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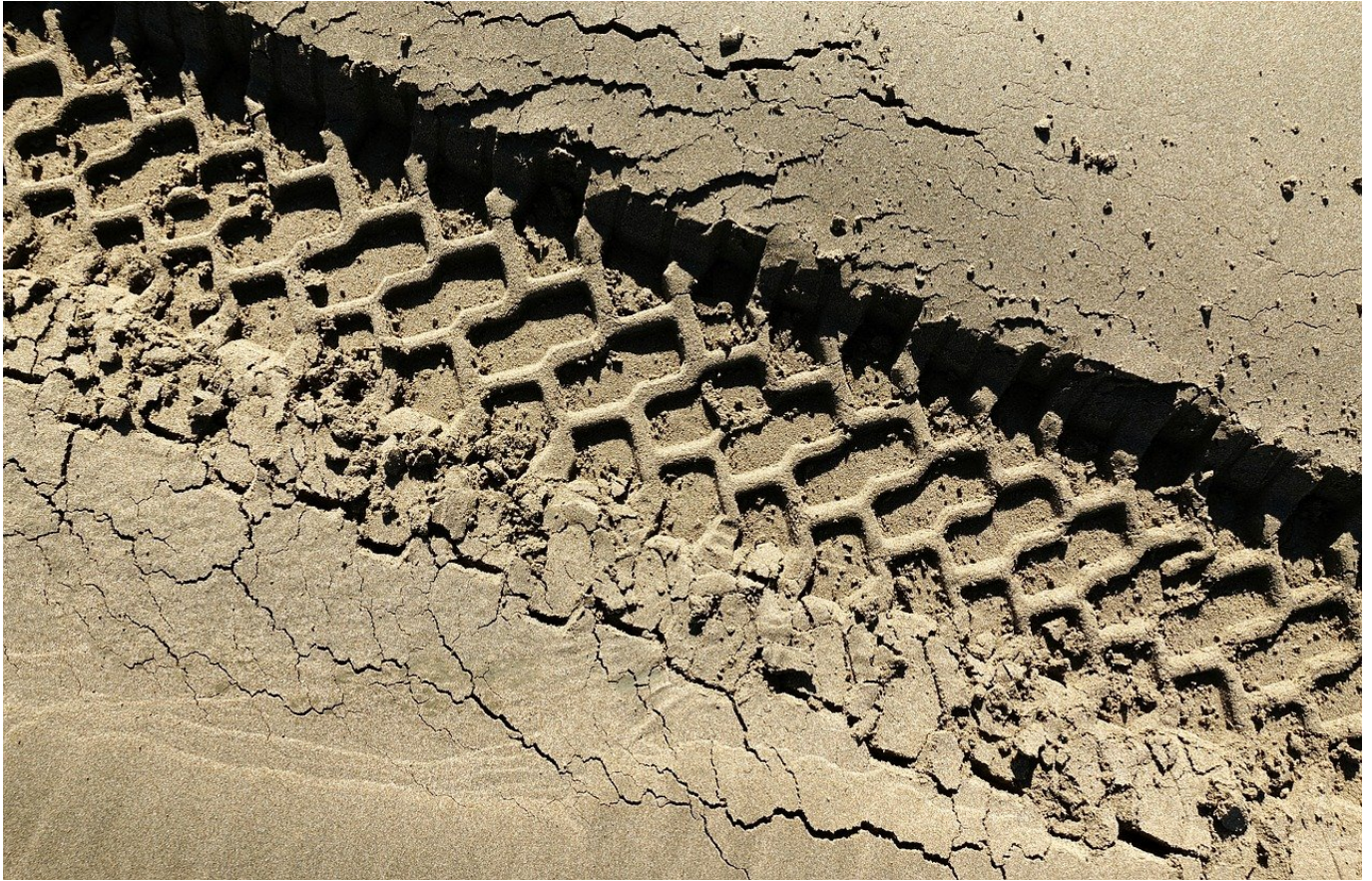

Definitions of "Evidently" as an adverb

- *Unmistakably (‘plain’ is often used informally for ‘plainly).*

- *It would seem that.*



Synonyms of "Evidently" as an adverb (21 Words)

apparently

From appearances alone.

*Irrigation often produces bumper crops from **apparently** desert land.*

as far as one can tell

To the same degree (often followed by `as).

blatantly

In an open and unashamed manner.

*It s **blatantly** her first kiss.*

clearly

In an intelligible manner.

*Her ability to write **clearly**.*

distinctly

To a distinct degree.

*Reading each word slowly and **distinctly**.*

from all appearances

To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (`whole' is often used informally for `wholly).

manifestly

In a way that is clear or obvious to the eye or mind.

*He was **manifestly** too important to leave off the guest list.*

markedly	To an extent which is clearly noticeable; significantly. <i>New diagnoses have increased markedly since 1998.</i>
obviously	Unmistakably ('plain' is often used informally for 'plainly'). Obviously everyone has to do what they think is right.
<u>ostensibly</u>	As appears or is stated to be true, though not necessarily so; apparently. <i>Had been ostensibly frank as to his purpose while really concealing it.</i>
<u>outwardly</u>	In outward appearance. <i>An outwardly normal life.</i>
palpably	In a way that is able to be touched or felt. <i>The audience became palpably uncomfortable.</i>
patently	Clearly; without doubt. <i>These claims were patently false.</i>
perceptibly	In a noticeable manner.
plain	Unmistakably plain is often used informally for plainly. <i>You are plainly wrong.</i>
plainly	Unmistakably plain is often used informally for plainly. <i>To speak plainly I suffer from a lack of confidence.</i>
<u>seemingly</u>	So as to give the impression of having a certain quality; apparently. <i>The child is seemingly healthy but the doctor is concerned.</i>
so it seems	In the way indicated; ('thusly' is a nonstandard variant).
to all intents and purposes	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent ('whole' is often used informally for 'wholly').
transparently	(with reference to a process) without the user being aware. <i>The job of streaming data to the receiver is handled transparently by a server program.</i>
visibly	So as to be visible. <i>The defendant paled visibly as the guilty verdict was announced.</i>



Usage Examples of "Evidently" as an adverb

- *A work so evidently laden with significance.*
- *'Were they old pals or something?' 'Evidently.'*
- *She was in bed and evidently in great pain.*
- *Evidently Mrs Smith thought differently.*



Associations of "Evidently" (30 Words)

<u>apparent</u>	Appearing as such but not necessarily so. <i>The effects of the drought are apparent to anyone who sees the parched fields.</i>
<u>apparently</u>	From appearances alone. <i>She has apparently been living here for some time.</i>
<u>assuredly</u>	Without a doubt. <i>The lad kept his cool and assuredly slipped the ball between the posts.</i>
<u>certainly</u>	Definitely or positively ('sure' is sometimes used informally for 'surely'). <i>The prestigious address certainly adds to the firm's appeal.</i>
<u>certainty</u>	A fact that is definitely true or an event that is definitely going to take place. <i>A man exuding certainty.</i>
clearly	Clear to the mind; with distinct mental discernment. <i>Clearly things have changed in the last six weeks.</i>
decidedly	Undoubtedly; undeniably. <i>He looked decidedly uncomfortable.</i>

<u>definite</u>	(of a person) certain or sure about something. <i>Organizations have boundaries in the sense that they may occupy a definite geographical area.</i>
definitely	Without question and beyond doubt. <i>We couldn't plan to go elsewhere until we had heard from you more definitely.</i>
determinate	Having exact and discernible limits or form. <i>The longest determinate prison sentence ever upheld by English courts.</i>
<u>doubtless</u>	Presumably or very probably. <i>The company would doubtless find the reduced competition to their liking.</i>
effortless	Requiring or apparently requiring no effort. <i>Each skill is practised to the point that it becomes effortless.</i>
<u>evident</u>	Capable of being seen or noticed. <i>A clearly evident erasure in the manuscript.</i>
indubitably	In a manner or to a degree that could not be doubted. <i>It was immediately and indubitably apparent that I had interrupted a scene of lovers.</i>
justified	Having been adjusted so that the print fills a space evenly or forms a straight line at the margin. <i>The output is left justified.</i>
marked	Strongly marked easily noticeable. <i>A marked increase in UK sales.</i>
markedly	To an extent which is clearly noticeable; significantly. <i>This advice is markedly different to that last year.</i>
obvious	Predictable and lacking in subtlety. <i>It was an obvious remark to make.</i>
obviously	In a way that is easily perceived or understood; clearly. <i>The answer is obviously wrong.</i>
plain	Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. <i>I'm finished with you I'll tell you plain.</i>
positively	In a positive way, especially by expressing optimism, agreement, or acceptance. <i>It was positively monumental.</i>
rightly	With honesty. <i>The key rightly belonged to Craig.</i>
<u>seemingly</u>	So as to give the impression of having a certain quality; apparently. <i>It's touch and go seemingly and she's asking for you.</i>

- sure** Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured.
*He ll win **sure** as shooting.*
- surely** Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely.
*If he did not heed the warning he would **surely** die.*
- truly** In a truthful way.
*A **truly** awful book.*
- undoubtedly** Without doubt; certainly.
*It s **undoubtedly** very beautiful.*
- uneasily** With anxiety or apprehension.
*The men glanced **uneasily** at each other.*
- unequivocal** Admitting of no doubt or misunderstanding; having only one meaning or interpretation and leading to only one conclusion.
*The plain and **unequivocal** language of the laws.*
- unquestionably** Without question.
***Unquestionably** the loss of his father was a grievous blow.*
