acquainted through study or experience. <i>A solicitor well versed in employment law.</i>
<u>veteran</u>	Rendered competent through trial and experience. <i>A Vietnam veteran.</i>
