anecdote	An account regarded as unreliable or hearsay. <i>His wife s death has long been the subject of rumour and anecdote.</i>
cue	Sports implement consisting of a tapering rod used to strike a cue ball in pool or billiards. <i>Ros and Guil cued by Hamlet also bow deeply.</i>
elicit	Derive by reason. <i>I tried to elicit a smile from Joanna.</i>
enkindle	Call forth (emotions, feelings, and responses). <i>The glare from its enkindled roof illumined its innermost recesses.</i>
evocative	Serving to bring to mind- Wilder Hobson. <i>The building s cramped interiors are highly evocative of past centuries.</i>
hint	Drop a hint intimate by a hint. <i>He has given no hint of his views.</i>
implore	Beg earnestly for. <i>Please don t talk that way Ellen implored.</i>
invoke	Summon into action or bring into existence, often as if by magic. <i>She invoked his help against this attack.</i>
memoir	The proceedings of a learned society. <i>An important memoir on Carboniferous crustacea.</i>
mindful	Bearing in mind; attentive to. <i>Tune in to your body and be mindful.</i>
mnemonic	A device (such as a rhyme or acronym) used to aid recall. <i>The usual mnemonic for star types is O Be A Fine Girl Kiss Me.</i>
nostalgic	A nostalgic person. <i>He remained nostalgic about the good old days.</i>
petition	Present a petition to an authority in respect of a particular cause. <i>The islanders petitioned the government to help them leave St Kilda.</i>

<u>propose</u>	Propose or intend. <i>He proposed to attend the meeting.</i>
propound	Put forward, as of an idea. <i>He began to propound the idea of a social monarchy as an alternative to Franco.</i>
reawaken	(with reference to a feeling or state) emerge or cause to emerge again; awaken again. <i>A sense of community started to reawaken in the 1970s.</i>
recall	An act or instance of officially recalling someone or something. <i>Recall the defective auto tires.</i>
recollect	Recall knowledge from memory have a recollection. <i>He could not quite recollect the reason.</i>
<u>recollection</u>	The action or faculty of remembering or recollecting something. <i>To the best of my recollection no one ever had a bad word to say about him.</i>
remember	Show appreciation to. <i>I can t remember saying any such thing.</i>
remembrance	A recognition of meritorious service. <i>A flash of remembrance passed between them.</i>
remind	Cause (someone) to remember someone or something. <i>The barman reminded them that singing was not permitted.</i>
reminiscence	A characteristic of one thing that is suggestive of another. <i>His first works are too full of reminiscences of earlier poetry.</i>
<u>reminiscent</u>	Absorbed in or suggesting absorption in memories. <i>Her robes were vaguely reminiscent of military dress.</i>
<u>stasis</u>	An abnormal state in which the normal flow of a liquid (such as blood) is slowed or stopped. <i>Long periods of stasis.</i>
<u>suggest</u>	Suggest the necessity of an intervention in medicine. <i>Finds of lead coffins suggested a cemetery north of the river.</i>
<u>summon</u>	Ask to come. <i>If the person summoned does not appear he may be arrested.</i>
<u>theorize</u>	Form a theory or theories about something. <i>He theorized that the atolls marked the sites of vanished volcanoes.</i>
waken	Stop sleeping. <i>She knew he would waken in an hour or so.</i>

writ

A form of written command in the name of a court or other legal authority to act or abstain from acting in a particular way.
