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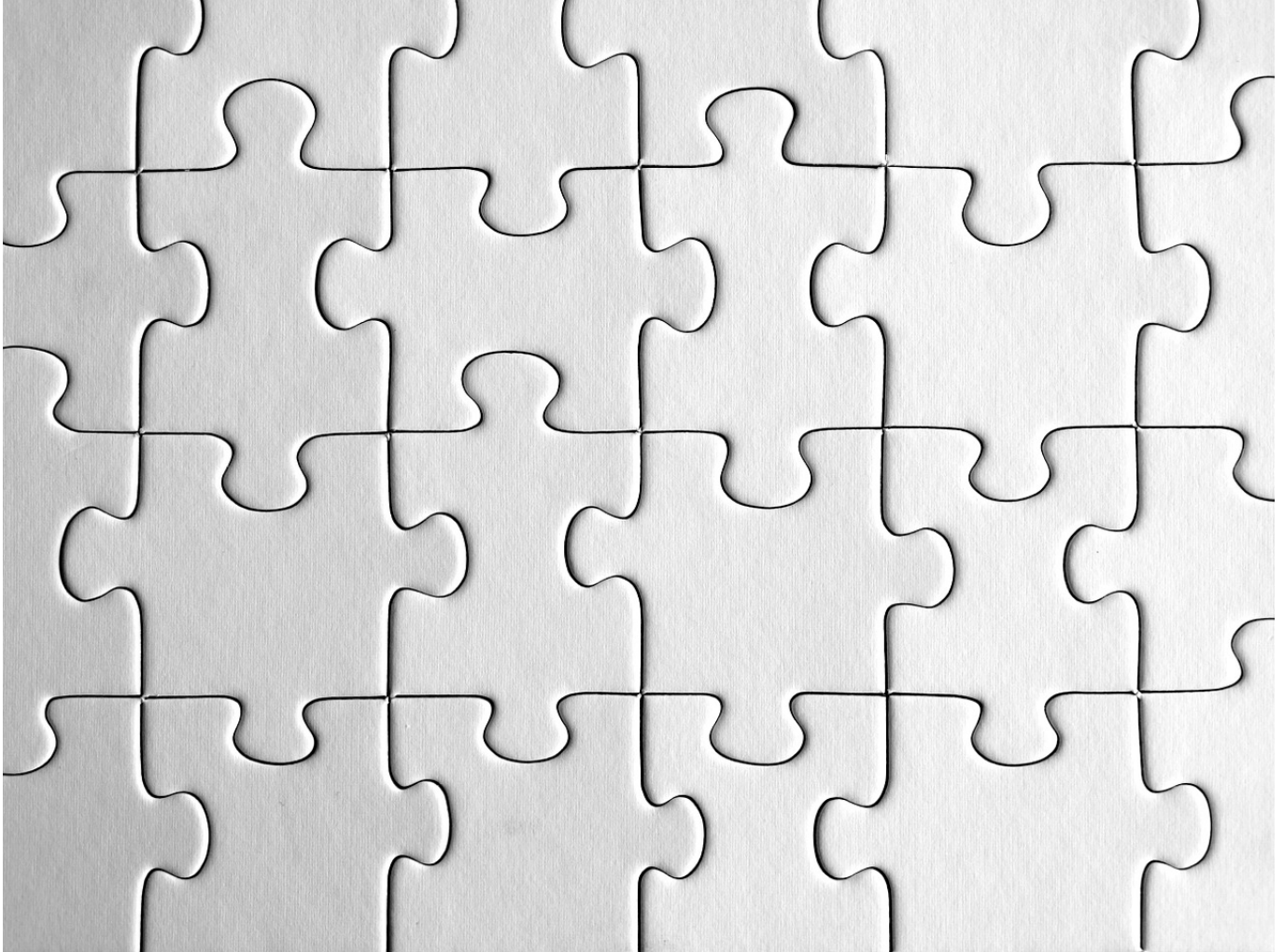

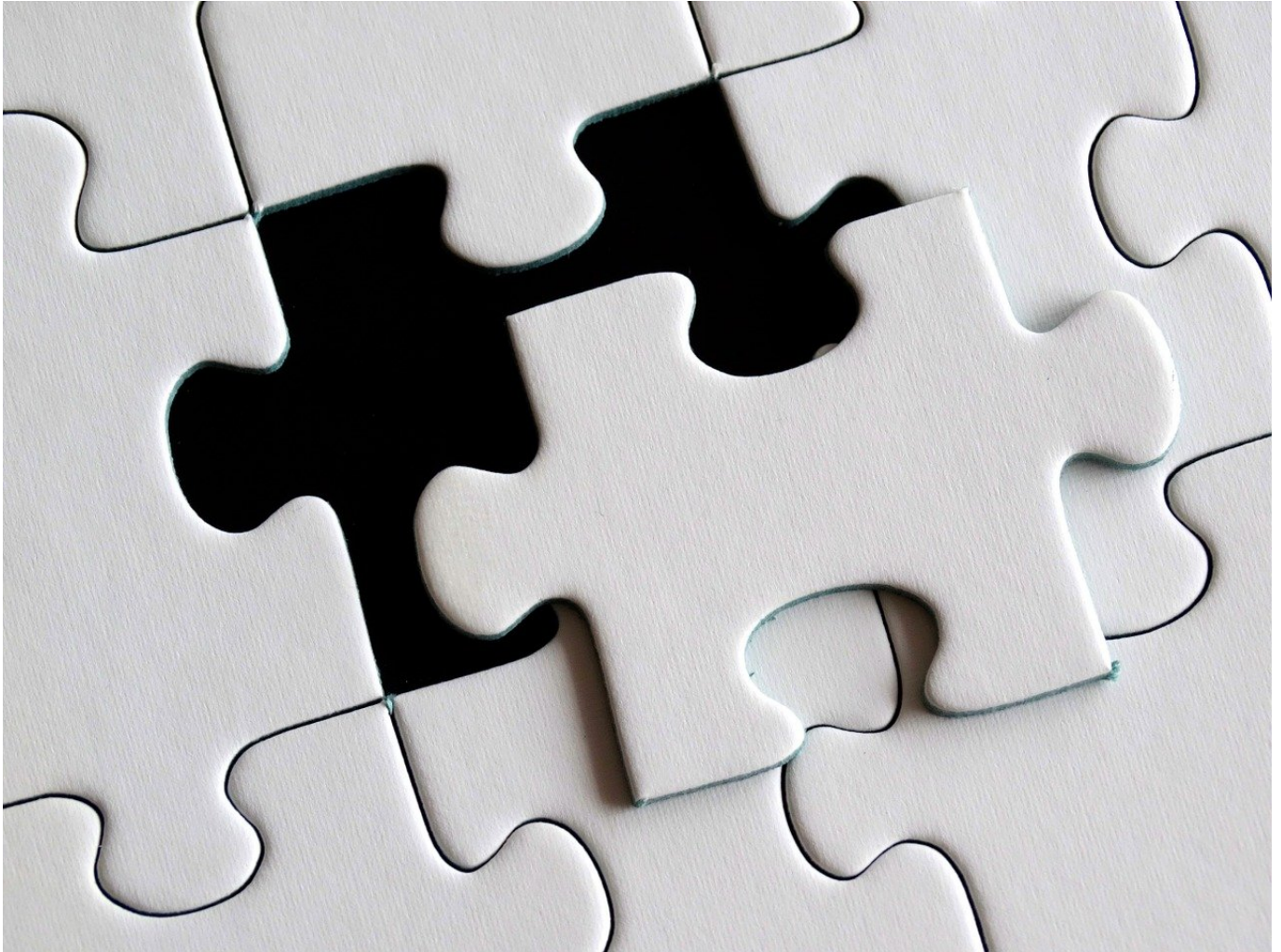

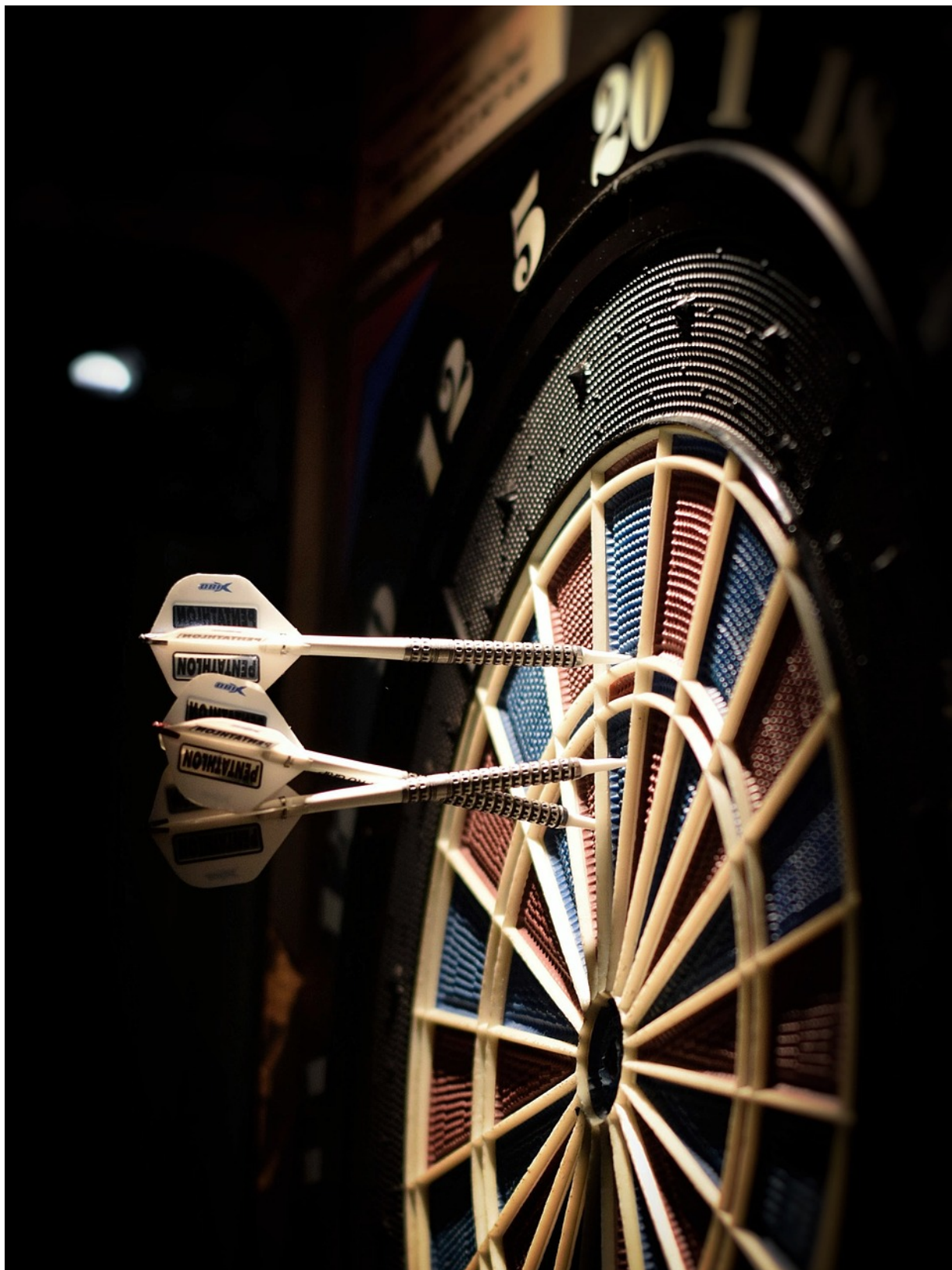
<b><u>meticulous</u></b>	Marked by precise accordance with details. <i>The designs are hand glazed with <b>meticulous</b> care.</i>
<b><u>painstaking</u></b>	Characterized by extreme care and great effort. <b><i>Painstaking</i></b> research.
<b>perfect</b>	Of a tense denoting a completed action or a state or habitual action which began in the past The perfect tense is formed in English with have or has and the past participle as in they have eaten and they have been eating present perfect they had eaten past perfect and they will have eaten future perfect. <b><i>Perfect</i></b> timing.
<b><u>precise</u></b>	Used to emphasize that one is referring to an exact and particular thing. <i>Specified a <b>precise</b> amount.</i>

<b>pedantic</b>	Marked by a narrow focus on or display of learning especially its trivial aspects. <i>His analyses are careful and even painstaking but never <b>pedantic</b>.</i>
<b>perusal</b>	Reading carefully with intent to remember. <i>I continued my <b>perusal</b> of the instructions.</i>
<b>pinpoint</b>	Tiny. <i>It is difficult to <b>pinpoint</b> the source of his life s inspiration.</i>
<b>precise</b>	Used to emphasize that one is referring to an exact and particular thing. <i>A <b>precise</b> image.</i>
<b>precisely</b>	Used as a reply to confirm or agree with a previous statement. <i>Kids will love it <b>precisely</b> because it will irritate their parents.</i>
<b>precision</b>	Marked by or adapted for accuracy and exactness. <i>The deal was planned and executed with military <b>precision</b>.</i>
<b>punctilious</b>	Showing great attention to detail or correct behaviour. <i>He was <b>punctilious</b> in providing every amenity for his guests.</i>
<b>reliably</b>	In a faithful manner. <i>Few of these paintings can be <b>reliably</b> dated.</i>
<b>scrupulous</b>	Characterized by extreme care and great effort. <i>She s too <b>scrupulous</b> to have an affair with a married man.</i>
