### Definitions of "Evoke" as a verb

- *Elicit (a response).*
- *Bring or recall (a feeling, memory, or image) to the conscious mind.*
- *Invoke (a spirit or deity).*
- *Call forth (emotions, feelings, and responses).*
- *Call to mind.*
- *Deduce (a principle) or construe (a meaning).*
- *Evoke or provoke to appear or occur.*
- *Summon into action or bring into existence, often as if by magic.*

### Synonyms of "Evoke" as a verb (34 Words)

**arouse**                      Cause to become awake or conscious.  
*Arouse* pity.

<b>bring to mind</b>	Cause to come into a particular state or condition.

<b>call down</b>	Make a demand, as for a card or a suit or a show of hands.
<b>call forth</b>	Make a prediction about; tell in advance.
<b>call to mind</b>	Indicate a decision in regard to.

<b>conjure</b>	Implore (someone) to do something. <i>She had forgotten how to <b>conjure</b> up the image of her mother's face.</i>
<b>conjure up</b>	Engage in plotting or enter into a conspiracy, swear together.
<b>draw out</b>	Give a description of.
<b>deduce</b>	Deduce a principle or construe a meaning. <i>More information can be <b>deduced</b> from these statistics.</i>
<b>elicit</b>	Derive by reason. <i>I tried to <b>elicit</b> a smile from Joanna.</i>
<b>enkindle</b>	Cause to start burning. <i>Fresh remembrance of vexation must still <b>enkindle</b> rage.</i>
<b>excite</b>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>The ability to <b>excite</b> interest in others.</i>
<b>extract</b>	Extract by the process of distillation. <i>Lead was <b>extracted</b> from the copper.</i>
<b>fire</b>	Set fire to. <i>Surrender <b>fires</b> the cold skepticism.</i>
<b>give rise to</b>	Propose.
<b>induce</b>	Cause to occur rapidly. <i>None of these measures <b>induced</b> a change of policy.</i>
<b>invoke</b>	Request earnestly (something from somebody); ask for aid or protection. <i>She <b>invoked</b> an ancient law.</i>
<b>kick up</b>	Thrash about or strike out with the feet.
<b>kindle</b>	Become impassioned or excited. <i>The setting sun <b>kindled</b> the sky with oranges and reds.</i>
<b>paint a picture</b>	Make a painting of.

<b>provoke</b>	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. <i>A teacher can <b>provoke</b> you into working harder.</i>
<b>put forward</b>	Cause to be in a certain state; cause to be in a certain relation.
<b>put one in mind of</b>	Make an investment.
<b>raise</b>	Multiply a number by itself a specified number of times 8 is 2 raised to the power 3. <i>The bank <b>raised</b> interest rates.</i>
<b>stimulate</b>	Raise levels of physiological or nervous activity in (the body or any biological system). <i><b>Stimulate</b> my appetite.</i>
<b>stir</b>	Mix or add by stirring. <i>Pour in the cream and <b>stir</b> well.</i>
<b>stir up</b>	Stir the feelings, emotions, or peace of.
<b>suggest</b>	Suggest the necessity of an intervention in medicine. <i>Maybe you ought to get an expert she <b>suggested</b>.</i>
<b>summon</b>	Call people to attend (a meeting). <i><b>Summon</b> a lawyer.</i>
<b>summon up</b>	Ask to come.

<b>cue</b>	Sports implement consisting of a tapering rod used to strike a cue ball in pool or billiards. <i>Have a list of needs and questions on paper to <b>cue</b> you.</i>
<b>elicit</b>	Call forth (emotions, feelings, and responses). <i>The work <b>elicited</b> enormous public interest.</i>

<b>enkindle</b>	Set on fire. <i>The glare from its <b>enkindled</b> roof illumined its innermost recesses.</i>
<b>evocative</b>	Serving to bring to mind- Wilder Hobson. <i>The building s cramped interiors are highly <b>evocative</b> of past centuries.</i>
<b>hint</b>	Drop a hint intimate by a hint. <i>The restrained fronts of the terraced houses only <b>hinted</b> at the wealth within.</i>
<b>implore</b>	Beg someone earnestly or desperately to do something. <i>Please don t talk that way Ellen <b>implored</b>.</i>
<b>invoke</b>	Request earnestly (something from somebody); ask for aid or protection. <i>The antiquated defence of insanity is rarely <b>invoked</b> in England.</i>
<b>memoir</b>	An account written by a public figure of their life and experiences. <i>An important <b>memoir</b> on Carboniferous crustacea.</i>
<b>mindful</b>	Focusing one's awareness on the present moment, especially as part of a therapeutic or meditative technique. <i>I arrived home for the summer ever <b>mindful</b> of my obligations to my parents.</i>
<b>mnemonic</b>	A system such as a pattern of letters, ideas, or associations which assists in remembering something. <i><b>Mnemonic</b> device.</i>
<b>nostalgic</b>	A nostalgic person. <i>He remained <b>nostalgic</b> about the good old days.</i>
<b>petition</b>	Write a petition for something to somebody request formally and in writing. <i>The islanders <b>petitioned</b> the government to help them leave St Kilda.</i>
<b>propose</b>	Propose or intend. <i>One girl <b>proposed</b> marriage to him on the spot.</i>
<b>propound</b>	Put forward (an idea or theory) for consideration by others. <i>He began to <b>propound</b> the idea of a social monarchy as an alternative to Franco.</i>
<b>reawaken</b>	(with reference to a feeling or state) emerge or cause to emerge again; awaken again. <i>His departure <b>reawakened</b> deep divisions within the party.</i>
<b>recall</b>	Recall knowledge from memory have a recollection. <i>Expert systems can produce solutions with the speed <b>recall</b> accuracy and consistency that only a computer can provide.</i>
<b>recollect</b>	Recall knowledge from memory have a recollection. <i>Can you <b>recollect</b> how he reacted.</i>

<b>recollection</b>	Something recalled to the mind. <i>To the best of my <b>recollection</b> no one ever had a bad word to say about him.</i>
<b>remember</b>	Recover one's manners after a lapse. <i>He has <b>remembered</b> the boy in his will.</i>
<b>remembrance</b>	The action of remembering something. <i>They exchanged fond <b>remembrances</b> of his gentle ways.</i>
<b>remind</b>	Cause someone to think of (something) because of a resemblance. <i>He would have forgotten my birthday if you hadn't <b>reminded</b> him.</i>
<b>reminiscence</b>	The enjoyable recollection of past events. <i>His <b>reminiscences</b> of his early days in Parliament.</i>
<b>reminiscent</b>	Serving to bring to mind- Wilder Hobson. <i>Her robes were vaguely <b>reminiscent</b> of military dress.</i>
<b>stasis</b>	An abnormal state in which the normal flow of a liquid (such as blood) is slowed or stopped. <i>Creative <b>stasis</b>.</i>
<b>suggest</b>	Suggest the necessity of an intervention in medicine. <i>The temperature wasn't as tropical as the bright sunlight may have <b>suggested</b>.</i>
<b>summon</b>	Urgently demand (help). <i>He <b>summoned</b> a meeting of head delegates.</i>
<b>theorize</b>	Construct a theory about. <i>Galileo <b>theorized</b> the motion of the stars.</i>
<b>waken</b>	Cause to become awake or conscious. <i>They combined to <b>waken</b> a forgotten and futile hope.</i>
<b>writ</b>	A form of written command in the name of a court or other legal authority to act or abstain from acting in a particular way. <i>You have business here which is out of my <b>writ</b> and competence.</i>
