- Increase rapidly.






# Synonyms of "Escalate" as a verb (27 Words)

<u>accelerate</u>	Undergo a change in velocity. Inflation started to <b>accelerate</b> .
be amplified	Be identical to; be someone or something.
be enlarged	Have life, be alive.
be extended	Happen, occur, take place.
be increased	To remain unmolested, undisturbed, or uninterrupted — used only in infinitive form.
be magnified	Be identical to; be someone or something.
be stepped up	Form or compose.
build up	Bolster or strengthen.
<u>climb</u>	(of a plant) grow up (a wall, tree, or trellis) by clinging with tendrils or by twining. Sales were <b>climb</b> ing after prices were lowered.



develop	Cause to grow and differentiate in ways conforming to its natural development. A flower <b>develop</b> ed on the branch.
go up	Follow a certain course.
grow	Become attached by or as if by the process of growth. More land was needed to <b>grow</b> crops for export.
grow rapidly	Come to have or undergo a change of (physical features and attributes.
heighten	Make or become more intense. Concern over CFCs has <b>heighten</b> ed.
increase	Make bigger or more. The amount of work <b>increase</b> d.
increase rapidly	Become bigger or greater in amount.
<u>intensify</u>	Make more intense, stronger, or more marked. <i>The dispute began to <b>intensify</b>.</i>
mount	(of a male mammal or bird) assume a position on top of (a female) in order to copulate. She was <b>mount</b> ed on a white horse.
mushroom	Form a shape resembling that of a mushroom. <i>The problem <b>mushroom</b>ed.</i>
rise rapidly	Move upward.
<u>rocket</u>	Propel with a rocket. Prices sky <b>rocket</b> ed.
shoot up	Move quickly and violently.
<u>soar</u>	Fly upwards or high in the sky. The dollar <b>soar</b> ed against the yen.
<u>spiral</u>	Move in a spiral course. A wisp of smoke <b>spiral</b> led up from the trees.
step up	Cause (a computer) to execute a single command.
strengthen	Make strong or stronger. The wind won t <b>strengthen</b> until after dark.
<u>surge</u>	(of a crowd or a natural force) move suddenly and powerfully forward or upward. <i>The journalists</i> <b>surge</b> <i>d</i> forward.






#### Usage Examples of "Escalate" as a verb

- We do not want to escalate the war.
- The disturbance escalated into a full-scale riot.
- The price of tickets escalated.







# Associations of "Escalate" (30 Words)

<u>ameliorate</u>	Get better. The reform did much to <b>ameliorate</b> living standards.
augment	Grow or intensify. He <b>augment</b> ed his summer income by painting houses.
augmentation	The lengthening of the time values of notes in a melodic part. The <b>augmentation</b> of the curriculum with new subjects.
bolster	Prop up with a pillow or bolster. They <b>bolster</b> ed the seats for a more comfortable ride.
bond	Money that must be forfeited by the bondsman if an accused person fails to appear in court for trial. <i>There was a <b>bond</b> of understanding between them.</i>
<u>brace</u>	Support or hold steady and make steadfast with or as if with a brace. <i>He stood with legs braced.</i>
cooperation	The practice of cooperating. Economic cooperation.
<u>deepen</u>	Make more intense, stronger, or more marked. His dislike for raw fish only <b>deepen</b> ed in Japan.
defensible	Able to be protected. A morally <b>defensible</b> penal system.
development	Act of improving by expanding or enlarging or refining. <i>What a revolting <b>development</b></i> .
enhance	Make better or more attractive. This sauce will <b>enhance</b> the flavor of the meat.
<u>enlarge</u>	Become larger or bigger. They have renovated and <b>enlarge</b> d the four storey building.
<u>enrich</u>	Make (someone) wealthy or wealthier. Her exposure to museums <b>enrich</b> ed her life in France.
exacerbate	Exasperate or irritate. The exorbitant cost of land in urban areas only <b>exacerbate</b> d the problem.
<u>fortify</u>	Provide (a place) with defensive works as protection against attack. The wine is aged in oak barrels and fortified with French brandy.
<u>harden</u>	Harden by reheating and cooling in oil. The cold <b>harden</b> ed the butter.
heighten	Make more extreme; raise in quantity, degree, or intensity. <i>Heighten</i> the tension.



increase	The amount by which something increases. We are aiming to <b>increase</b> awareness of social issues.
intensification	Action that makes something stronger or more extreme. <i>The intensification</i> of the conflict.
<u>intensify</u>	Increase the opacity of (a negative) using a chemical. <i>The dispute began to intensify</i> .
meliorate	Get better.
<u>optimize</u>	Act as an optimist and take a sunny view of the world. We manage our time so that we <b>optimize</b> our productivity.
ossify	Become bony. These tracheal cartilages may <b>ossify</b> .
<u>reinforce</u>	Strengthen (an existing feeling, idea, or habit. <i>Let s <b>reinforce</b> good behavior.</i>
reinforcement	A device designed to provide additional strength. <i>He used gummed <b>reinforcement</b>s to hold the page in his notebook.</i>
rise	Rise up. The moorlands <b>rise</b> and fall in gentle folds.
strengthen	Give a healthy elasticity to. <i>Strengthen</i> the relations between the two countries.
<u>stronghold</u>	A place where a particular cause or belief is strongly defended or upheld. <i>A Labour stronghold</i> .
toughen	Make (rules or a policy) stricter and more harsh. <i>This experience will <b>toughen</b> her.</i>
<u>widening</u>	An increase in width.
