- *Take in marriage.*

- *Take up the cause, ideology, practice, method, of someone and use it as one's own.*

Make use of or accept for some purpose.
*He **accepted** a pen as a present.*

adopt

Take into one's family.
*This approach has been **adopted** by many big banks.*

conjoin	Join; combine. <i>An approach which conjoins theory and method.</i>
embrace	Hold (someone) tightly in your arms, usually with fondness. <i>She embraced Catholicism.</i>
follow	Follow discover or ascertain the course of development of something. <i>Please follow the guide through the museum.</i>

hook up with	Hit a ball and put a spin on it so that it travels to the left.

sweep up	Cover the entire range of.

take up	Experience or feel or submit to.
wed	Perform a marriage ceremony. <i>The government was wedded to budgetary orthodoxy.</i>
welcome	Bid welcome to greet upon arrival. <i>We welcome any comments.</i>

married	Married people. <i>Married life.</i>
marry	Become a member of (a family) by marriage. <i>They had no plans to marry.</i>
newlywed	Someone recently married.
patron	A patrician in relation to a client. <i>A celebrated patron of the arts.</i>
patronage	The power to control appointments to office or the right to privileges. <i>Even before noon there was a considerable patronage.</i>

patronize	Frequent (a shop, restaurant, or other establishment) as a customer. <i>She patronizes worthy causes.</i>
polygamist	An animal that has more than one mate. <i>Polygamist communities.</i>
polygamy	A pattern of mating in which an animal has more than one mate.
proponent	A person who pleads for a cause or propounds an idea. <i>A strong proponent of the free market and liberal trade policies.</i>
<u>sponsor</u>	Assume sponsorship of. <i>She wishes to thank all those people who sponsored her.</i>
<u>spouse</u>	A person's partner in marriage.
stand	Withstand an experience or test without being damaged. <i>The hotel stands in three acres of gardens.</i>
<u>suitor</u>	A man who courts a woman. <i>She decided to marry her suitor.</i>
support	A musical part vocal or instrumental that supports or provides background for other musical parts. <i>The team enjoyed the support of their fans.</i>
supporter	A person who backs a politician or a team etc. <i>All their supporters came out for the game.</i>
<u>sustain</u>	An effect or facility on a keyboard or electronic instrument whereby a note can be sustained after the key is released. <i>He cannot sustain a normal conversation.</i>
wed	Get married to. <i>In this album he weds an excellent programme with a distinctive vocal style.</i>
