- *For a limitless time- P.P.Bliss.*
- *In an annoying or tedious way that seems to last forever; constantly.*

always	Without variation or change, in every case. <i>She will always be missed.</i>

continuously	Without interruption or gaps. <i>These images loop continuously.</i>
<u>endlessly</u>	In a way that has or seems to have no end or limit. <i>Her nagging went on endlessly.</i>

evermore	At any future time; in the future. <i>Lead a blameless life evermore.</i>

for good and all	In a good or proper or satisfactory manner or to a high standard ('good' is a nonstandard dialectal variant for 'well).
forever	For all future time; for always. <i>It took forever to get a passport.</i>
in perpetuity	To or toward the inside of.
permanently	In a way that lasts or remains unchanged indefinitely; for all time. <i>He is permanently disabled.</i>
perpetually	Without interruption. <i>She seems perpetually to have a mournful look on her face.</i>
persistently	With persistence. <i>Prices have remained persistently high.</i>
regularly	At uniform intervals of time. <i>The person who regularly cuts your hair.</i>
repeatedly	Several time. <i>They have been warned repeatedly with no effect.</i>

immortality	The quality of deserving to be remembered for a long time; timelessness. <i>Eating the fruit gave the gods immortality.</i>
immortalize	Be or provide a memorial to a person or an event. <i>He will be forever immortalized in the history books.</i>
incarnation	The form taken by a person or thing during an incarnation. <i>The incarnation of evil.</i>
incessant	(of something regarded as unpleasant) continuing without pause or interruption. <i>The incessant beat of the music.</i>
incessantly	Without interruption; constantly. <i>She talked about him incessantly.</i>
lifelong	Continuing through life. <i>The two men were to remain lifelong friends.</i>

live	Be alive at a specified time. <i>They lived with his grandparents.</i>
<u>living</u>	Of a place used for living rather than working in. <i>Streams of living water.</i>
<u>longevity</u>	Long life. <i>Her longevity as a star.</i>
permanence	The state or quality of lasting or remaining unchanged indefinitely. <i>The clarity and permanence of the dyes.</i>
<u>permanent</u>	A perm for the hair. <i>Permanent brain damage.</i>
permanently	In a way that lasts or remains unchanged indefinitely; for all time. <i>We need to be permanently vigilant.</i>
perpetual	Denoting or having a position, job, or trophy held for life. <i>A perpetual bond.</i>
<u>perpetuity</u>	A restriction making an interest in land inalienable perpetually or for a period beyond certain limits fixed by law. <i>He did not believe in the perpetuity of military rule.</i>
<u>timeless</u>	Unaffected by time. <i>Antiques add to the timeless atmosphere of the dining room.</i>
unceasing	Continuing forever or indefinitely. <i>Man s unceasing warfare with drought and isolation.</i>
