- *Avoid or try to avoid fulfilling, answering, or performing (duties, questions, or issues.*
- *Escape paying (tax or duty), especially by illegitimate presentation of one's finances.*
- *Escape, either physically or mentally.*
- *Avoid dealing with or accepting (something unpleasant or morally or legally required.*
- *Act contrary to the intention of (a law or rule), especially while complying with its letter.*
- *Escape or avoid (someone or something), especially by guile or trickery.*
- *Practice evasion.*
- *(of an abstract thing) elude (someone.*
- *Avoid giving a direct answer to (a question.*
- *Use cunning or deceit to escape or avoid.*

<b>be equivocal about</b>	Have life, be alive.
<b>be evasive about</b>	Form or compose.
<b><u>bilk</u></b>	Evade; elude. <i>Government waste has <b>bilked</b> the taxpayer of billions of dollars.</i>
<b>break away from</b>	Fracture a bone of nicecutisours.
<b><u>bypass</u></b>	Avoid or circumvent (an obstacle or problem). <i>You cannot <b>bypass</b> these rules.</i>
<b>circumvent</b>	Find a way around (an obstacle). <i>If you come to an obstruction in a road you can seek to <b>circumvent</b> it.</i>
<b><u>dodge</u></b>	Avoid (someone or something) by a sudden quick movement. <i>He <b>dodged</b> the issue.</i>
<b>duck</b>	Dip into a liquid. <i>Before he could <b>duck</b> another stone struck him.</i>
<b>elude</b>	Escape from or avoid (a danger, enemy, or pursuer), typically in a skilful or cunning way. <i>What you are seeing in him <b>eludes</b> me.</i>
<b>escape</b>	Be incomprehensible to escape understanding by. <i>The CFCs have <b>escaped</b> into the atmosphere.</i>
<b>escape from</b>	Issue or leak, as from a small opening.
<b><u>fence</u></b>	Surround or protect with a fence. <i>Walkers may find themselves <b>fenced</b> out of the moor.</i>
<b> fend off</b>	Withstand the force of something.
<b>fudge</b>	Tamper, with the purpose of deception. <i>The authorities have <b>fudged</b> the issue.</i>
<b>give someone a wide berth</b>	Inflict as a punishment.
<b>hedge</b>	Surround with a hedge. <i>Diversify your financial portfolio to <b>hedge</b> price risks.</i>
<b>keep at arm's length</b>	Retain rights to.
<b>keep one's distance from</b>	Look after; be the keeper of; have charge of.

<b>keep out of someone's way</b>	Keep under control; keep in check.
<b>leave behind</b>	Leave behind unintentionally.
<b>lose</b>	Miss from one's possessions; lose sight of. <i>Am I going to <b>lose</b> the baby.</i>
<b>not give a straight answer to</b>	Bring about.
<b>parry</b>	Ward off (a weapon or attack) with a countermove. <i>He <b>parried</b> questions from reporters outside the building.</i>
<b>put off</b>	Arrange thoughts, ideas, temporal events.
<b>quibble about</b>	Evade the truth of a point or question by raising irrelevant objections.
<b>run away from</b>	Pass over, across, or through.
<b>shake</b>	Shake or vibrate rapidly and intensively. <i>Don't <b>shake</b> your fist at me.</i>
<b>shake off</b>	Undermine or cause to waver.
<b>sidestep</b>	Avoid dealing with or discussing (something problematic or disagreeable). <i>He neatly <b>sidestepped</b> the questions about riots.</i>
<b>skirt</b>	Extend on all sides of simultaneously; encircle. <i>The boat <b>skirted</b> the coast.</i>
<b>skirt round</b>	Extend on all sides of simultaneously; encircle.
<b>stay away from</b>	Stay the same; remain in a certain state.
<b>steer clear of</b>	Be a guiding or motivating force or drive.

<b>avert</b>	Turn away or aside. <i>She <b>averted</b> her eyes while we made stilted conversation.</i>
<b>avoid</b>	Declare invalid. <i>Her former friends now <b>avoid</b> her.</i>
<b>bypass</b>	An alternative channel created during a bypass operation. <i>The town has been <b>bypassed</b>.</i>
<b>circumvent</b>	Find a way around (an obstacle). <i>It was always possible to <b>circumvent</b> the regulations.</i>
<b>deflect</b>	(of an object) change direction after hitting something. <i>The compass needle is <b>deflected</b> from magnetic north by metal in the aircraft.</i>

<b>detour</b>	Avoid by taking a detour. <i>He <b>detoured</b> around the walls.</i>
<b>dodge</b>	A quick evasive movement. <i>The grant system s widespread use as a tax <b>dodge</b>.</i>
<b>elude</b>	Escape, either physically or mentally. <i>He tried to <b>elude</b> the security men by sneaking through a back door.</i>
<b>escape</b>	Escape potentially unpleasant consequences get away with a forbidden action. <i>That was a narrow <b>escape</b>.</i>
<b>eschew</b>	Avoid and stay away from deliberately; stay clear of. <i>He appealed to the crowd to <b>eschew</b> violence.</i>
<b>flee</b>	Run away from a place or situation of danger. <i>He was forced to <b>flee</b> the country.</i>

<b>impute</b>	Attribute (responsibility or fault) to a cause or source. <i>The crimes <b>imputed</b> to Richard.</i>
<b>obviate</b>	Remove (a need or difficulty). <i>A parachute can be used to <b>obviate</b> disaster.</i>
<b>oncoming</b>	Approaching from the front; moving towards one. <i>The <b>oncoming</b> of age.</i>
<b><u>ostracize</u></b>	(in ancient Greece) banish (an unpopular or overly powerful citizen) from a city for five or ten years by popular vote. <i>Ever since I spoke up my colleagues <b>ostracize</b> me.</i>
<b>outrun</b>	Run or travel faster or further than. <i>It s harder than anyone imagines to <b>outrun</b> destiny.</i>
<b>parry</b>	An act of parrying something. <i>Her question met with a polite <b>parry</b>.</i>
<b><u>refusal</u></b>	A message refusing to accept something that is offered. <i>He became tired of his friend s <b>refusal</b> to see him.</i>
<b><u>repel</u></b>	Be repellent to cause aversion in. <i>The alleged right of lien led by the bankrupt s solicitor was <b>repelled</b>.</i>
<b><u>shun</u></b>	Expel from a community or group. <i>He <b>shunned</b> fashionable society.</i>
<b>sidestep</b>	A step taken sideways, typically to avoid someone or something. <i>We learned how to <b>sidestep</b> up the slope and slide cautiously down.</i>
<b>undiagnosed</b>	Not diagnosed or having been subject to diagnosis. <i>Some patients have diseases that go <b>undiagnosed</b> and therefore untreated.</i>
