balance	A weight that balances another weight. <i>A surplus on the capital account to make the account balance.</i>
certify	Officially declare insane. <i>The Law Society will certify that the sum charged is fair and reasonable.</i>
consequently	As a consequence. <i>Flexible workers find themselves in great demand and consequently gain high salaries.</i>
coordination	The organization of the different elements of a complex body or activity so as to enable them to work together effectively. <i>Action groups work in coordination with local groups to end rainforest destruction.</i>
counterbalance	Adjust for. <i>His restoration to power was intended as a counterbalance to his rival's influence.</i>
counterweight	Constitute a counterweight or counterbalance to. <i>The scales have a series of counterweights that slide along a calibrated beam.</i>
diatonic	Of a melody or harmony constructed from a diatonic scale.
enabling	Providing legal power or sanction. <i>An enabling resolution.</i>
equilibrium	A state in which opposing forces or influences are balanced. <i>His intensity could unsettle his equilibrium.</i>
equipoise	Balance or counterbalance (something). <i>Capital flows act as an equipoise to international imbalances in savings.</i>
facilitate	Make (an action or process) easy or easier. <i>You could facilitate the process by sharing your knowledge.</i>

farther	To or at a greater extent or degree or a more advanced stage further is used more often than farther in this abstract sense. <i>The practice may go back still farther to the Druids.</i>
hence	From that fact or reason or as a result used to introduce a logical conclusion hence adv from this place. <i>Many vehicle journeys and hence a lot of pollution would be saved.</i>
hereby	(formal) by means of this. <i>I hereby declare you man and wife.</i>
impartial	Showing lack of favoritism. <i>The cold neutrality of an impartial judge.</i>
impartiality	Equal treatment of all rivals or disputants; fairness. <i>Entries had to be submitted under a pseudonym to ensure impartiality in the judging process.</i>
level	Make level or straight. <i>Women do better at degree level.</i>
neutrality	Absence of decided views, expression, or strong feeling. <i>During the war Switzerland maintained its neutrality.</i>
remnant	A part or quantity that is left after the greater part has been used, removed, or destroyed. <i>If any one ceases to be a witness he ceases to be one of the remnant.</i>
steadiness	The quality of being controlled, and not faltering or wavering. <i>His voice loses steadiness when pushed.</i>
subsequently	After a particular thing has happened; afterwards. <i>The work was accepted for inclusion in the Paris Salon of 1880 and was subsequently sold to an important collector.</i>
symmetry	(physics) the property of being isotropic; having the same value when measured in different directions. <i>A crystal structure with hexagonal symmetry.</i>
then	Used to finish off a conversation. <i>We watched the late movie and then went to bed.</i>
thereby	By that means or because of that. <i>Students perform in hospitals thereby gaining a deeper awareness of the therapeutic power of music.</i>
therefore	From that fact or reason or as a result used to introduce a logical conclusion therefore adv as a consequence. <i>He was injured and therefore unable to play.</i>
thereof	From that circumstance or source. <i>The member state or a part thereof.</i>

From that fact or reason or as a result used to introduce a logical conclusion thus adv in the way indicated thusly is a nonstandard variant.

tonal

Having tonality i e tones and chords organized in relation to one tone such as a keynote or tonic.
*His ear for **tonal** colour.*

unsettle

Cause to feel anxious or uneasy; disturb.
*The crisis has **unsettled** financial markets.*

very

Used as intensifiers; `real' is sometimes used informally for `really'; `rattling' is informal.
*The **very** center of town.*
