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Associations of "Every so often" (30 Words)

all	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>All by himself.</i>
always	Without variation or change, in every case. <i>If the marriage doesn't work out we can always get divorced.</i>
<u>anyhow</u>	In any way whatsoever. <i>Two suitcases flung anyhow.</i>
<u>ever</u>	At all times all the time and on every occasion. <i>They lived happily ever after.</i>
<u>frequency</u>	The rate per second of a vibration constituting a wave, either in a material (as in sound waves), or in an electromagnetic field (as in radio waves and light). <i>An increase in the frequency of accidents due to increased overtime.</i>
<u>frequent</u>	Frequently encountered. <i>A frequent or common error is using the transitive verb lay for the intransitive lie.</i>
<u>frequently</u>	Many times at short intervals. <i>They go abroad frequently.</i>
<u>incidence</u>	The relative frequency of occurrence of something. <i>The entire incidence falls on the workers.</i>
infrequently	Not many times. <i>A storage area for infrequently used items.</i>
intermittently	At irregular intervals; not continuously or steadily. <i>He has worked intermittently in a variety of jobs.</i>
occasional	(of furniture) made or adapted for use on a particular occasion or for infrequent use. <i>An occasional worker.</i>

<u>occasionally</u>	At infrequent or irregular intervals; now and then. <i>He was arrogant and occasionally callous.</i>
oft	Many times at short intervals. <i>An oft quoted tenet.</i>
oftentimes	In many instances. <i>I would oftentimes go there.</i>
<u>periodic</u>	Relating to the periodic table of the elements. <i>The periodic appearance of the seventeen year locust.</i>
periodically	From time to time; occasionally. <i>The newsletter is sent out periodically to update members.</i>
<u>quite</u>	Of an unusually noticeable or exceptional or remarkable kind (not used with a negative). <i>Are you quite certain about this.</i>
<u>rare</u>	Not widely distributed. <i>One of Britain's rarest birds the honey buzzard.</i>
<u>rarely</u>	Remarkably well. <i>I rarely drive above 50 mph.</i>
really	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>They don't really listen to us.</i>
<u>recidivism</u>	Habitual relapse into crime. <i>The prison has succeeded in reducing recidivism.</i>
regular	Regularly scheduled for fixed times. <i>Am I eating and sleeping well Oh yes and keeping regular too.</i>
regularity	A property of polygons: the property of having equal sides and equal angles. <i>He came to see her with increasing regularity.</i>
<u>seldom</u>	Not often; rarely. <i>An old seldom used church.</i>
<u>sometimes</u>	Occasionally, rather than all of the time. <i>Sometimes I want to do things on my own.</i>
<u>sparse</u>	Scanty; in short supply. <i>Trees were sparse.</i>
<u>sporadic</u>	Recurring in scattered and irregular or unpredictable instances. <i>A city subjected to sporadic bombing raids.</i>
sporadically	Occasionally or at irregular intervals. <i>He worked sporadically at part time jobs.</i>

- successively** In proper order or sequence.
*He served **successively** as a major and a lieutenant colonel.*
- usually** Under normal conditions; generally.
*Heat resistant paints are **usually** black or aluminium coloured.*
