- adventure** A reckless or potentially hazardous action or enterprise.  
*In any military **adventure** the first casualty is truth.*
- antic** A ludicrous or grotesque act done for fun and amusement.
- antics** Foolish, outrageous, or amusing behaviour.  
*The **antics** of our political parties.*
- caper** Gay or light-hearted recreational activity for diversion or amusement.  
*She did a little **caper** or dance.*
- exploit** A software tool designed to take advantage of a flaw in a computer system, typically for malicious purposes such as installing malware.  
*Despite a series of colourful **exploits** his agents obtained little intelligence of value.*
- fling** The act of flinging.  
*One final **fling** before a tranquil retirement.*
- game** A score of 100 points for tricks bid and made the best of three games constituting a rubber.  
*The **game** is 6 all.*

<b>jape</b>	A practical joke. <i>The childish <b>jape</b> of depositing a stink bomb in her locker.</i>
<b>lark</b>	Used in names of birds of other families that are similar to the lark e.g meadowlark.
<b><u>mischief</u></b>	Playfulness that is intended to tease or create trouble. <i>She was bent on making <b>mischief</b>.</i>
<b><u>prank</u></b>	A practical joke or mischievous act. <i>The tapestry was stolen as part of a drunken student <b>prank</b>.</i>
<b>romp</b>	An easy victory. <i>Their UEFA Cup <b>romp</b> against the Luxembourg part timers.</i>
<b>spree</b>	A spell or sustained period of unrestrained activity of a particular kind. <i>A shopping <b>spree</b>.</i>
<b>stunt</b>	A creature (especially a whale) that has been prevented from attaining full growth.
<b>trick</b>	A prostitute's client. <i>She thought Elaine was playing some <b>trick</b> on her.</i>

<b>adventurous</b>	Willing to take risks or to try out new methods, ideas, or experiences. <i><b>Adventurous</b> pioneers.</i>
<b>audacious</b>	Showing an impudent lack of respect. <i>An <b>audacious</b> interpretation of two Jacobean dramas.</i>
<b>audacity</b>	Fearless daring. <i>He had the <b>audacity</b> to question my decision.</i>
<b>bold</b>	A bold typeface or letter. <i>A <b>bold</b> attempt to solve the crisis.</i>
<b>boldly</b>	With boldness, in a bold manner. <i>I grabbed a couple of <b>boldly</b> patterned fabric samples.</i>
<b>boldness</b>	Willingness to take risks and act innovatively; confidence or courage. <i>A president who is showing incredible <b>boldness</b> in going after the cartels.</i>
<b>brave</b>	People who are brave. <i>Familiarity with danger makes a <b>brave</b> man <b>braver</b> but less daring.</i>
<b>bravely</b>	In a courageous manner. <i><b>Bravely</b> he went into the burning house.</i>
<b>bravery</b>	Courageous behaviour or character. <i>Perhaps I ll get a medal for <b>bravery</b>.</i>
<b>courage</b>	The ability to do something that frightens one; bravery. <i>She called on all her <b>courage</b> to face the ordeal.</i>
<b>courageous</b>	Not deterred by danger or pain; brave. <i>A frank <b>courageous</b> heart triumphed over pain.</i>
<b>daredevil</b>	A reckless person who enjoys doing dangerous things. <i>A <b>daredevil</b> test pilot having the right stuff.</i>
<b>daring</b>	Disposed to venture or take risks. <i>A <b>daring</b> crime.</i>
<b>daringly</b>	In an adventurous manner.
<b>gallant</b>	Lively and spirited. <i>A <b>gallant</b> pageant.</i>

<b>gallantry</b>	Sexual intrigue. <i>No young man offers to carry this burden for her such <b>gallantry</b> is out of fashion.</i>
<b>gutsy</b>	Having or showing courage, determination, and spirit. <i>Her <b>gutsy</b> 80 year old grandmother.</i>
<b>heroic</b>	A verse form suited to the treatment of heroic or elevated themes dactylic hexameter or iambic pentameter. <i><b>Heroic</b> sculpture.</i>
<b>heroine</b>	A woman admired for her courage, outstanding achievements, or noble qualities. <i>Jane Austen s <b>heroines</b>.</i>
<b>heroism</b>	The qualities of a hero or heroine; exceptional or heroic courage when facing danger (especially in battle). <i>He showed great <b>heroism</b> in battle.</i>
<b>impudence</b>	An impudent statement. <i>His arrogance and <b>impudence</b> had offended many.</i>
<b>intrepid</b>	Fearless; adventurous (often used for rhetorical or humorous effect). <i>Our <b>intrepid</b> reporter.</i>
<b>journey</b>	Undertake a journey or trip. <i>They <b>journeyed</b> south.</i>
<b>plucky</b>	Marked by courage and determination in the face of difficulties or danger; robust and uninhibited. <i>The <b>plucky</b> youngster has astounded medical staff.</i>
<b>sordid</b>	Involving immoral or dishonourable actions and motives; arousing moral distaste and contempt. <i><b>Sordid</b> shantytowns.</i>
<b>valiant</b>	Having or showing valor. <i>A <b>valiant</b> soldier.</i>
<b>valor</b>	The qualities of a hero or heroine; exceptional or heroic courage when facing danger (especially in battle). <i>He received a medal for <b>valor</b>.</i>
<b>valorous</b>	Showing great courage in the face of danger, especially in battle. <i><b>Valorous</b> deeds on the field of honour.</i>
<b>venturous</b>	Willing to take risks or embark on difficult or unusual courses of action. <i>Five <b>venturous</b> young men.</i>
